

First he says, "Sacrifices and offerings, holocausts and sin offerings, you neither desired nor delighted in." These are offered according to the law. Then he says, :Behold, I come to do your will." He takes away the first to establish the second. By this "will," we have been consecrated through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

From Fr. Mike's Desk

Christmas is only six days away, and here we are in a year which gives us almost a whole Fourth Week of Advent. Our time of waiting is almost over, and we can joyfully celebrate one of the greatest days on the Church's calendar! But before we celebrate December 25th let us back track a little to March 25th and to five months before. On March 25th, we celebrate the Feast of the Annunciation (nine months before Christmas). At that event, the Archangel Gabriel appeared to our dear Blessed Mother, and asked her if she would be the mother of the Savior of the world. As we are told, Mary was greatly troubled by the appearance of the angel, and by the words used to greet her. Hail full of grace, the Lord is with you! After some fear and confusion, Mary told the angel that she was God's servant and anything He wanted her to do she would. At the end of the message, Gabriel informed Mary about her cousin Elizabeth who was with child. She could not have children during her life, and now she was in advanced age, yet she conceived a child and was now in her sixth month. Mary soon left and went to visit her cousin, not to verify the story but to help and speak with her cousin about the children to be!

Let us now go back five months from the Annunciation, where we are at the Temple in Jerusalem. There we find Zachariah, a priest of the Lord, who was making an offering at the Altar of Incense as it was his turn. This was a great honor and Zachariah was overjoyed to perform it. While he was there, the Archangel Gabriel appeared to him and told him the good news about his wife, and the son she would bear. He was frightened, and being an older person, he was somewhat suspicious about the message. He refused to believe the angel and because of his disbelief, he was struck mute, and could not speak until the child John was born! He refused to believe, and, in a way, he said no to God. Mary on the other hand, immediately said yes, even if she did not know where it would lead her.

This now leads us to today's Gospel, as we read about the Visitation, also known as the Meeting. Mary must go to see Elizabeth, and when she hears Mary's greeting, the baby in her womb leaped for joy. He was filled with the Holy Spirit and that in turn filled his mother. So filled was she that she greeted Mary with these words, "Blessed are you among women, blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen that the mother of my Lord should come to me... Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."" Certainly, we can see the difference between the two who received the Divine message. As we see one was extremely faithful and the other only trusted in his own ideas. However, Zachariah had a change of heart, and when John was born, and he could speak again he rightly proclaimed that his child would prepare the way of the Lord. As we mentioned above, the Visitation is also called the Meeting. But it is not just the meeting of Mary and Elizabeth, it is the meeting of the fore runner and the Messiah. John as mentioned, is filled with the Holy Spirit as he is so close to the Son of God, so that even as an unborn child he knows he is in God's presence.

We are six days from celebrating God becoming one of us, and we are six days away from celebrating the great moment which changed humanity forever. God elevated humanity to a new level, and we became better than when we were created. Are you ready to celebrate this, have you made room in your heart for the birth of Jesus, and are you ready to receive the Risen Jesus? Not just on December 25th or for the 12 days later, but every day of the year!

Please remember that we will be celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation on Tuesday December 21st from 2-3 PM and 7:30-9:00 PM. The Mass times for Christmas Eve Friday the 24th are: 4 PM in the Church and in the Gym, 6 PM, 8 PM and 12 AM. The Masses for Christmas Day Saturday the 25th are: 7:30 AM, 9:30 AM, 11:30 AM and 1:00 PM. All Masses for Christmas Day are in the Church. Also please note that there is no evening Masses on Christmas Night!

New York State - Important Update to

Dear Brothers:

The New York State website FAQ's that accompany **the Governor's directives regarding masks now** includes "houses of worship".

Therefore, since Churches will **not** be requiring parishioners to present proof of vaccination, we ask that the following announcement be clearly communicated to parishioners through your normal means of communication:

"The Governor of New York State has included houses of worship in her recent directives. Therefore, since the Church does not require parishioners to present proof of vaccination in order to worship God, we ask that all parishioners (two years of age and older) comply with the requirement to wear masks when participating in any activities on parish grounds. This State requirement is currently in effect through January 15, 2022. We will continue to adapt accordingly as new information becomes available. Your patience and Christian charity towards one another during this difficult time is appreciated."

Where there is kindness there is goodness; where there is goodness there is God.

The kindness of the parishioners of St. Edward Confessor Church and the Syosset community has changed the lives of so many here in Syosset and beyond. For many of our pantry families, the pandemic has made their difficult life circumstances more of a burden. Between the financial hardship and ongoing health related issues, life leaves them feeling hopeless and abandoned by God. The volunteers in both the Parish Social Ministry and our St. Vincent dePaul Conference help the less fortunate to witness the goodness of God. One women wrote to us, "You have restored my faith with kindness and understanding."

Let me share with you how we are able to continuously help others in need and the ways we are helping them. At the food pantry, we are currently providing assistance to 68 families and 24 individuals. Throughout the year, with your help and from Island Harvest, we are able to weekly provide nutritious food and basic needs items. We receive a tremendous amount of assistance from members of our Syosset community holding food drives and making monetary donations: Syosset Public Library, Syosset Woodbury Chamber of Commerce, Mid-Island Jewish Center, Sisters of Mercy, parishioners from Holy Name of Jesus, the non-profit group J.E.T.S. of America, Signature Premier Properties, staff, students and parents from all the Syosset Public Schools, Our Lady of Mercy Academy, St. Edward Confessor School, and Boy Scouts Troop 205. There are several neighbors who heard about our pantry and regularly drop off food and basic need items as well as make significant monetary donations. They hear the voices of the poor and want to help. God is good, all the time.

At Christmas, Easter, Back to School and Thanksgiving, each family receives gift cards to make their own purchases as well as grocery cards as needed. For Christmas, the families are given a choice of a frozen lasagna dinner, turkey, ham or chicken. Parents are able to select toys from our toy drive. At Thanksgiving, they receive a choice of a turkey or chicken with all the trimmings and homemade pumpkin bread or fresh made rolls. They can select a coat for each family member from our yearly coat drive. This year, there was a nice selection of brand new coats, gloves and hats for the children. Our back to school drive provides each student with a backpack filled with all the necessary school supplies. This year we gave out a total of 96 backpacks, 81 to our pantry children and 15 to Jericho Cares for the children living in motels. At Easter, we distributed 100 Easter baskets and gave 15 to the children living in the Jericho motels. Just as it is important for us to receive your generous donations, it is also important for us to give, we donate food and other items to St. John of God in Islip on a monthly basis. Where there is goodness there is God.

The kindness of the parishioners continues to change lives by comforting someone who is sick or grieving, by prayer and with handmade prayer shawls. We are so fortunate to have parishioners who returned to volunteer their time to bring communion to the sick in Syosset Hospital, the elderly living in the nearby nursing homes and the homebound. We returned to Cold Spring Hills Nursing Home in June, the surviving residents warmly welcomed and greeted us with Joy to receive Jesus and hear the Word of God. We have an amazing outreach ministry here at St. Edward Confessor Church; every volunteer works tirelessly to give of their time to help our neighbors in need.

Parishioners, because of your kindness, your soul has found a place in the hearts of those whose daily lives are a struggle and it is truly a shelter fortified with gratitude. Thank you!

May God's love surround you at Christmas and always.
