Grant Raises Money for Shriners

March 22nd became a very memorable day for the Divan and Ladies attending the day's event. Tours of the hospital facilities were given in the morning followed by a nice luncheon before the Divan Seminar that filled the afternoon agenda. These are a few comments from the Divan attending:

Marshal Chuck Miller & Lady Sharon are so thankful for being invited to the Chicago Hospital Divan meeting. "We have attended the open house and hospital tours at the Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Chicago before. But we learn something new, each and every time we attend. We were so amazed, impressed and surprised by all the extra care the hospitals give. We were not aware of all the programs they use for recreational therapy, swimming, hiking, interactive computer games, mountain climbing, skiing... just some of the activities used to give our patients a CAN DO attitude. All the work that is done after the surgery is as important as the surgery itself.

"Shriners Hospitals for Children® works with these amazing kids so they can be all they can be. From the creation of

tools to assist them in dressing themselves, to the invention of machines to help them walk again - even guiding them on the proper nutrition and exercise programs, our hospitals treat each child to their unique needs.

"I'm proud to be a Shriner, my Lady is proud that her husband is a Shriner, and we encourage all Nobles and their Ladies to attend these open houses as often as possible."

Outer Guard Wally Trouten's first visit to our hospitals was an eye opener. "I guess I was expecting a building a little bigger and older than what I saw. Also, I was expecting something a little more "hospital-like" when we entered the lobby. The atmosphere was more relaxing than I expected as well. The tour blew me away! Again I was expecting more hospital and not so much clinic. But as the tour continued, I understood more about what the hospital is about. It's not about beds for patients to recover in, but about the care they receive and the therapy that is required. I was also impressed in the fact that if equipment for therapy isn't available, it has actually been designed by the staff and manufactured.

"The various speakers we heard gave me further insight into how the "hospital" operates. The creativity of the staff to find the best way to work with a patient captured my attention. One of the last speakers was a young man who has been a patient at the hospital. To see how much has been achieved in his recovery is impressive."

Chief Rabban Riemenschneider & Lady Julie were again impressed with the Lokomat® device that aids a patients gait through treadmill and muscle sensory therapy.

"The donor relations presentation also challenged us by saying if every Noble would give a dollar a day (\$365.00) per year, we would eliminate the problem we have in taken from our existing endowment fund (approx. 23 million/month at this time) to fund our 22 hospitals. We presently only give \$5.00/yr that is collected in our yearly dues."

Potentate Steve Peterson found this year was again "an educational experience in what our hospitals are working on to allow our patients to develop in Mind, Body and Spirit. Research projects that teach 12-month to 30-month patients that have disabilities (where they will not be able to walk) and train them to utilize a mobilize wheelchair by using 3 sensitize buttons to travel in a special design chair with positive results.

"Another research project with the Northwestern University engineering department class that designed a tool name Fasten & Twist that allows a young adult to independently button her jeans, which will allow her to have the independence to go off to college and live on her own. These little things we take for granted, but the challenges for our patients and Shriners Hospitals for Children® work to solve them for our patients."

A visitation opportunity will be available to Nobles and their Ladies on June 5 when Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Chicago will have an open house to celebrate their 85th Anniversary.

Little East-West Shrine Football Game Celebrates 50 Years






The pregame tailgate party will be held inside the Duck Pond starting at 4:30 pm.



Eldest Shriner, Noble Frank Buckles, Dies in West Virginia

Shortly after celebrating his 110th birthday, Osiris Noble Frank Buckles passed away on February 27, 2011,


in his home in Charlestown, WV. He was the last surviving WWI veteran and the oldest Shriner in Shrinedom. A

hero to all American veterans, Mr. Buckles was active until his death as the Honorary Chairman of a committee to develop a new national memorial in Washington, DC, dedicated to honor the nearly four million soldiers killed in WWI. A member of a veterans' organization "Lest We Forget," he was honored on his 109th birthday with gifts, including the presentation of the "Famous Masons" plaque created by Saladin Noble and Korean War vet, Gust Anton, who presented the plaque personally.





Disability Awareness: Words Matter



It's important to use "people-first language" when referring to, or talking with, people with disabilities – especially children.

Children with disabilities, like all children, will learn or absorb what they are taught and react to the way they are treated. Every staff member at Shriners Hospitals for Children works hard to build confidence and self-esteem in their patients, and to help them discover and pursue their dreams, despite their disabilities. In working with kids toward that goal, it's important to remember how language can affect a positive attitude.

Words to avoid include "crippled" and "handicapped." Instead of using these words, which can be considered negative, experts suggest using "disability" or the actual term involved, such as "cerebral palsy" or "muscular dystrophy."

When speaking about people with disabilities, clear, direct words are most positively accepted. For example, say, "Johnny uses a wheelchair," instead of, "Johnny is wheelchair-bound," or, "Johnny is confined to a wheelchair." Wheelchairs allow mobility from place to place, which is the opposite of confining.

Words and tone-of-voice can clearly indicate values, and using positive, affirmative words can make a big difference. Practice care when using value-laden words like *courageous*, *inspiration*, *pity*, *suffer*, *tragic*, *tragedy*, *afflicted* or *victim*. While *courageous* and *inspirational* may seem positive, being labeled as such can be burdensome to a child.

It is also important to use "people-first language." For example, saying, "Johnny is a *child with a disability*," is preferred over saying, "Johnny is a *disabled child*." People with disabilities sometimes

feel isolated from those without disabilities and left out of activities. People-first language is an attempt to encourage understanding that people with disabilities are people first, and to help alleviate fear and encourage inclusion.

Conversation Starters

Here are some ways to start a conversation with a person who has a disability: Say hello; introduce yourself; comment on the weather. Find something you might share an interest in – television, music, sports, anything. In short, begin the same way you would if there were no disability. Take a deep breath, look past the obvious difference, and find the person.

When you speak to people with disabilities as people, you will find yourself in a conversation with someone who has had different experiences, and the exchange of views could be very enriching for both of you.

If you are interested in finding out more about the person's disability, understand that everyone with a disability reacts to this differently and, like most subjects, there are appropriate and inappropriate ways – and times and places – to ask such questions.

Try using words that reflect acceptance and indicate that a person is not defined by their disability – a message that is especially imperative to convey to children with disabilities.

Words and Phrases to Avoid:

- Crippled, handicapped
- Confined to a wheelchair
- Wheelchair-bound
- Suffering from, afflicted with
- Victim
- Deformed

Instead, Try:

- Person with a disability
- Person who uses a wheelchair
- Has (name of condition)
- Survivor

Those Sweet Vidalia Onions Will Soon Be Here

The 2011 Vidalia onion crop is looking good . . . and Richard Winter knows that for a fact. He stopped in to visit our onion grower, Shad Dasher, in mid March to see for himself. Shad was irrigating the onions as it was dry in Georgia and Vidalia onions need a lot of moisture.

Shad is using an innovative farming method this year to assure the onions receive just the right amount of moisture at just the right time. The onions are planted in raised beds with ditches between the beds. The ditches drain the excess moisture away from the onions allowing them to dry naturally at the end of the growing season.

The onion seeds are planted in September. In November the small onion plants are dug up, transplanted, and continue growing until harvested in late April. After the onions are harvested, Shad then plants soybeans as a summer crop. Shad planted 200 acres of Vidalia onions this year—that is up from 140 acres in 2010. In a good year, 200 acres

will yield 5,000,000 pounds of onions! That's a lot of sweet Vidalia onions!

Growing Vidalia onions is a tradition in the Dasher family—Shad is the third generation to grow these onions. He and his wife are the parents of 5 children ages 8, 11, 12, 18, 24; hopefully one of them will continue the tradition.

Shad is an active Mason and Shriner. He served as Worshipful Master of his Blue Lodge three years ago. He understands the importance of maintaining strong clubs and units within the organization. He is proud to be a part of helping the Shriners support their organization through this fundraising effort.

There will be 100 bags of these sweet Vidalia onions at the Shrine Center. Make it a point to stop in and pick up 2 or more bags of onions. For easy bookkeeping, please pay for the onions when you pick them up.



Vidalia Onion Recipes

French Onion Casserole

A favorite recipe from Sue Buehler

- 3-4 Vidalia onions, sliced
- 3 tbsp. butter
- 2 tbsp. flour
- Dash of pepper
- 3/4 cup beef bouillon
- 1/4 cup dry white wine
- 2 tbsp. melted butter
- 1-1/2 cups plain croutons
- 2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
- 3 tbsp. Parmesan cheese

1. Cook onions in 3 tbsp. butter until tender.
2. Blend flour and pepper into onions and butter.
3. Add bouillon and wine. Cook until thick and bubbly.
4. Put in buttered casserole dish.
5. Toss croutons with 2 tbsp. melted butter; spoon on top of onion mix.
6. Sprinkle with Swiss cheese and Parmesan cheese.
7. Place under broiler until cheese melts (about one minute).
8. Serve immediately.

Vidalia Onion Dip

A favorite recipe from Sue Buehler

- 4 cups chopped Vidalia onions
- 2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 1-8 oz. can water chestnuts, chopped
- 1/4 cup dry white wine
- 1 clove garlic, minced

1. Mix all ingredients together and place in a 2 quart casserole.
 2. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes.
- Serve with Tortilla chips or crackers.

Baked Vidalia Onion

- 1 Vidalia onion
- 1 tbsp. butter
- Salt and pepper

1. Place Vidalia onion on a square of aluminum foil large enough to wrap entire onion in foil.
2. Sprinkle with salt and pepper.
3. Place butter on top of onion.
4. Wrap foil around onion and bake in 350 degree oven or on grill until done; approximately 45-60 minutes.

Fresh Vegetable Salad

Nice and easy to make when all of the vegetables are in season.

- Tomatoes
- Vidalia Onions
- Cucumbers
- Radishes

1. Cut tomatoes, onions, cucumbers, and radishes into chunks.
2. Sprinkle with salt and pepper.
3. Put in refrigerator and juice will be created from the tomatoes and the cucumbers. Add a small amount of dried parsley or other spices if you like. The juice tastes wonderful.

Vidalia Onion Casserole

A favorite recipe form Bob Madalon, Vacationland S.C.

- 2-3 large Vidalia onions, slice 1/2 inch thick, then cut in half
- 3 tbsp. butter
- 1/2 lb. Swiss cheese, shredded
- 1 can Cream of Chicken soup
- 1/2 can milk
- 1 tsp. soy sauce
- About 8 slices French bread, cut 1/2 inch thick and buttered

1. Sauté onions in butter; place in 11 x 7 inch baking dish
2. Spread cheese over onions.
3. Heat soup, milk, and soy sauce; pour over cheese. Mix gently with fork
4. Place bread, butter side up, over mixture.
5. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.






