### Something to think about.....

When Thomas Cranmer, the 16th Century Archbishop of Canterbury, created Morning and Evening prayer it was meant to be a daily service in preparation for the Eucharist.

Morning Prayer has structure and meaning. The opening sentences are concerned with preparing us to worship. It helps form a bridge from the diversity out of which each of us comes to the single focus of a community at worship.

The content of the Morning Prayer service is basically in four stages.

- 1. We give thanks with the Jubilate and Venite.
- 2. We give God praise through the Psalms.
  - 3. We hear his word from the Gospel
- 4. We ask those things necessary for life and salvation through prayers

And we end with the General Thanksgiving which makes the service come into a complete circle; . . . Where we begin there we end—with the praise of God.

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

That the basic theme of our stained glass windows are the seven church seasons and the seven Sacraments?

#### The Lenten windows

As you face the altar, on the left, the fourth set of three windows, behind the organ, represent the Lenten season which began on February 25, Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Eve.

The pillar or column with the ring and the flagrum symbolize Christ's passion. The rooster is the symbol for St. Peter and contains a warning for steadfastness of faith.

The center medallion is the Sacrament of Penance, which prepares us for the forgiveness of our sins. The keys as the keys to the Kingdom. The Celtic cross is symbolic that we can only receive absolution and forgiveness through Christ.

The third medallion with cross and shroud and three nails depict the nails driven through the palms and feet of Jesus. The crown of thorns are all symbols of Christ's humiliation and suffering.

The seasonal color along the lower border is purple.


To worship at Morning Prayer with the Community of St. Andrew's is important because retaining the sense of community and what it means to individuals, and to the larger community, is essential if the church is to be alive and in recognition and thanksgiving for the Source of Life.

Saint Patrick, the national saint of Ireland, is revered in all the countries to which the Irish have emigrated. Born into a Christian family in Roman Britain about 400 BC. At the age of sixteen he was carried off as a slave to Ireland. He escaped after six years determined to become a priest. He returned some years later as a bishop probably to a Christian community in the northeast of Ireland. He traveled widely to bring the gospel to those who had not heard it, causing in the process opposition from his fellow bishops in Britian. He showed forgiveness to the Scottish warlord who had kidnapped and killed some of Patrick's new converts. He is known as the saint of forgiveness.


His writings reveal him as a man of determination and humility with a deep trust in God, rather than a learned scholar. He died about 461 in County Down, Ireland.

After his death many legends grew up around Patrick. One was that he explained the Trinity by reference to the shamrock, another that he expelled all snakes from Ireland.
