The Readings for The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ezekiel 2:2-5

As the LORD spoke to me, the spirit entered into me and set me on my feet,

and I heard the one who was speaking say to me: Son of man, I am sending you to the Israelites, rebels who have rebelled against me;

they and their ancestors have revolted against me to this very day.

Hard of face and obstinate of heart are they to whom I am sending you.

But you shall say to them: Thus says the LORD GOD! And whether they heed or resist—for they are a rebellious house—

they shall know that a prophet has been among them.

Reading 2 – 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

Brothers and sisters:

That I, Paul, might not become too elated, because of the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, an angel of Satan, to beat me, to keep me from being too elated. Three times I begged the Lord about this, that it might leave me, but he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." I will rather boast most gladly of my weaknesses, in order that the power of Christ may dwell with me. Therefore, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong.

Gospel – Mark 6:1-6

Jesus departed from there and came to his native place, accompanied by his disciples. When the sabbath came he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astonished. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What kind of wisdom has been given him? What mighty deeds are wrought by his hands! Is he not the carpenter, the son of Mary, and the brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon? And are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house." So he was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.

From Fr. Mike's Desk

It is not easy to work for God; in fact, as it appears in today's readings it is quite difficult. The Prophet Ezekiel was sent to speak to those who rebelled against God, and he is told by God that they are: "Hard of face and obstinate of heart are they whom I am sending you." You can almost imagine Ezekiel saying to God, thank you may I have another sir! The prophet was not given easy duty, but God entrusted it to him regardless of its outcome, because God wants to give the rebels one more chance to return to Him. As we read, "... whether they heed or resist, they shall know that a prophet has been among them."

Paul in his Second letter to the Corinthians, tells us about the thorn of the flesh that he had to deal with during his life. While many have speculated that this thorn could have been anything from a physical disfigurement to a regular recurrence of malaria which was spreading around the Mediterranean at the time. Some think it might have been partial blindness that he may have suffered when he had the vision of the Risen Christ on the road to Damascus. No one is quite sure as to what it was, and it really does not matter except for the fact that Paul considered it a hindrance in his desire to preach the Gospel even more than he did. While he prayed many times for God to remove this thorn from him, the answered he received from God was, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Paul realizes that this weakness allowed him to enter more deeply into prayer, which gave Paul the grace and the strength to carry out his mission. So, like Ezekiel, Paul's service to God was not easy, but like Ezekiel, Paul knew God was with him.

Jesus comes to His hometown after performing many miracles, especially the two we read about last weekend. Everyplace Jesus went, He attracted a crowd (some who were believers and some who were curiosity seekers as we saw with account of the calming of the sea), but it is totally different in Nazareth. The people there are not pleased with the carpenter's Son and His accomplishments, in fact they do not believe in Him at all. After all, they knew Jesus as a child, they lived in the same town with Mary, His mother; how could Jesus possibly do all these things they were hearing about. They were not looking at Jesus through the eyes of faith, just through the eyes of their experience of the lad who made His parents go back to Jerusalem because He decided to stay behind at the Temple.

There in Nazareth, as in the Court of the Priests in Jerusalem some three years later, Jesus was not believed, and He could not carry out His mission because of their lack of faith. Yes, the rejection at Nazareth and the betrayal in Jerusalem made Jesus' task quite hard to do, yet He never stopped. Jesus relied on the help of His heavenly Father and the Holy Spirit to carry out His saving mission for all, even those who

rebelled and those who refused to believe.

Consider this when it gets tough being a disciple; when the world makes it hard for us to do our part in building the Kingdom of Heaven, and when we see Christians in the Middle East, Africa and other parts of the world being the targets of terrorists because of their faith. If we, like St. Paul, acknowledge our weakness, and doubts and offer them in prayer, we, too, will get closer and closer to God, who will turn our weaknesses to strength and our doubts to confidence and stronger faith. If we realize that, at times, we are like Ezekiel being sent into a den of rebels, then we can know that God will be with us so we can do our part, and they will know that a prophet was sent to them. And when your family or your friends do not want to listen to you about Jesus, just hang in there like Jesus did, for while the work is hard, the rewards are out of this world.

On this weekend of July 4th, we celebrate our nation's 245th Birthday. On July 4, 1776, our Founding Fathers, through *the Declaration of Independence*, told the whole world that the 13 Colonies no longer belong to England, but were now a new nation, *the United States of America*. As we celebrate this great day, let us continue to ask God to bless our country, watch over it and guide it, to protect her from COVID 19, all acts of terror and violence, and to bless and protect those who are serving her in the military, police, fire departments, emergency responders, health care, and to all who serve the people of this One Nation Under God.

God bless America and all of us!

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 67 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to The Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

This Sunday, June 27th, is the birthday of Helen Keller. She was born in Alabama in 1880 and lived to June 1, 1968, she was 88 yrs. of age. Helen was noted for the fact that after a bout with a serious illness at 19 months she lost her sight and her hearing, which had a result of making her unable to speak. There are many different theories as to which disease she contracted, but no one knows for sure, all they know is the results. Helen wrote in her autobiography; it was like being at sea in a dense fog.

At first, she was able to communicate with young Martha Washington, the cook's daughter, through signs that Helen would make for some 60 home items. Helen was able to distinguish people by their footsteps. In 1886, Helen's mother read an account of a woman named Laura Bridgman, who also was deaf and blind but was able to go to school and learn the English Language. Mrs. Keller decided to get help for Helen, and after many searches and going from one doctor to another, they were referred to Alexander Graham Bell, who was working with deaf children at the time. Bell recommended them to the Perkins' Institute for the Blind, the school were Bridgman attended. The school's directors asked Anne Sullivan (one of the alumnae of the school) to become Helen's instructor. Sullivan used a technique which used the fingers to spell words in Helen's hand. Helen at first did not understand what Anne was doing and was unruly, until one day she had to wash her hands, and Anne spelled out on her hand, water. Helen described that experience as her soul coming alive when she realized that the motions Sullivan was making meant water. So excited was she, that she would not let Anne rest until she got to know more words.

Anne Sullivan was her instructor, governess, and eventually her lifelong companion. As Helen aged, she and Anne left for New York to attend school, which would lead her to attending Radcliffe College of Harvard University. As an adult she would not allow anything to stand in her way. She learned how to speak and gave many lectures. She supported many causes for the deaf and the blind, and many other areas of human rights. She did not let her illness and its effects stop her nor would she let them define her. Helen Keller stands as a model for us in this time of confusion and fear. We must not allow COVID19 to define us and while we should still be careful, we must not let fear control us.


A man of great faith, Fr. Paul passed away in Ireland on June 29, on his 91st birthday and on the feast of Saints Peter and Paul.
