Bishop's Committee News:

- 1. Format for Church Service—Service will continue with Holy Eucharist.
- 2. **Coffee Hour**—There will be no coffee hour in Parish Hall at this time.
- 3. **Walla Walla Fundraiser**—St. Paul's in Walla Walla held a fundraiser to assist people with delinquent medical bills. The fundraiser was very successful!
- 4. **College for Congregational Development Virtual August Workshops**—Aug 5 at 12:00 p.m. Aug 6 at 4:00 p.m. Everyone may attend!!!
- 5. **Convention Delegates**—need to register online. Everyone is invited to attend virtually. There is no cost for registration. Convention is scheduled for 3.5 hours.
- 6. "Woven as One"—a fundraising campaign to upgrade Camp Cross. Everyone is encouraged to support this fundraising as they are able to financially.
- 7. **Maintenance—Rimmer and Roeter Estimate---**Bob B submitted an estimate for repairs to the logs of the church in the amount of \$12,337.00. We approved the expense for repair of the logs on the church building.
- 8. **Weed and Pest Spray**—Everything was sprayed by Cascade Weed and Pest for ants and spiders in May and they are prepared to do it again by the end of July or the 1st of August. Bob noticed that a hose bib is leaking and he will see to the irrigation repair
- 9. **Damage to Front Door**—Over the 4th of July weekend, the front door of the church was ripped out of place—stripping out the screws. Repairs are being arranged. Bob said there were lots of beer cans on the grounds as well.
- 10. **Outreach—Food Bank**—Beginning August 1st, volunteers will be starting a Tuesday and Saturday delivery service and pick-up. Andante's will be doing their Monday meals three more times.
- 11. **Mural report** Marci called Jill Risley on Monday for a possible work schedule to complete our mural project. Jill called back to report that Bill Fenton has made contact with Larry Hibbard to verify the exact procedure by which the mural panels can be attached to the brick wall. Bill has his own scaffolding and does not need help. He hopes to get started with the final assemble and mounting this coming week.

And when the weather was cold Grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas and been shelled, it carried out the hulls.


In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.




Don Jamtaas
