# Housekeeping notes for Garden Park residents.

1. The corona virus is still with us and we still need to wear masks, keep our distance, wash our hands and use the sanitizers. Every effort is being made to have a vaccination station at GPT. This is scheduled to happen early in March.

Note the following about the vehicle entry gate in parkade level 1. To provide security for all the residents, it is important to remain at the gate until it closes. When you are leaving, it is not necessary to wait if another vehicle is behind you. When you are entering and another vehicle is behind you, you should wait until the gate starts to lower and the one behind you can then press the button to open the gate. Be patient and considerate.
Control the elevator doors correctly. The screen that prevents a person from being squeezed by the door was damaged and this is caused when the door is held open by a person standing in the door opening. If a person needs extra time to exit or enter, press the open button, but please do not hold the door open to have a discussion.

Residents Council and the Society Board are preparing for their respective AGMs. A major concern is that the Nominating Committees have not been able to fill the vacant positions with names for the upcoming Annual General Meetings, which will again be held virtually. #### **Dangerous Challenge to Freedom**

In his excellent book entitled *Christ Among Other Gods*, author Erwin Lutzer makes one of the most insightful



statements I have recently read or heard. He states that "We have moved from the conviction that everyone has a right to his own opinion to the notion that every opinion is equally right." (*page 30*) Equally profound is his related statement that the new tolerance "includes every point of view except those points of view that do not include every point of view." (*page 29*)

This new tolerance which tends to denigrate any point of view which holds that some values are much

better than others must be opposed for what it is, namely, an assault on true freedom. Increasingly in modern society those of us who hold to some moral values and reject others are labelled as intolerant. To differ from some widely affirmed moral stance is now often denounced as bigotry or worse.

Consider the following. Opinion polls tell us that most Canadians now support same-sex marriage, a peculiar spousal relationship which, as we know, has been legalized in Canada. Should this mean that anyone who believes that same-sex marriage is not good for society should not be allowed to express such views? According to any reasonable definition of freedom the response must be "Of course not! In a free society dissenting views have full place." But in the new view of freedom increasingly promoted in education, politics, the media, and entertainment, such a differing view has no place. Freedom is granted only to those who conform.

Similarly, take the case of support for abortion. Canada is the only developed democracy in the world where there is no legal limit placed on abortion. Many of us, while acknowledging the case for abortion in certain situations, generally oppose such taking of life. But to make a such a statement in public today risks being denounced as intolerant, anti-feminist, or worse. One finds virtually no place for reasoned discourse about this massive genocide of the very young. Even in the Canadian Parliament no discussion of abortion is permitted. Even Conservative Party leaders won't allow it. So great is their fear of the new intolerance.

The situation involving the still relatively new education curriculum called SOGI (Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity) is similar. Some of us, presumably most of us if parents truly understood what is being taught, disagree with the SOGI tenet that even in kindergarten and grade 1, children shall "pretend that they had two moms or two dads" and shall draw a picture of themselves having "two moms or dads". For such young children this teaching is confusing at best and devastating at worst.

I, for one, along with many others also disagree deeply with the SOGI insistence that if a child in elementary or high school decides to live as a person of the opposite sex, "school personnel should not disclose" this development to other "students, parents" or anyone else. I think that parents have a right to know. This has nothing to do with bullying, opposition to which is touted as the great justification for the entire SOGI agenda.

This is intolerance! It is also a not very subtle teaching of the homosexual agenda. I think that parents have a right to know and I also think that I have a right to object to such abuse of children. I have the right to do so without being called homophobic, Neanderthal, or bigoted.

The tide is running against honest and true tolerance and freedom. Intolerance, loudly championed in the name of tolerance, is becoming the norm. Canadians need to challenge this growing intolerance. It is intrinsically wrong.

We need to denounce it for the evil that it is. We also need to challenge it before it turns its wrath against people who hold to a religious faith that differs from majority beliefs. *John H. Redekop*

The first is that if you get a phone call from an 800 number or during which you are asked to call an 800 number, you are being subjected to a scam. A regular business informing you of any problem with your account or any other matter pertaining to you will not use an 800 number. Hang up and if you got the number or any other relevant information, then contact infor@phonebusters.com to report the fraud. That agency deals with scams.

Second, you may get a call from a 304 area code. Perhaps this criminal outfit will also use some other area code. In any case, the first words you are likely to hear are "Can you hear me?" The caller wants you to answer with a Yes. That Yes is then slated to be put together with a false order and you may end up being charged for some major purchases. One lady, who had fortunately been warned of this scam, reported her conversation in such a situation.

#### **Health Hints Editor's Note:**

(Adapted from an Information Bulletin circulated by the Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, DC.) Do not drink water kept in a plastic bottle water if it has been left in a car where it would get quite warm or anywhere else where the plastic bottle would be heated. The heat reacts with the chemicals in the plastic which in some or even most cases releases toxin into the water. Such toxin is increasingly found in cancer tissue, especially in breast cancers. If there is a possibility that water in a bottle will be heated, then use only a glass bottle or a stainless-steel canteen.
