## Second Sunday of Lent

### Reading 1 - Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18

The Lord God took Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants be." Abram put his faith in the LORD, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness.

He then said to him, "I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as a possession." "O Lord GOD," he asked, "how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He answered him, "Bring me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old she-goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." Abram brought him all these, split them in two, and placed each half opposite the other; but the birds he did not cut up. Birds of prey swooped down on the carcasses, but Abram stayed with them. As the sun was about to set, a trance fell upon Abram, and a deep, terrifying darkness enveloped him.

When the sun had set and it was dark, there appeared a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch, which passed between those pieces. It was on that occasion that the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying: "To your descendants I give this land, from the Wadi of Egypt to the Great River, the Euphrates."

### Reading 2 - Philippians 3:17-4:1

Join with others in being imitators of me, brothers and sisters, and observe those who thus conduct themselves according to the model you have in us. For many, as I have often told you and now tell you even in tears, conduct themselves as enemies of the cross of Christ. Their end is destruction. Their God is their stomach; their glory is in their "shame." Their minds are occupied with earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, in this way stand firm in the Lord.

### Gospel - Luke 9:28b-36

Jesus took Peter, John, and James and went up the mountain to pray. While he was praying his face changed in appearance and his clothing became dazzling white. And behold, two men were conversing with him, Moses and Elijah, who appeared in glory and spoke of his exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem. Peter and his companions had been overcome by sleep, but becoming fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As they were about to part from him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good that we are here; let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." But he did not know what he was saying. While he was still speaking, a cloud came and cast a shadow over them, and they became frightened when they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." After the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. They fell silent and did not at that time tell anyone what they had seen.

## From Fr. Mike's Desk

Eleven days ago, we entered the Holy Season of Lent, and we began our over forty-day journey to Easter. On Ash Wednesday we were marked with ashes and were reminded to turn away from sin and believe and be faithful to the Gospel. Many of us have decided to give things up or perform some other act of penance, so that we can be transformed and become better Christians.

Transformation is what our readings are all about this weekend, and we see this in our First Reading when God took Abram outside, and told him, *"Look up at the sky and count the stars if you can. Just so, shall your descendants be."* After God and Abram continued their conversation, which ended with Abram offering a sacrifice, Abram is enveloped by a deep, terrifying darkness and at that moment God made His covenant with Abram, who would now be called Abraham and Sari his wife would now be known as Sarah. In this covenant, God promised to be with Abraham and his children forever, and the name change shows us that Abraham was no longer the same as he was when God first called him from the land of Ur. Abraham's relationship with God would become so close, that God would confer with Abraham when it came to God's handling of the cities on the plain; Sodom and Gomorrah.

Today's Gospel gives us Luke's version of the Lord's Transfiguration. Every Second Sunday of Lent we read an account of this awe-filled event, and we know that it takes place after Jesus asks His Apostles, "who do people say that I am"? After He tells them His true identity, He proceeds to tell them what will happen to Him when He arrives at Jerusalem. Jesus tells them that He will be betrayed, judged by the elders, and turned over to the Romans who will execute Him. They are in shock, and do not know how to deal with this news, after all this is not supposed to happen to the Messiah! But He told them He was the Messiah, and while they believe, they do not understand. They were so disheartened that they failed to hear or listen to Jesus when He said that three days later He would rise from the dead. As a result of their disbelief, Jesus takes Peter, John and James with Him to pray, and while Jesus is at prayer, He is transfigured before their eyes and He becomes as white as light. On either side of Jesus, looking just as He does, are Moses and Elijah who were discussing with Jesus His exodus and what He would accomplish in Jerusalem. Why did this happen, why did God give Peter, John and James this experience? This all

happened so that they too would be transformed and share this event with the rest of the twelve. God the Father, wanted them to get a glimpse of Jesus' divinity with the hopes that they would have a better understanding who Jesus was and God's total plan for our salvation. A plan which played out with the Messiah having to die for our sins only to rise in glory and bring us all new life in the Resurrection. Of course, their full transformation would not happen till the first Easter Sunday and the receiving of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, but it did happen!

Remember this season is, for us, a time to try and transform ourselves, and to better participate in the covenant God has made with us through the Life, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. Just as the Apostles saw the glorified Jesus on the Mount of the Transfiguration, so we hope to see Him, not just on Easter Sunday, or when we go home to Heaven, but every time we hear the word spoken, receive Him in His Body and Blood, and certainly see Jesus in each other. In order for us to see Him in these ways, we must be transformed, as Paul tells us in his Letter to the Philippians. He tells us to be imitators of him, and not to focus on earthly things, but on the things of heaven. We are to focus on Jesus who will change our lowly body to conform to His glorified body, by the power that enables Him also to bring all things into subjection to Himself.

*We close with the following prayer: God of life and glory, your Son was revealed in splendor before He suffered death upon the cross; grant that we, beholding His majesty, may be strengthened to follow Him and be changed into His likeness from glory to glory; for He lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God forever and ever. Amen.*

## POPE FRANCIS SENDS PAPAL ALMONER TO UKRAINE

Cardinal Konrad Krajewski, the Papal Almoner and head of the Charitable Office, began his mission as Pope Francis' envoy to Ukraine on Tuesday, March 8th. Pope Francis has instructed Cardinal Krajewski "to remain in Ukraine as long as necessary to provide support to the Ukrainian people on behalf of the Apostolic See in these dramatic moments of its history." On Thursday, March 10th Cardinal Krajewski visited social assistance centers, and later took part in a joint prayer with representatives of the Pan-Ukrainian Council of Churches and Religious Organizations.

Additionally, Pope Francis also sent Cardinal Michael Czerny, the acting prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development. Both Cardinals were sent as representatives "not only the presence of the Pope," but also symbolizing "the presence of all Christians" who want to be close to the people and the situation, who say, in the words of Pope Francis, "War is madness! Stop, please! Look at this cruelty!"

## LENTEN RULES - FASTING & ABSTINENCE

**LENT**  
Pray + Fast + Give

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Roman Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Roman Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

## ***As You Plan Your Future, Please Consider a Legacy Gift to Our Parish***

The principle of Stewardship is frequently discussed in Catholic circles, both among the laity and Church leadership. Stewardship is based in scripture and in Church traditions. Stewardship flows from our gratitude to God for the gifts, with which we have been blessed. We show our gratitude by being generous in our response with our time, talent, and treasure.

As a Priest, I am committing to God as much as I can of my time, talent, and treasure. The Catholic faith has been the cornerstone of my life. The priesthood ever continues to be a source of joy and fulfillment. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the Church. I strive to be a faithful steward and through my service leave a legacy that survives beyond my death.

As your pastor, I would like to encourage you to consider ways that you can leave a lasting legacy. Let me suggest that making a planned gift to the Church is a way you can leave a legacy and express gratitude for what the Church has meant to you. A planned gift can be a lasting way to fulfill your stewardship of treasure.

You may be asking yourself what a planned gift is as it can be a confusing term and it is often misunderstood. Very simply, planned giving describes a donor's commitment to transfer capital assets to a qualified religious organization or other charity. More often than not, a planned gift is made by means of a formal agreement or contract. Planned gifts are normally made from the donor's accumulated wealth as part of an overall estate plan. The most common form of a planned gift is a bequest provision in a will.

Many Catholics find the idea of making a planned gift to their parish appealing. Parishioners often wonder how to go about making a planned gift and they have other questions about planned giving options.

One reason parishioners have questions is that they do not often hear about planned giving in their Catholic community. And Church leaders do not talk about planned giving as much as we could or should. It is my hope that my written reflection will help remedy the lack of information on this important subject.

Here at the Parish, faithful parishioners have found that naming the parish in their wills or trusts to be a very fulfilling way to show their appreciation for what the Church has meant to them. Some parishioners have left planned gifts in memory of a loved one or close friend. Others have made a bequest to support a particular parish ministry, or outreach.

Individuals who make planned gifts often enjoy significant tax advantages from their giving. Still others find that once their surviving family receives a reasonable inheritance, leaving a bequest to the parish is a fulfilling way to show their gratitude for God's blessings and leave a spiritual legacy.

I would prayerfully ask you to consider the Parish as a worthy object of your generosity. The Parish will remember you with gratitude in our prayers and you will have eternal rest knowing that you have left a lasting spiritual legacy. 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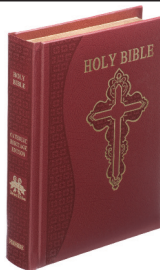
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
