During this year's 5th annual meeting we are blessed to have Aunty Lynette Kahekili Kaopuiki Paglinawan as our invited guest presenter. As a Hawaiian healing practitioner, Aunty Lynette is deeply rooted in the ancestral knowledge of her Hawaiian culture. She is a student of noted Hawaiian scholar Tutu Mary Kawena Pukui. She is well known, and acknowledged, for her decades of teaching Ho`oponopono in the community, and at the University of Hawaii. She has been a member of the Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work's Hawaiian Learning Program at the University of Hawaii'i at Mānoa. Aunty Lynette teaches a comprehensive Hawaiian world view, and way of living, which includes being in harmony with one's self, with family, with others in the community, with nature and with the unseen spiritual world. She has received many awards from community organizations for her significant contributions in teaching and healing work. She is actively teaching in the University of Hawaii, West Oahu Campus, Hawaiian and Indigenous Health and Healing Program which leads students to a Bachelor of Applied Science degree. In 2012 she was recognized as a Hawaii Living Treasure by the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i. Like Reverend Aoki, Aunty Lynette lives an authentic integral life of service to others.
