LIFE LEASE

The Garden Park Tower, owned and operated by the Clearbrook Golden Age Society, is a unique and caring community, created to make a difference in the lives of seniors. Garden Park Tower is viewed by many in the community as a desirable place to live. Many of the residents know of Garden Park Tower through word of mouth or because a relative or friend resided here. Others find out about GPT through the services offered onsite, i.e. Life Labs, Hair Care, Carpet Bowling, the Rose Room, etc., and are pleasantly surprised to find out that there is a seniors' residence here as well. This is usually when they come and meet with me.

Once I have given them a tour of the building and shown them whichever unit is available for viewing, the feedback I receive has always been positive. I would like to thank the many residents that we encounter on these tours as their warmth and kindness shines through as they greet our guest/potential residents making them feel welcomed and excited at the possibility of becoming a part of this unique community.

Needless to say, our waiting list is fluid, and continues to grow. Last year, in 2023, thirteen units were sold and 24 new residents have made GPT their home. The ages of the residents living here vary from mid 60s to 90s; the average age of residents is late 70s and 80s. What is consistent with what I have been told by prospective residents, is that they preferred to stay in their homes for as long as they could. When they feel that they can no



longer physically maintain their homes, i.e. mowing the lawn, doing handyman repairs, stairs are becoming an issue, doing household chores becomes difficult, that is when they begin to look at other options.

They may have health issues (which develop as we age) but their health issues do not prevent them from living independent lives and they say that they are not ready to move into an assisted-living facility. Once settled in, quite a few will volunteer their services assisting in the office, Rose Room and in other areas that they have an interest in, and their volunteer efforts are much appreciated. Garden Park Tower suits their needs; providing them with a caring Judeo-Christian community in a well maintained building and enables them to live independently and enjoy their senior years.

VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR

At one point in time, CGAS was mainly run by volunteers. There was a push to have as many volunteers as possible in order to reduce the payroll in order to pay the Garden Park Tower mortgage. The mortgage was paid off in 2022 and it seems like the volunteer program started to dwindle since then. However, seniors serving seniors is still a very good good motto for CGAS to live by because it utilizes seniors and gives purpose and enhances mental health. Of course, using younger people as volunteers is fine and will happen, especially for jobs that seniors cannot perform. There is definitely a need to revitalize our volunteer program.

In the December 13, CGAS Board of Directors meeting, it was voted to open a new position in CGAS for a Volunteer Coordinator. In order to strengthen our volunteer base and our community service, volunteers need special attention for the wonderful work that they do. Some of the things that are needed is vetting, orientation, ensure job descriptions are written for them, recognition, showing appreciation, and retention. The full job description was presented to the board and approved for the best interest of the Clearbook Golden Age Society.

Once the position and job description was approved, a candidate was presented to fulfill this role. Ken Brake was introduced to the board as a person who would be highly qualified for this position. The board members were sent Ken's resume two weeks in advance of the meeting. it was voted to hire Ken Brake as a Volunteer Coordinator Volunteer. That is right, he himself is a volunteer. You can read his bio on the next page.

So what will a volunteer coordinator do, you may ask? Here are a few duties but not exhaustive list of things that a person in such a position at CGAS may do.

-Identify the need of volunteers in each department and potential opportunities,

-Recruit, interview, screen, train,

-Match skill set with the opportunities,

-Ensure proper supervision is given where they work,

-Regular communication with volunteers,

-Maintain files, records, applications and other data concerning the volunteer program,

-Recommend updates to the volunteer policy to the appropriate committees,

-Coordinate volunteer recognition and appreciation events and activities,

-Coordinate with other local senior volunteer organization and activities,

This list is only a selection of some duties from a longer list with more details on the actual job description approved by the board. Of course, the job description will be adjusted as need be for this new position.

SENIOR SAFETY



In the "Investing in People for a Better Tomorrow" (IPBT) project that CGAS has undertaken with grant funds we applied for, one of the components to implement is the Senior Safety Plan. In that plan, among other items, is the installation of a AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFRIBELLATOR (AED) on the main floor. As you see in the picture, it was installed right beside the Fire Safety Plan by the main entrance.

Some of you may ask, why do we need this equipment? AEDs are used to revive someone from sudden cardiac arrest. This usually occurs when a disruption in the heart's electrical activity causes a dangerously fast heartbeat (ventricular tachycardia) or a fast and irregular heartbeat (ventricular fibrillation). Either of these irregular heart rhythms keeps the heart from pumping effectively and can cause it to stop. When this happens, the brain and other vital organs don't get the blood and oxygen they need. This requires treatment within minutes to prevent death. The sooner the heart's rhythm is restored, the greater the chance there won't be permanent damage to the brain and other organs.

If an AED is near someone having ventricular fibrillation or ventricular tachycardia, a bystander in a public place or a family member can use it to jolt the heart back to a regular rhythm. Using the AED could possibly save a life.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) after cardiac arrest can keep blood flowing to the heart and brain for a time. But often only defibrillation can restore the heart's rhythm. Together these treatments can improve the chances of survival.

If you go to Superstore, or Walmart or the Sevenoaks mall, you will find these in different areas where there are people. Since we have a high traffic of people on the main floor, it was identied as the best place to have such an apparatus. Of course, we hope we don't have to use it but just in case, we want to know that we were able to save someone's life with the AED.

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MAINTENANCE 2024




