ZOR NOBLES VOTE TO AUTHORIZE SALE OF SHRINE CENTER

Zor's first digital membership meeting gave almost unanimous support the sale of the current Zor Temple in Madison. By a similar margin, the members established a Task Force to study Zor's space needs and recommend future solutions.

The special membership meeting involved the first use of digital internet technology to allow Nobles throughout Zor's territory to participate without traveling to Madison. About a third of the participants joined over the internet.

Nobles heard presentations from Recorder and Past Potentate Robert Gorsuch and the writer of this article, Second Ceremonial Master Mark Hazelbaker.

Illustrious Noble Gorsuch noted that Zor's 9-acre parcel had increased in value because of the current strong real estate market. But, while the real estate may be worth a substantial amount, it does not generate any income. Dwindling membership, increasing costs and



declining fund raising all have led to Zor running an operating deficit. If the real estate were sold and invested, the income should make it possible for Zor to continue its fraternal operations for many years.

Hazelbaker offered three reasons to sell the Zor Shrine temple – it is not needed; we cannot afford it, and sale will allow us to focus on our true purpose of charity and fun. He noted that there are fewer than two dozen Shrine meetings a year at the Temple. But, the building costs Zor more than \$53,000 a year to operate – almost equal to the \$63,000 of dues revenue received each year. Most Zor members are not interested in paying dues to support a building which is rarely used, he said.

By selling the Shrine Temple, Zor should benefit from significant investment income. That income, coupled with restructuring operations, will permit Zor to reduce the current emphasis on fundraising. We will still be out there raising money!

"No one, including me, really wants to sell our property," said Potentate Wally Trouten "It's a tough decision which we need to face. Now comes the exciting part – finding the way to meet our needs."

It's important to note that selling the property is a transition, not an end. It's the beginning of the next phase of Zor's history. We need to decide what to do for Zor's events and operations after the sale. For that reason, the Nobles also voted to create a 7-member task force which will study Zor's long term space needs and make a recommendation to the Nobles. Past Potentate and Past Grand Master Steve Willett will lead the Task Force.

There are many options open to Zor – building or buying a new building; renting space; sharing space in a Masonic building, or some combination, are all possible. The goal is not just to take the money

and sit on it. Rather, it is to meet the needs of 21st Century Zor with new facilities and programs.

The Task Force has to deal with complex issues — where should which functions occur? How much office space does Zor need? Where will the Directors Staff keep all the props they have accumulated? The answers will come.

The vote does not mean that the building will be sold tomorrow or even in a few months. There are expressions of interest in the land, but no firm offers. Once Zor accepts an offer, the buyer will need substantial time to go through pre-purchase activities. Almost any change in the use of the property will require approval by the City of Madison, which is a lengthy process. It is likely Zor will be in the building for some time, probably as much as two years.

The discussion at the special membership meeting reflected a sober consensus. No one is happy to face the changes ahead. But Zor members showed they are reasonable and understand hard facts. Sometimes we have to make difficult choices to move ahead. This is one of those situations.

We officially have a new home! After a great deal of planning and searching, we will be moving to a new building in the City Place Development in Woodbury, Minnesota, an eastern suburb of St. Paul, Minnesota, by the summer of 2020. This move is a step in our transition to an outpatient clinic model. Construction of our new site will begin later this summer and continue into the middle of next year. The current site will be sold as the transition to the new site is completed.

Ease of highway access, proximity to other local area amenities, first floor access and the opportunity to design and build out space incorporating the knowledge gained from 96 years of service, were all elements that influenced the selection of the site and the timing of this transition. Developing a new site is a special opportunity to create a patient-centered environment for the modern era. The new site will continue to serve children from a seven-state service area.

Shriners Healthcare for Children's new facility will provide a wide range of services for children with orthopaedic conditions including:

- Clinic Services: providing a family-centered, team approach to care. Patients will seespecialty physicians, nurses, therapists and other pediatric-trained specialists in anenvironment designed for children.
- Child Life: providing families with support during appointments through play and anxietycoping activities. The Child Life program also offers over twenty (20) camps andprograms to meet the physical and emotional needs of children with orthopaedicconditions.
- Radiology: providing standard x-ray service as well as EOS, which
 provides 3-D, full-body imaging with up to 85 percent lower
 radiation.
- Rehabilitation: providing physical and occupational therapy to help children build skills, strength and mobility needed for everyday activities.
 - Scoliosis Specific Exercise a specialized physical therapy program that usesexercises, stretching and breathing to improve a patient's scoliotic posture.





"The new clinic model incorporates physicians visits, radiology, orthotics, prosthetics, rehabilitation along with telehealth and offsite clinic operations."

Shriners surgeons now perform the majority of procedures at the Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare in the Twin Cities.

"With these changes, they are committed to their mission" said Hering, adding "We want to ensure the patients to become as healthy, active and independent as possible, regardless of a family's ability to pay."

Just some of the numbers from last year at the SHC – TC are:

- 2,978 unique patients of which 1,015 were new patients
- 462 surgeries
- 2,796 orthoses and prosthesis were made
- 35 outreach screening clinics
- 22 specialty camps and events

The Shriners Healthcare for Children Twin Cities handles Orthopaedic Treatment Specialities but not limited to-

- Arthrogryposis stiff joints
- Cerebral palsy
- Club foot
- Hip disorder
- Juvenile rheumatoid arthritis
- Limb deficiencies and deformities
- Osteogenesis Imperfecta brittle bones
- Rickets
- Specialized plastic surgery/ scar revisions
- Spina bifida/ myelodysplasia
- Spine deformities scoliosis
- Sports injuries stable fractures

In 2019 they are working to develop and expand a network of outreach sites. Shriners is seeking to introduce telehealth services and an outreach model that offers more frequent clinic but also smaller clinics in remote areas. The whole intent is to promote more points of access with greater frequency. This model will replace the larger annual or biannual patients visits in the past. They will create more access to service for kids and minimize the cost of transportation while developing high – quality and specialty services. Shriners will continue to provide the special, wrap around care that is a hallmark of Shriners service.




