(Chelan) – July 27 – After missing a year due to the Coronavirus pandemic, St. Andrew's church women pulled out the baking pans and electric mixers to amass a plethora of home-made cookies to sell at the recent Chelan Bach Fest concert.

The cookies were sold three-for-a-dollar, which has to be an all-time bargain, netting the committee \$374 for local community volunteer programs such as: Bach Fest artists, Tender Loving Care, Community Nurse Program and the Lake Chelan Food Bank.



Chelan's Bradley Family Lands in Africa on Healthcare Mission

Visiting surgeons trade places in Galmi, Niger with another surgeon now in Chelan

(CHELAN, WA) In a former French colony, two families have switched medical roles. Dr. Tabatha and Luke Hale-Bradley and their three children have moved to Sub-Sahara Africa while Drs. Stacy (Harms) and Aaron Zabriskie moved with their two children to Chelan and into the vacant post at Lake Chelan Health.

The Bradleys first lived in Niger (pronounced nee - jerh') from 2013-14 before they started their family. This is their first foray to Africa as a complete group of five with Juliet, Timmy and Winnie in tow.

Their new home is located at Galmi Hospital which is located more than eight hours east of the capitol of Niamey, in the rural part of the country far from services and supplies.

"Tabatha and I were there last March, 2020," Luke said. "We fortunately did not bring the children, as we almost didn't make it home due to the descending Coronavirus pandemic."

"We've been contemplating taking a long trip back to Galmi for a couple of years, now. However, the right time never came along. I think the right time never seems to come along until you just decide it *is* the right time."

"We are thankful that Tabatha was able to take a leave of absence from her job (at Chelan Health). We were also blessed to find (the Zabriskes) to fill in while she is gone," Luke added. "We plan to switch back in November, however."



The country of Niger fell victim to a series of coups and general political instability following its independence from France in 1960. Today, the country struggles in the face of frequent droughts, insurgency and wide-spread poverty. Niger is betting on increased oil exploration and gold mining will help modernize its economy. It also depends on foreign nationals to support its meager health system.

Newly arrived in Chelan are the Zabriskies, Stacy, Aaron and their two children.
