The St. Andrew's Outreach Fund has grown to over \$2,300 through donations by those participating in the Yogafit and other users of the parish hall. At their last meeting the vestry voted to distribute \$1,000 each to Chelan Valley Hope (which aids families in crisis situations) and the Lake Chelan Teen Center (located in the Methodist Church). Both organizations fill a great need to citizens of our valley. The Chelan Valley Hope director also expressed a need for nonfood items to be shared with the families they assist. Some of these items are: soaps (bath, laundry, dish) shampoo, large size baby diapers, paper towels, TP, toothpaste, etc. We will have a box in the parish hall for such donations — and it will be ongoing throughout the next year.
