Welcome

This mission began with simple moments of compassion — seeing unhoused pet owners sitting in the heat with the dogs they love, and feeling pulled to do something. In the early days, I didn't always have supplies or money. Sometimes I drove home to grab what little I had, only to return and find they were gone. Those moments taught me something important: hesitation can cost someone the help they needed that day. Your courage to act — with love, humility, and kindness — is the heart of this program.

1. What It Means to Be an Ambassador

Ambassadors serve their communities by assembling outreach kits, meeting people where they are, offering supplies, and sharing stories that uplift and inspire. You are an extension of Do His Work — a living reminder that compassion still exists.

2. Assembling Outreach Kits

Bag each kit using a reused grocery bag, brown paper bag with handles, or — when available — a drawstring backpack. These help unhoused individuals carry their dog's items safely.

Core items include bagged dry food, 1–2 cans of wet food, treats, toys, and waste bags. Blankets are optional but appreciated during colder months.

3. Document the Journey

We love seeing your process — photos and videos of assembling kits or handing them out help inspire others. This can be done solo or with family, coworkers, churches, or adult volunteer groups.

4. Ambassador Hacks — Saving Money & Stretching Resources

- Thrift stores often have bowls, blankets, toys, and backpacks for very low cost.
- Reuse items from your home — holiday gift bags, old backpacks, gently used blankets and toys.

- Dollar stores offer wipes, snacks, poop bags, and other small essentials.
- Ask friends, neighbors, or coworkers for unused pet supplies — leashes, collars, toys, bowls.
- Churches, offices, and adult volunteer groups may be willing to collect items as a service project.

5. Approaching Interactions

If recording a video, you may introduce yourself by saying: “I’m an Ambassador with Do His Work and I brought some gifts for your dog(s).” If comfortable, ask the person’s name and their dog’s name — it makes the interaction personal and heartfelt.

6. Sharing Updates

Send your updates as they happen — fresh stories capture real emotion and help others feel connected to the mission.

7. Safety Reminders

- Always ask permission before filming or handing out supplies.
- Never enter tents, vehicles, or personal spaces.
- Offer only what seems appropriate for that specific pet.
- Walk away immediately from anything that feels unsafe.

8. Group Opportunities (18+)

Businesses, churches, offices, and adult volunteer groups (18+) may participate by assembling kits or joining Ambassador outreach days. Organizers may reach out to Michael to schedule a planning call for structure, guidance, and support.
