The Readings for The Fourth Sunday of Advent

Reading 1 - 1 Samuel 7:1-5, 8B-12, 14A, 16

When King David was settled in his palace, and the LORD had given him rest from his enemies on every side, he said to Nathan the prophet, "Here I am living in a house of cedar, while the ark of God dwells in a tent!" Nathan answered the king, "Go, do whatever you have in mind, for the LORD is with you." But that night the LORD spoke to Nathan and said: "Go, tell my servant David, 'Thus says the LORD: Should you build me a house to dwell in?""

"It was I who took you from the pasture and from the care of the flock to be commander of my people Israel. I have been with you wherever you went, and I have destroyed all your enemies before you. And I will make you famous like the great ones of the earth. I will fix a place for my people Israel; I will plant them so that they may dwell in their place without further disturbance. Neither shall the wicked continue to afflict them as they did of old, since the time I first appointed judges over my people Israel. I will give you rest from all your enemies. The LORD also reveals to you that he will establish a house for you. And when your time comes and you rest with your ancestors, I will raise up your heir after you, sprung from your loins, and I will make his kingdom firm. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me. Your house and your kingdom shall endure forever before me; your throne shall stand firm forever.""

Amen.

Gospel – Luke 1:26-38

The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary. And coming to her, he said, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." But she was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. Then the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.

"Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." But Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?" And the angel said to her in reply, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God. And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God." Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

Prayer to St. Michael

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle, be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.

From Fr. Mike's Desk

"Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." With these words the Archangel Gabriel left the Blessed Mother and God's plan for our salvation came closer to its completion. What a contrast between today's Gospel and our First Reading from the Second Book of Samuel. In Second Samuel, David hopes to build the first real temple to the One, True God. He discusses his plans with Nathan the Prophet, who believes that God would want and even expect David to accomplish this great task. After all, it appears that God has given David everything.

But as we see, David, who wants so desperately to build the temple, is told by God, "no"! God will not let David build the temple for many reasons, but God does tell David that his son will build the temple and it will be blessed by God, and so Solomon is called to build the first Temple. However God tells David that this in no way means that He has withdrawn His favor from David. In fact God tells the King that his house will be established forever and his descendants will sit on the throne forever.

Now let us look at the Gospel. As we are told the Blessed Mother is contacted by God through the Archangel, who tells her she is going to be the mother of the savior of the world. She is not seeking this, nor is she expecting it, but she who is full of grace receives the honor that David was denied. She, like the Temple, would be a dwelling place for God as she is indeed a living temple; the most fitting of all dwellings for the Son of God. Also with Mary's "yes", God's promise to David is fulfilled, for Jesus; through Joseph, is a descendant of the House of David and takes up His throne forever as the King of Kings. Great things He will accomplish and He will bring great joy to all who know and believe in Him, as St. Paul's letter to the Romans hints at today.

Four days from today we will celebrate and remember the great day when God became one of us in the person of Jesus. Four days from now we will remember how His taking on Human Life set us free from slavery to sin. Four days from now we will remember how much God loves us by sending the true light into the world to conquer the power of darkness. And in four days, we will realize that by God becoming one of us, He wishes us to become His dwelling place as well. For God became one of us to share all things with us, to know what it is to live a human life and show us the way to a heavenly life.

Through the Holy Spirit we are all God's dwelling places, so I invite you to use these four days to clean house and to get your heart and soul ready to welcome "*The New Born King*" into your house. **Please see the bulletin for Christmas Eve and Day Masses.**

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 39 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to The 3rd Sunday of Advent, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

This Sunday we enter the Third Week of Advent, as signified by the lighting of the Rose-Colored Candle. For the first two weeks we lighted the purple candles, but this week we light the candle of a different color, of course next week we go back and light the Fourth Candle which is again purple. This Sunday is called in Latin Gaudete Sunday, which means Rejoice. We rejoice because we have made a transition in our Advent observance. We are now no longer focusing on repentance, but celebration, celebrating the Birth of Jesus on Christmas. The color Rose was selected because it goes back to an ancient custom of how the Pope would honor special visitors or those who gave loyal service. He would present them with a pink rose, and since we are waiting to greet the Christ Child, we present Him with a Rose candle. This candle also has in some traditions the name of the Shepherd Candle. It is called that because it remembers the joy the shepherds experienced when they saw the angels and the baby Jesus.

In fact, each of the Purple Candles has a specific name and meaning. The First Candle is the Candle of Hope or the Prophecy Candle. In our lighting of this candle our hearts are led to hope, much like our ancestors who were hoping for the coming of the Messiah, and as the Prophecy Candle it calls us to remember the words of the Prophets and likewise hope in them. The Second Purple Candle is the Preparation Candle or also known as the Bethlehem Candle. The hope from the first candle and week helps us now to better prepare our hearts to welcoming and receiving Jesus at His first coming and especially for His second coming. The Fourth Candle is called the Candle of Love, it reminds us that as we reach this fourth week, we will be coming to the end of our Advent Journey and we will be realizing the Love that God has for us, by becoming one of us in the person of Jesus. Remember that Purple is not only the color of penance, but also the color of nobility and reminds us of the supremacy of Christ who is the King of Kings, the King of the Universe, and our hearts. Thus, purple reminds us that we are preparing to welcome our Savior (in both comings).

As we begin this Third Sunday, let our hearts true to rejoicing as we are about to celebrate the great feast of the Incarnation. While we do not live in a perfect world, and we face many struggles, especially in these very anxious and uncertain time, God has called us to be His own and has called us to share eternal life with Him in Heaven, this is the true joy of Christmas. Yes, this Christmas will be different from past celebrations, but with God's help and all of us working together we can make it something new and bright.

We close with the Entrance Antiphon from this Sunday's Mass: Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near.

Christmas 2020

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

When he was elected as a Successor of St. Peter on March 13, 2013, our Holy Father chose the name *Francis*. It was a weighty decision with a prophetic message. Especially now, seven years later and with the publication of his latest encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* from the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi on October 3, 2020, the significance of the choice is clear: Pope Francis connects his papacy to St. Francis.

Through the ministry of our Holy Father, St. Francis of Assisi is close to the Church in these times. Therefore, as we draw near to Bethlehem at the end of this difficult year, I wish to recall two points Pope Francis highlights from the life of St. Francis. One will help us celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord; the other indicates a grace for which to pray during the holy season.

First, in his 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile Signum: On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, Pope Francis emphasizes St. Francis of Assisi's foundational role in our celebration of Christmas. The Holy Father recalls the origins of the creche and the first nativity scene inspired by the holy friar in 1223, by which the saint sought "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem." Importantly, the remembrance of Christ's birth that St. Francis desired to convey was brought alive in Greccio, a small village in Italy, not by statues but by people from the surrounding towns and countryside. Together with St. Francis, his friars, an ox and a donkey, they gathered at a cave to behold a manger full of hay over which the Eucharist was celebrated. That Christmas night, almost 800 years ago, Pope Francis reminds us, "the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present." That night, there was "no distance between the original event and those sharing in its mystery." (2) Encountering Christ, there was simply joy and hope.

This Christmas, in our world laden with the Crosses of COVID-19, political and economic turnoil, racism, financial hardship, and so many other societal ills and challenges – challenges that impact us on Long Island – let us remember this lesson from Greccio: Christmas is an event to be lived. It demands our participation. Like the women and men who embodied that first crèche, we must be present to Christ who is born for us. We must behold and receive Him.

Second, in *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis shows St. Francis as an icon of Christocentriclistening. With great humility and charity, the saint reverently listened to others. He was present to the various voices in his life – the voice of God, the voice of his neighbor, the voice of the poor, the voice of the sick, the voice of nature – and by truly hearing them, he was an instrument of peace, healing, and understanding. How different it can be for us! The Holy Father says well what we know: "'Today's world is largely a deaf world...At times, the frantic pace of the modern world prevents us from listening attentively to what another person is saying." Aware of this fact, the Pope encourages us, in the midst of our hectic and polarized world, to be like St. Francis and "not lose our ability to listen." (48)

This Christmas, when we approach the crib, let us ask for the grace to be attentive listeners. Let us ask for the grace to be like St. Francis, so that we may hear the voice of God and the voice of our neighbor and respond with the radical charity he exhibited.¹

Like Pope Francis, may we be moved by the example of St. Francis, and may St. Francis of Assisi's love for the Mystery of the Nativity, his ecstatic mysticism, his love for the poor, and his spirit of universal fraternity animate our celebration of Christmas this year.

May God bless you and your families this Christmas.

We Need Your Help

We have **good news** and **bab news**... The **good news** is that we are starting to see a slow but steady increase in the number of people who are coming back to Mass on Sundays. We are so happy to see you again and we look forward to having everyone back together as a faith community. Now the **bab news**... the Federal Communication Commission is phasing out the 600 MHz frequencies currently in use by many Church congregations including St. Edward's. What this means is that our current sound system will not be able to comply or function with the new required frequency. Our sound system, which has served us well until recently, is the same system originally installed when our church was built, and includes the Holy Family Room and Auditorium. It has become antiquated and has failed several times. Replace our sound system for the church, Holy Family room and Auditorium. Unfortunately, this does not come without a considerable cost. The best estimate we have received is approximately \$40,000. This could not have come at a worse time. Although we are blessed by your kind generosity, our weekly collections are lower than anticipated and as you know our fundraisers have been cancelled because of the pandemic.

So, we need your help! I am asking you to consider being a donor to help defray the cost of this system. I know times are tough for many and we are experiencing the need to tighten our belts as well, but the sound system is imperative for our liturgical services and school functions.

Pope Francis says "Those Who Pray, Pray for All"

During his General Audience this past Wednesday Pope Francis focused on "intercessory prayer"; that is, prayer which asks on behalf of another." Those who are accustomed to pray, said Pope Francis, "never turn their backs on the world." If prayer is not engaged with every aspect of human existence – its joys and sorrows, its hopes and anxieties – it becomes a "decorative" activity.

The Pope noted a resemblance between those who pray for others, and Christ in the Eucharist. "In prayer," he said, "God 'takes us, blesses us, breaks us, and gives us,' to satisfy everyone's hunger." Every Christian, he added, "is called to become bread, broken and shared, in God's hands." Men and women of prayer, the Pope said, always "keep the doors of their hearts wide open," even when they seek solitude and silence. They pray for those who do not pray, or do not know how to pray, as well as for those "who have erred and have lost the way." In their solitude, those who pray "separate themselves from everything and everyone" precisely in order to "rediscover everything and everyone in God."

The Pope said these people "pray for each and every person," they see "the face of Christ in every poor person who knocks at their door, in every person who has lost the meaning of things." Prayer is "simply human," Pope Francis said. "The human heart tends toward prayer." But prayer necessarily involves love for our brothers and sisters. Human experience, said the Pope, "is present in every prayer, because no matter what errors people may have committed, they should never be rejected or discarded."

Pope Francis insisted that when those who pray offer prayers for sinners, there should be no judgment or condemnation: those who pray, pray for all, and first of all for themselves. The Holy Father suggested, for this very reason, a prayer that all can pray: "Lord, no one is just in your sight; we are all debtors, each with an **outstanding balance to pay; no one is sinless in your eyes. Lord, have mercy on us!**" The Pope continued, noting that, even despite the sins of His people, God remains faithful, persevering "in His service as a Shepherd even with those force him to get His hands dirty; He does not close His heart to those who have even made Him suffer."



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
