

Gospel – John 10:11-18

Jesus said:

"I am the good shepherd.

A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. A hired man, who is not a shepherd and whose sheep are not his own, sees a wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away, and the wolf catches and scatters them. This is because he works for pay and has no concern for the sheep. I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I will lay down my life for the sheep.

I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. These also I must lead, and they will hear my voice, and there will be one flock, one shepherd. This is why the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down on my own. I have power to lay it down, and power to take it up again. This command I have received from my Father."

From Fr. Mike's Desk

"Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said...'He is the stone rejected by you, the builders, which has become the cornerstone. There is no salvation through anyone else, nor is there any other name under heaven given to the human race by which we are to be saved." In these words, Peter is telling the leaders that they (the Apostles) are being questioned by the leaders because Peter healed a disabled man using only the name of Jesus. He adds that they were the ones who handed Jesus over to death, even though He was the cornerstone of life. It is only in and through His name that they can be saved. As Peter spoke to the leaders over 2000 years ago, so he speaks to us. Peter reminds us that salvation comes through Jesus and there is no other name under heaven by which we can be saved.

For some, this expression might be viewed as a stumbling block, as some might see it as being unfair; for what about the people who do not know Jesus. Are they automatically lost? The answer is no, because while God does indeed bring about salvation through Jesus, God does not actively exclude anyone, because God is the creator and Father of the whole human race. God created all of us out of love and actively calls each of us back to Himself, and, yes, He does this through Jesus. Keep in mind, God accepts all who live according to the Gospel (whether they know it or not) and all who are of good will and seek to do His will. This certainly applies to all of the children and adopted children of Abraham, and most of the world's great religions.

But since we know the name of Jesus and how God shows us His love through His Incarnate Son, it is up to us to help those who do not know Him, to come closer and closer to Jesus. We are to share with the whole world the name of Jesus and, of course, the many titles that we know Him by, especially the title shared with us this weekend; the Good Shepherd. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who protects His sheep and even lays down His life so that they may have life and have it abundantly. As St. John tells us, the Good

Shepherd helps us to realize that we are God's children right now. This Good Shepherd calls all His sheep from all over the globe, and He calls each to do their part. Our part as Christians is to follow Jesus' lead and to shepherd each other. We are called to help each other in the matters of this life and in helping people achieve the life of the Resurrection. Each of us is called to guide and sustain one another, and some of us are called to do this as lay ministers, and some are called to do this through Religious Life or Ordained Ministry. This weekend is one which we traditionally focus on praying for vocations to Ordained Ministry and the Consecrated life. It is very important that we pray for an increase of vocations, but we have to do more than just pray, we have to encourage people to think about the possibility that God is calling them to this way of life. No, it is not for everyone, but I know that God is calling more people to serve the Church than are answering the call. Sometimes all a person needs, is to be invited to think about that possibility; all we have to do is ask! If you believe that God is calling you or someone you know to a vocation for the priesthood, please contact Fr. Sean Magaldi who is the Vocation Director for the Diocese, he can help you in the discernment process and direct you along the way. If you are being called to be a deacon speak to one of our deacons about it. If you are being called to religious life you can speak to one of the Sisters of Mercy or one of the Sisters of St. Dominic who live and work in our area.

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 57 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to the Third Sunday of Easter, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

On Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of Holy Week we did not celebrate the daily morning Mass. The reason for this is, that only the major liturgies of the day are permitted to be celebrated (i.e., *The Mass of the Lord's Supper, The Passion of the Lord, and the Great Vigil of Easter*). However, these days are too important, and we must meet in the morning to pray as a community. So instead, we gather and pray as a group Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours. Those who are in Religious Life and or Ordained Ministry (and those preparing for those roles) are required to pray the Liturgy of the Hours every day. This consist of *The Office of the Readings, Morning and Mid-Day Prayer, Evening Prayer and Night Prayer*. Sometimes we are very good and faithful to this requirement, but sometimes life gets too busy.

But this is the very reason for praying through the hours, so by our taking the time to pray, we focus on God and the building of the Kingdom of God, rather than just letting the material world be our only focus. The Liturgy of the Hours can be prayed by anyone and it is not too difficult to do. Once a person gets into the habit and is taught how to use the books it becomes a regular part of our life.

The other day, while praying Morning Prayer, I was moved by *Psalm 42* (the Liturgy is divided into praying the psalms, canticles, Scripture Readings, and prayers) because it seemed to refer to the situation the world is in right now. In the psalm we read, "Deep is calling on deep, in the roar of the waters: your torrents and your waves swept over me. By day, the Lord will send His loving kindness; by night I will sing to Him, praise the God of my life. I will say to God, my rock: 'Why have you forgotten me? Why do I go mourning, oppressed by the foe?'" As we continue, "'Why are you cast down my soul, why groan within me? Hope in God; I will praise Him still, my savior and my God.'"

The psalmist like us is living in an upside-down world, and while his faith is being questioned by others, and maybe even himself, he decides that he will place his trust totally in God. This thought goes hand in hand with what we celebrated last Sunday as we contemplated the Divine Mercy, and hopefully the same desire to trust in God is what is sustaining us now. Throughout our history, we have struggled with difficult times, and people of faith have gotten through them because we know that no matter what happens, God is with us. The Psalm Prayer following Psalm 42, reads as follows, "Father in heaven, when your strength takes possession of us, we no longer say, 'Why are you cast down my soul?' ...Let us feel the healing calm of your forgiveness. Inspire us to yearn for you always...until you satisfy every longing in heaven."

Use the psalms as prayers that identify and heal your problems and those whom you know, and for people through out the whole world. That is why the psalms are a major part of the Liturgy of the Hours, because when we pray them, we are praying with those who identify with the psalmist's situation. They do indeed help us to focus on more than ourselves.

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This coming Thursday is the Memorial of Saint Catherine of Siena

Catherine of Siena (25 March 1347 – 29 April 1380), was lay member of the Dominican Order. She was a mystic, activist, and author who had a great influence on Italian literature and the Catholic Church. Canonized in 1461, she was also the first woman (along with Teresa of Ávila) to be declared a "Doctor of the Church". Catherine ranks high among the mystics and spiritual writers of the Church. She remains a greatly respected figure for her spiritual writings, and political boldness to "speak truth to power", it being exceptional for a woman, in her time period, to have had such influence in politics and on world history.

2021 is The Year of Saint Joseph

To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker in 1955. This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.

Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by-side in Joseph's carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. In his encyclical Laborem Exercens, Pope John Paul II stated: "the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society."

Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, "The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work."



In celebration of the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius IX's declaration of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church, Pope Francis has proclaimed that 2021 was to be a special "Year of St. Joseph." Pope Francis stated that it is a wonderful opportunity to increase our love for St. Joseph and "to encourage us to implore his intercession and to imitate his virtues and his zeal".

We are celebrating Harvest Houses 35th Birthday!

Over 35 years ago we, the Sisters of St. Dominic, recognized the need for a completely new kind of living forindependent elders. Today, we reflect on what we have learned about life from the more than 100 seniors who have lived in a Harvest House. And as we mark nearly one year since the Pandemic abruptly changed our lives, we've experienced a new mality. COVID-19, the "great revealer" threw us a new learning curve — how do we respond to bje in the oxidet of great odversity and challenges?

Recidents and staff came together during the 'lock-down', planning active days that would bring us enrichment, laughter and peace (we did have a few turnultuous days!) We became so involved in our daily activities that the months and weeks passed calmly and in comfort. Holiday and birthday celebrations with family (via Zoom or our front window) became a "happening" for everyone. We managed together to successfully plan our Easter dinner-now that was a challengel

During the early days and months, we frequently heard from or called Senior friends whom we knew lived alone, to check on them. These calls saddened our hearts: "I am so lonely."..."I am frightened...."What If I get sici?" However, as our residents adjusted to their 'new normal, we heard the following comments: "We are not afraid."..."We are together." And most importantly...."We find asfa and accure."
