What is Epiphany?

Epiphany means 'revealing' or 'showing forth," and begins with the showing of Jesus to the Gentiles, specifically to the wise men of Matthew's Gospel. We see the story of the visit of the Wise Men from the East. In many countries, January 6th, the date of the Epiphany, is still a time to give and received gifts. The Magi, in all their splendor, did not think themselves to lofty or important to seek out He who was to become the Ling of Lings, to worship at His feet, or to present His with gifts. The gifts of the Magi remind us of what we can offer the Christ Child. The Wise Men sought Jesus out after His birth ... and wise men still seek Him.



Stained Glass - Epiphany

As you face the aftar, on the feft, the third set of three window's represent the Epiphany season. The medalhon with the hiles is for purity, innocence, immortality, and a symbol for Mary. The three crowns suggest the Mise Men or Magi.

The center medalhon is the sacrament of Annointing of the Fick as symbolized by the dove and healing power of prayer and presence of the Holy Spirit. The three crosses represent the anointing by the sign of the cross with consecrated oil.

The Eucharistic candles, the coming of Christ in the Eucharist.

The fast medalfion in this set contains more symbols of the Epiphany season. The vine and branches representing the new relationship between God and man. An orb depicts the world with the cross symbolizing the spread of the gospel throughout the world. The lower border is green for the color of the Epiphany season and represents hope, regeneration, and fertility. As spring follows the dead of winter, so does life triumph over death.

Iona Bible & Preaching Classes (Saturday, January 11th- Sunday, June 1st)

Our diocese has partnered with the Iona Collaborative at Seminary of the Southwest to offer these free, high-quality formation classes for everyone. Our first classes, which will run January - May 2025, are **Bible** & **Preaching** and will be taught by Rev. Katy Shedlock. The **Bible** class will meet monthly on January 11, February 8, March 8, April 12, and May 10 (all Saturdays) on Zoom from 10-12. You may enroll in just the Bible class, which will be a survey of the New Testament (we will offer the Old Testament in the fall). The **Preaching** class will meet weekly on Thursdays on Zoom from 7-8:30 (full dates below). If you enroll in the Preaching class, you must also enroll in the Bible class. The Preaching class will teach you how to prepare and deliver a sermon and we will focus on practicing the art and craft of preaching together.

No previous experience is necessary! The classes are free. However, you will need to purchase some supplies and for preaching students, we will conclude the class with an in-person retreat at Immaculate Heart Retreat Center, for which there will be a cost.
