From Fr. Mike's Desk

One of the unique features of the East End of Long Island and sections of upstate New York are the wineries. Who would ever believe that the East End would have the right soil and climate to grow grapes? Many people told those who started the vineyards that they would never succeed, and yet here we are many years later with great wines, and a boost to the East End economy (at least before the COVID 19 decided to visit and move in). Those who built the vineyards would tell you that it was not easy, and that they needed a great deal of work, preparation, and hope. As it is now, so has it always been, when it comes to the vine! The Prophet Isaiah speaks today about his vineyard. He sings to his friends how he picked the best land, spaded it, cleared it of stones, and planted the best vines. He built a watch tower and a wine press and took care of plants and the grapes in every way possible. But when he went out to see and harvest the grapes all he found was wild grapes. As he laments, he asks those who were listening what more could I do? Now disappointed, he will take away the protective hedge, and he will allow the vineyard to be overgrown and be destroyed!

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us about a vineyard whose owner took great care of it and prepared it the same way the owner did in Isaiah's account. The owner leased out portions to tenant farmers, who at harvest time, were to give a portion of their harvest to the owner as rent. So, the owner sent out his servants who were mistreated and even killed. They refused to give the owner his fair share and he got very angry. However, the owner gave the tenants one more chance and he decided to send his son, thinking that they would respect him and honor their pledge. As Jesus tells us, they took the son, threw him out of the vineyard and killed him! Jesus then asked the priests and elders (who were his audience) what should the owner do? They responded that he should put them to death and lease the vineyard to other tenants, and Our Lord tells them they are correct and that is what the owner will do.

Imagine their surprise when He told them that they were the unjust tenants. For the two vineyards are really one and the same, and the unjust tenants and the wild grapes are one and the same. The owner is none other than God the Father, and the wild grapes and tenants are the people and leaders of Israel. In both cases they refused to turn from their sinful ways, which resulted in God removing His support from them. But God does not totally withdraw His protection and care from them. He promised them during the time of the Babylonian Exile that He would deliver them, allow them to come back to Israel, and send them a redeemer. They were indeed returned, but we also know that it was not always easy for them when they returned. They still had difficulties in their relationship with God, and with other nations, especially Greece and Rome. And as we know, God did send them a redeemer who would set them free, and they were to keep watch for Him and welcome Him when He arrived. However, as we see in today's Gospel, they did not, and they treated Him just as they did the prophets who came before Him (as Jesus relates when He tells them how the tenants treated the owner's servants). In killing the owner's son (God's Son) Jesus tells them they will lose everything, be forced out of the vineyard which will be given to new tenants, the Church.

We who listen to the owner's Son are now the tenants, and this time the vineyard is not just one nation or one people, it is the whole world and all people. We must strive to be the best tenants we can be and give the owner all that is His due. We must do our part not to disappoint and do our best to build the Kingdom of God with the Father, the Son and The Holy Spirit. We must follow the advice given to us by Saint Paul in today's letter, read his closing remarks carefully. *"Keep on doing what you have learned, received, and heard and seen in me. Then the God of peace will be with you."*

If today was not a Sunday, we would be celebrating the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi. On that day we usually bless the animals in memory of St. Francis and his love for animals and nature. Today is a very busy day so we will not be able to bless the animals on the actual day of October 4th. So, we will bless the animals on Monday October 5th at 4PM. Please bring the animals you wish to have blessed to the front of the Church at this time. I don't think the animals have to wear masks; however, you do - Sorry.

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 28 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to The 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

On Tuesday September 22nd, the death toll due to COVID 19 reached 200,000 people, the largest number of deaths in any country in the world. While some other nations are also closing in on that number and may even pass the United States, we are still presented with a number that is mind blowing and certainly nothing to be proud of. Of course, even one person's death is one too many. We also keep hearing that the number of confirmed cases keeps rising and the CDC and others fear the number will climb because of the approaching cold weather and the fear of a predicted second wave. What are we to do? Well we are told to keep wearing our masks in public and of course maintain proper social distancing. This does seem to work in many areas, but we also know that it does not work in others. But we must all do our part to limit the spread of the virus.

There is one more activity that we can do, and we know that is prayer. In fact, as Jesus tells us in the Gospels, we should take Heaven by storm with our prayers. Now it is not that God does not know what we need or what we are asking of Him, rather by our constant prayers we show God our sense of commitment to make change happen in our world and even in our own lives. While we cannot change God's mind, as St. Thomas Aquinas tells us, that does not mean that our prayers are in vain. Rather through our prayers God can open our minds and our souls to know what He wants to happen and how we can do our part to make it happen. Remember God always takes a bad situation and turns it into something good for us. So, will our prayers stop the Corona Virus? I believe they will for they will help us deal with it better and help those in the medical field to come up with better treatments and eventually a vaccine. Prayer calls us also to sacrifice, but sacrifice should not be new to us, for Our Lord tells us that we must pick up our cross every day. Just as He took up His Cross and died on it for us. The sacrifice we are called to do is wear a mask (as most of us do), distance from others, and follow the other guidelines that have been published. We have all been asked to endure changes in how we celebrate the Sacraments, but let us thank God that we are able to celebrate them and have our children come to school, and have our Religious Education Students have their classes virtually, until hopefully mid-year when we can return to in person learning.

Yes, we are asked to sacrifice, and yes, we are faced with an almost impossible situation, but we know that we are not facing it on our own. We are in this all together as the Living Body of Christ, and we have all of Heaven on our side. We know that we will also lose loved ones, and maybe we ourselves may get sick, but with God on our side we have nothing to fear even if He calls us home. As I wrote a few weeks ago in this space, we will be with Him. After all this is the goal of our whole life here on Earth. Do not lose hope, do not give into fear, and keep praying.

Registration Info for the 2020-2021 School Year



St. Edward's Religious Education is an 8 year faith formation curriculum for public school children in the parish. Public School Students are required to begin their religious studies in grade 1 and continue their religious formation through grade 8.

Preparation for the reception of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion takes place in grades 1 and 2. Students will receive their First Reconciliation in March of grade 2 and their First Holy Communion later in May of that year. Grades 3 through 6 are required continuation years in religious

education studies. Preparation for Confirmation occurs in grades 7 and 8with the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation in the fall of grade 9.

Due to the COVID Pandemic, RE classes in the fall will delay starting, with Tuesday Lessons starting on Oct. 13th (Wednesday, Oct.14th, Thursday, Oct. 15th and Sunday, Oct. 18th) with weekly online Google Meet grade level sessions. We are hoping to resume "in school" weekly classes after the Christmas Break. This will give us the time necessary to "open up" safely.

Families whose children were enrolled in Religious Education Classes last year should have already received a Re-Registration Form with instructions for re-registration via an email from our Office. If you have not yet received your children's Re-Registration Form, please contact


