

The Readings for The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Reading 1 - 2 Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem.

Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy. Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled."

In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cyrus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of the earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!"

Reading 2 – Ephesians 2:4-10

Brothers and sisters:

God, who is rich in mercy, because of the great love he had for us, even when we were dead in our transgressions, brought us to life with Christ — by grace you have been saved —, raised us up with him, and seated us with him in the heavens in Christ Jesus, that in the ages to come He might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God; it is not from works, so no one may boast. For we are his handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance, that we should live in them

Gospel – John 3:14-21

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

"Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life."

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

Prayer to St. Michael

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle, be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.

From Fr. Mike's Desk

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him."

"But whoever does not believe has already been condemned because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God."

Saint John presents us with what appears to be a contradiction, how can God send His only Son to save the world and not condemn it, and yet condemns those who do not believe in His Son. It does not seem to make sense, and on first reading it looks like God is being petty, condemning those who do not believe in Jesus and the Gospel. Could this really be the God of Love and Mercy? Saint Paul tells us today that by Grace and a life centered with Christ we have been saved. So why would God not extend this to all? Well, He does, and what is really being said today, is anyone who seeks out Jesus, and acknowledges Him, as the great gift of the Father, and that He was sent into the world to forgive sins, will be saved. Those who will be condemned are the ones who refuse to accept Him. This does not mean those who do not know of Jesus, or those who belong to other faiths. do not who have another path to Heaven. God will not condemn a person for any of these reasons. However, the condemnation comes to those who know Jesus and refuse to accept Him or push Him out of their life. Those who hear His words and teaching, rejects them, and constantly goes out of their way to ignore Him or deny them, these will face condemnation. Keep in mind that this condemnation does not come from God. It comes to them by their own actions and thoughts. As the text tells us, they are preferring to live in the darkness of sin and spiritual death, and they are afraid to come into the light of Christ, God's great gift of Love and Mercy.


I believe we know people who have done this to themselves, who are afraid because they do not know how to seek Jesus' light. We can encourage them to follow what Jesus suggested to Nicodemus, to look at the Son of Man being lifted high on the Cross. For it is through His death and resurrection we are saved. If one who rejects Jesus can find Him, then condemnation is replaced with eternal life. Hence, it will be up to us to help them, evangelize them and be willing to walk side

by side with that person to place them on the path to Jesus.

We should also pay attention to this reading for our own lives. I know there are places in my life where I may dwell in darkness and I know I must let the light of Christ fill these dark places. We should be trying to do this every day, especially during this Holy Season of Lent. When we help others, and come out of our own dark places then we can truly feel and understand, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son..."

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 51 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to the Third Sunday of Lent, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

This past week marks the anniversary of the first known case of COVID19 in New York. This is not to say that it was not here before March, and as some believe it was already here in late November and December of 2019. But this is the first case that medical people say they knew for sure. Shortly after this, we entered lockdown, and many of us were glued to the television or the internet. We were glued because we were trying to get as much information as we could. As many of us could testify, we found out that too much information was not truly a good thing. Many found that too much information caused more fear and anxiety. Yet not having enough information would and could increase the spread of the virus.

Here we are one year later, and while we live in a different world, it is still a world where COVID19 calls most of the shots. Over 38 thousand people have died in New York City and State during the past year, and over 500,000 have died across the whole country. Grim numbers indeed, even more so when we realize that these numbers include friends, relatives, and neighbors we knew and loved. Unfortunately, even one year later we are still losing people, and we still want more answers. However, there is some good news as well. We know a great deal more than we did a year ago. Treatments, that doctors thought would work well and failed, were followed up by new and radical ways to successfully treat the virus and now we have new treatments that work. After a few holiday spikes the numbers are going down especially the death rate. However, we know that we are not out of the woods yet, but we are getting closer to the exit. We have three vaccines available to us, but we still have the problem of making an appointment to get them. Hopefully, that will change sooner than later. If the health officials are correct, we may be done with this (or reach herd immunity) by September if not earlier. So, let us not lose hope!

There is one aspect of this past year that we must never forget and that is how everybody worked together to help one another. How many people are still helping, and we need this help now just as much as we needed a year ago. Our kids are back in school (in some sense or another) and it appears that in some places school sports will start again. We are looking into starting up CYO and maybe the Youth Mass. We must also keep in mind that we have been able to move along this path with the great help of God. As I have written many times in this space, it may seem that God was not here, but God was. Our Lord Jesus Christ continues to stand by us, as does His dear Mother, our dear Mother, who continues to pray for us and guide us.

As we look back on this past year, and pray for those who have left this world, and those who are still suffering or struggling with this virus, we must continue to keep on moving forward. We must all take steps to stay safe and stop the spread. We must keep this up, until COVID19 is no longer in the forefront of everything.

After hard work, and lots of fund-raising, St. Edward's School building was opened in 1961. Since then, over 60 Sisters of Mercy have taught in the school. POPE AT ANGELUS

Prayer lifts us out of spiritual laziness to help others

At the Angelus* address on Sunday, February 28th Pope Francis reflects on the Transfiguration of Jesus, and urged Christians to turn our experience of prayer into a desire to carry hope to the world. He began by considering what Jesus told His disciples before taking them up the mountain. Jesus had just revealed that He would be condemned to death but would rise again. Pope Francis said Jesus thus reminded them that He would overcome death. "His face radiant and his garments glistening, providing a preview of his image as the Risen One, offer to those frightened men the light to pass through the shadows." The Pope went on to reflect on Peter's words: "Rabbi, it is good that we are here!" He said the Apostle's expression of appreciation is a reminder that the Lord never lets darkness have the final word. When we face seemingly-endless trials, said the Pope, we need another point of view: "a light which illuminates in depth the mystery of life and helps us to move beyond our frame of mind and the criteria of this world." We too, he stressed, are called to climb the mountain with Jesus to have every fragment of our lives illuminated by His victory at Easter. Yet, warned Pope Francis, we must not let our joy at the Transfiguration become "spiritual laziness." "We cannot remain on the mountain and enjoy the beauty of this encounter by ourselves," he noted. "Jesus himself brings us back to the valley, amidst our brothers and sisters and into daily life." Spiritual laziness, said the Pope, pushes us to rest in the satisfaction of our own well-being, while ignoring the struggles faced by others. "Going up the mountain does not mean forgetting reality; praying never means avoiding the difficulties of life," he said.

* The Angelus is a special prayer recited by Catholics three times a day, at 6am, noon, and 6pm and is accompanied by the ringing of the Angelus bell. The name comes from the Latin word for Angel and the prayer itself reminds us of how Jesus Christ assumed our human nature through the Mystery of the Incarnation. Also, the Pope recites the Angelus prayer in St Peter's Square every Sunday at midday. He also gives a brief reflection on the Gospel of the day and often comments on some issue of international concern.


