

Recognition of Community Service

We are honored to recognize the outstanding achievements of Dr. Pat Nishimoto, FAAN, FT and Dr. Rae Seitz, MD as our 2023 Mitsuo Aoki Community Service Award recipients.



Dr. Patricia Nishimoto, DNS, FAAN, FT recently retired as the Adult Oncology Clinical Nurse Specialist and Palliative Care Nurse at Tripler Army Medical Center where she worked as a civilian from 1986 to 2021. She also had an outstanding career as a US Army Reserve Nurse for 33 years and 10 months, humorously describing herself as "an old Army nurse". "Dr. Pat" as she is affectionately called, is one of the most knowledgeable palliative care nurses in the state of Hawaii and has been is sought out as a speaker here in Hawaii, nationally and internationally. She has trained thousands of professionals including interns, residents, fellows, nurses, psychologists and social workers. She has written numerous articles and book chapters related to care of oncology patients and their families, and has been intimately involved with research throughout her career. Dr. Pat actively participated with the American Cancer Society and developed the "Oncology on

Canvas" creative arts program allowing hundreds of people with cancer and their families to express their thoughts and emotions on their cancer journey through art. Her patients have been her teachers. Pat generously volunteers and gives back through the community with Kokua Mau, and multiple other organizations in Hawaii and nationally.



Dr. Rae Seitz has been a leader in Hawaii in the field of palliative care medicine for over 20 years since her graduation from the UH John Burns School of Medicine and her Faculty Scholar Program in palliative and hospice medicine at Harvard Medical School in 2001. Following her training she went on to become one of Hawai'i's first board certified palliative care specialists and has provided care to thousands of Hawaii's individuals and families with serious illnesses through her medical practice and through the programs she designed and developed through Kaiser Permanente Hawaii and HMSA. She was instrumental in the implementation of the Our Care, Our Choice Act for Hawaii reducing the suffering of those choosing to have control over their final time of life. She has taught thousands in palliative care and end of life throughout Hawaii, nationally and internationally. She is a founding board member of Hawai'i's palliative and hospice care

organization. In 2013 she was of the top 30 visionaries in the field of Hospice and Palliative Medicine by the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine. As the CEO for Hui Pohala, she is leading the way to develop and train professionals from Hawaii to become knowledgeable and increasingly competent in the field of palliative care. She is a Consultant for I Kua Na'u "Let Me Carry Out Your Last Wishes", Advance Care Planning for Native Hawaiian Elders.

Bringing Forth the Light and Wisdom Dialogue

Bringing forth the Light and Wisdom of old to benefit present and future generations our esteemed teachers and mentors, Dr. Claire Hughes, Linda Kaleo Paik and Dr. Noreen Mokuau will lead our dialogue about the importance of being rooted in one's culture, and looking to past ancestral knowledge, in order to know who we are now and using this awareness as a foundation, and as a compass, to grow into the future. Noreen co-authored, and Claire and Kaleo are featured in, a new book, <u>Ka Mano Wai: The Source of Life</u> published by University of Hawaii Press.



Dr. Claire Ku`uleilani Hughes has a lifelong commitment to improving our health by turning to Hawaiian foods. She is well recognized as a premier expert on the traditional Hawaiian diet and its implications for culturally relevant promotion of health. She has initiated, and collaborated on, numerous Hawaiian health initiatives. She worked with Dr. Kekuni Blaisdell and Dr. Emmett Aluli, whom she considers her teachers and mentors, on projects such as the Molokai Diet Study. She consulted with Dr. Terry Shintani on the Waianae Diet Program and the State of Hawaii Department of Health and the Native Hawaiian Health Care System. She was the first Native Hawaiian registered dietician in 1959, and first Native Hawaiian branch chief of the Nutrition Branch of the State of Hawaii, Department of Health. She is well known for her health column in Ka Wai Ola the newspaper of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Dr. Hughes has been recognized with numerous awards for her life work in nutrition and the Hawaiian culture.



Linda Kaleo Paik is a Hawaiian cultural practitioner who loves to sing and uses her voice to also advocate for causes that she defines as "malama kupuna, care for the elders and ancestors, and malama aina, care for the land." Growing up in South Kona, Kaleo learned Hawaiian ways and practices from her family, in particular from her father. One such complex practice is related to helping loved ones in the passing from life to death. In her family, she was chosen to carry on this practice and in accepting this kuleana she stated ""the task is quite sacred in all its dimensions." One aspect of this kuleana is her involvement with the Oahu Island Burial Council and cultural practices associated with repatriated iwi.



Dr. Noreen Kehaulani Mokuau Dr. Noreen Kehaulani Mokuau is Professor Emerita and Retired Dean of the Thompson School of Social Work & Public Health at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She presently serves as an MPI, along with Dr. Jerris Hedges, of a National Institutes of Health grant on health disparities in Hawaii. Her life work is in educational and research excellence that uplifts and benefits the people of Hawaii, with a special interest in Native Hawaiians. Dr. Mokuau has edited three books, published numerous journal articles, book chapters and technical reports, and given many presentations on cultural competency and social services for Native Hawaiians, Pacific Islanders and Asian Americans. Her foundation has been her genealogical linkages to people and places. She believes when she gives talks that all of her family members, past, present and future, stand with her in the sharing of stories and information. She believes that our ancestoral past holds deep reservoirs of information that can benefit people today and tomorrow.

- 3. Assisting terminal patients to make wise use of a variety of healing and health-promoting practices
- 4. Providing a warm and supportive environment for the individual undergoing the dying process
- 5. Furthering the awareness within persons of their relationship to God and to their neighbors.
