## From Fr. Mike's Desk

By the year 1776 there had been several military engagements between British soldiers and American patriots. King George III had declared the colonies to be in rebellion, and more troops were on their way. On April 12<sup>th</sup>, North Carolina authorized its delegates to the Second Continental Congress to cooperate with other colonies who might advocate independence. On June 7<sup>th</sup>, Virginia's Richard Henry Lee proposed "that these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be free and independent States." Despite opposition from conservatives, who did not agree with independence (at least at that time). June 11<sup>th</sup> saw the creation of a committee to draft a declaration of independence. On that committee were: John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman and New York's' Robert *Livingston.* The declaration was to explain to the world the legal reasons why America should be a free and independent nation (according to the politics of the 1700's) Thomas Jefferson's thoughts and style are seen in the completed document and he details all of the ways King George III violated the social contract with the people of the colonies, and as a result the colonies must separate from him and Great Britain.

The Declaration of Independence, concludes the following announcement, with "We. therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions do, in the Name and by the Authority of the good people of these colonies solemnly publish and degree, that these united colonies are and of right ought to be Free And Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is and ought to be totally dissolved..." On July 2<sup>nd</sup>, Congress approved Lee's resolution and cleared the way for the adoption of the Declaration by 12 Colonies on July 4, 1776. New York abstained, but later by July 15<sup>th</sup> received instructions to sign it, and all 13 Colonies signed the document that birth gave to our beloved country.

Our Founding Fathers dealt with the hardships of their day, by rebelling against Great Britain and finding a new nation. However, part of what got them through their decisions and the fighting that followed, was a faith in God and Jesus. Today's Gospel gives us a clear sign of how to deal with hardship and how to continue spreading the Gospel. We see it in Jesus' words, "Come to me all of you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." Jesus is telling us that He is always here to help us, comfort us, and to give us the strength to carry out our calling. We can truly find rest for ourselves in Jesus if we try to accept all He wants to give us. This means we must be childlike, not childish. To be childlike means to be listening to everything and to be willing to take in everything just like a child (who wants to learn all about the world). It means to trust in Jesus and to follow wherever He wants to lead us, and not to be like those who are wise and learned. Now Jesus has nothing against wisdom and learning, but He is speaking about those who think they know it all; those who are so wise that they do not seek the Wisdom of God. Today, so many people believe that since they know the ways of the world, they know everything. But St. Paul reminds us, what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen lasts forever. Meaning to know only the things of the physical universe and think you know all that there is, is to know only half what there is to know. Again, Christ calls us to be open to all He wants to give us and to let go of our fears, preconceived ideas and smugness and truly rest in Him.

As we celebrate America's 244<sup>th</sup> birthday this weekend, we ask the Lord to bless our nation and all who live here, especially this year when we had to deal with the Corona Virus, the loss of so many loved ones, and the loss of jobs and savings. We need to turn to Jesus more than ever and allow Him to take away our burdens and hardships, He is truly there for us for His yoke is easy and His burden light.

## Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 15 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote. The letter is reprinted here for those of you who do not have internet access.

As you know last Saturday, we entered summer. For many it is a great day and a great time of the year. Normally kids love it because school is out, and they now have a great deal of time to do nothing. Some kids love swimming or playing baseball, some like to play video games, and some might even read or work on some research projects. While there are those who just want to catch up on some missed sleep. Of course, when I refer to kids, I also mean adult kids. Summer is a great time to recharge our batteries and for some to earn some extra money. It is a time for us to go away or have a staycation. What ever summer means to you it is most likely to be a little different this year.

It is no surprise that Corona has made changes in how we observe summer, but we cannot allow it to get us totally upset. This year gives us opportunities to try new experiences, and it affords us the time to maybe appreciate what we have, and to thank God for what He has given us before the past three months, and how He helped us get through the past three months. As I write this today is Wednesday June 24<sup>th</sup>, which is the Feast of the Birth of St. John the Baptist. Tradition tells us that John was born six months before Jesus, which if you look at the calendar you will notice that Christmas is six months from today. On the old Julian Calendar Christmas Day was the first day of Winter, while June 24<sup>th</sup> was the first day of Summer. The Church marked these days with the two birthdays celebrations, because of the length of the days. Summer is the longest day of the year, in terms of hours of daylight. So, from the first day of summer to the first day of winter, we continue to lose hours of daylight until we see the Sun setting at 4PM. Likewise, from the first day of winter to the first day of summer, the hours of daylight start growing so that we will eventually see the Sun setting between 8 and 8:30 PM.

What this means in terms of John the Baptist and Jesus is clearly spelled out in the New Testament. When John is asked who he is, he tells the people he is not the Messiah. No, he is the voice crying out in the wilderness to prepare the way of the Lord. He then points out Jesus when He arrives on the scene and John remarks that he must decrease, while He (Jesus) must increase. As we celebrate John's Birthday, we can see the days get longer then shorter. As we celebrate Jesus' Birthday we see the days at first getting shorter, but then they increase and so should Jesus in our hearts and souls. While this time of pandemic is forcing us to change our summer habits, we are encouraged to find new things to do or find new ways to spread our faith (better and faster than the Corona Virus), and like John the Baptist help prepare the way of the Lord. One more point, we are now in Phase 3, let us see what that means for us!

## Registration Info for the 2020-2021 School Year



St. Edward's Religious Education is an 8 year faith formation program. Public School Students are required to begin their religious studies in grade 1 and finish their classes in grade 8.

Preparation for the reception of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion takes place in grades 1 and 2. Students will receive their First Reconciliation in March of grade 2 and their First Holy Communion in May of grade 2. Grades 3 through 6 are required continuation years in students' religious education studies.
Preparation for Confirmation occurs in grades 7 and 8. Students will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in the Fall of grade 9.

Due to the COVID Pandemic, classes in the fall will begin in October with weekly online Google Meet classes. We are planning, however, to resume "in school" weekly classes after the Christmas Break. This will give us the time to "open up" safely.

## **Recognizing Jesus as the Living God**

During his Angelus on the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Pope Francis explained that Simon's name was changed to "rock" when Jesus said: "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church" (Mt. 16: 18). This was not because Peter was a "solid and trustworthy man" rather, because "Jesus is the rock on which Simon became stone." He added that "it is not important to know that Jesus was great in history" nor is it important "to appreciate what He said or did." Rather, what matters is "the place I give Him in my life." In this regard, the Pope invited us to ask ourselves: "How do I arrange my life? Do I think only of the needs of the moment or, do I believe that my real need is Jesus, who makes me a gift? And how do I build life, on my capacities or on the living God?"
