

The Mentor will be expected to follow the candidate through the first year of his membership. Duties of Mentors are as follows: Keep them informed of where and when for Ceremonial/ Cold Sands/Meetings. Introduce them to other Nobles. Introduce his Lady to other Ladies. Take him around to Clubs and Units. Inform him of functions. Phone him regularly to keep in touch. Get him to parades. Be available to answer questions. Keep him involved. HAVE FUN! As you can see, these are things you would do anyway.

The Ambassador program will consist of one member of each club/unit who will represent and promote your club/unit, will contact Zor Shriners in your area who are not active, and will work to develop an active membership through all of Zor's activities. The Ambassador will be appointed by, and serve at the pleasure of, the Potentate and will receive a Fez which will be his to wear as long as he remains an Ambassador. Of course, the position


you were unable to submit their paper work ahead of time.

will require that he contact members and possibly make arrangements to help them get to meetings, but he must also be active in Zor activities outside of your clubs/units area and should promote those activities as well. As an Ambassador, he will be a vital part of the Membership committee and his efforts will provide the essential role of retaining members. Another part of the Ambassadors duties will be to contact patient applicants in your area and assist them in filling out admission forms or otherwise helping them to access the services that we provide. The Ambassador program will take time to establish throughout Zor's large area and the Divan Representatives will be responsible for recommending candidates to the Potentate. Please assist your Divan Representative in this important endeavor. This person must possess the ability to communicate well and be comfortable going out and meeting people to promote Zor.

<u>**Treasurers Report:**</u> D. Anderson read the abbreviated financial report as of March 31, 2011 that shows Total Revenues YTD \$17,116, Total Expenses \$112,243, for a gain of \$57,873, with unrealized Wells Fargo Gain of \$17,360 leaving a Net Gain of \$75,233. As of March 31, 2011 end of the month balances show Checking Accounts \$200,808, less bills to be paid in 30 days \$21,663. Cash Reserves, Hospital Patient Transportation Account \$96,998, Hospital Transportation Account Tampa \$210.058, Building Improvement Accounts \$53,149. Long Term Investment Accounts \$948,364 and Perpetual Membership \$26,258. M. Severson PP. moved the report be accepted and seconded by B. Gorsuch. Motion Carried.

Membership Report: B. Calverley, Membership Chairman, reported that as of April 30, 2011 we had 1 Creation, 1 Restoration, 3 Demits and 8 Deaths for a net loss of 9 Nobles. As of April 30, 2011 out total membership is 1767. At the present time we have 158 Nobles who have not paid their 2011 dues. B. Calverley moved the report be accepted and seconded by D. Hoffman PP. Motion Carried.

<u>Departed Nobles:</u> J. Stelsel, Recorder, read the names of 31 of our departed Nobles as reported in the first quarter. K. Gant gave a prayer for the departed Nobles.

Trustees Report: J. Soderholm PP. Vice Chairman of the Trustees named the members of the trustees, the members of the internal committee and the projects for this quarter that included new carpet installed in Hankowitz Hall and entrance way, mini blinds replaced with wooden blinds, film on half moon windows and complete painting of the main floor.

The external committee projects for this quarter, snow removal contract, front entrance re-landscaping, air conditioning area and detention basin and mapping. Zor has \$55,000 in the budget for a possible new roof. The investment committee activities is Wells Fargo, \$505,000, gain value \$14,000, CD's \$504,000 interest accrued for the period \$5,884 with a total gain for the quarter \$19884. As of May 11, 2011 we have a total of \$1,033,350.00. J. Soderholm moved the report be accepted and seconded by M. Severson PP. Motion Carried.

<u>Onion Report:</u> J. Stelsel, Recorder, reported for R. Winter, Onion Chairman, this year we ordered 6,500 bags, which was 225 bags more than last year, The onions are excellent and the clubs & units will receive \$2.00 for each bag they sell. The trucking cost has not been determined at this time and a big thanks to all Nobles who participated in the sale this year. J. Stelsel moved the report be accepted and seconded by L. Riemenschneider. Motion Carried.

Chicago Hospital Report: E. Buehler PP. member of the Board, Chicago Hospital, reported it is the same old story that the hospitals are short of money. Each hospital has submitted a report as of April 1st on how they will save money and we are awaiting Tampa's response. We know there has to be change in the way we operate, this will be discussed at the Imperial Session and our representatives must be aware changes are necessary. We are going on line on July 1st for the collection of money from Insurance Companies and Government programs. B. Gorsuch reported the handling of the collection of this money has added about 120 new positions and it is hoped none of the hospitals will be closed but some may be operated only as clinics and other hospitals will be regional and operated as they are now. E. Buehler PP. stated these options will probably be discussed at the Imperial Session. We will have many challenges to deal with in the future and I move acceptance of this report and seconded by M. Severson PP. Motion Carried.

<u>Twin Cites Hospital Report:</u> L. Riemenschneider read the report submitted by R. Rommel who was unable to attend the quarterly meeting. Twin Cities Hospital Day will be held on May 20th. We should soon enable certification from the Medicare Program as a provider, which will trigger acceptance as a Medicaid provider. The hospital began accepting insurance in April with better than anticipated financial results. Authorization was received to develop a new playground at the hospital funded by a donation from a Minnesotabased family trust. The Women's General Auxiliary was acknowledged for accumulating over \$5 million in donations to the hospital. Zor received credit for 18 new applications through March. The 2011 goal is 95 patients. Total applications received were 165 with 154 approved. An Evaluation Clinic is scheduled or October 1st in Sparta and plan to have one in Wausau this summer. Through the end of March there have been 166 surgical operations, 1697 laboratory examinations and 1677 physical therapy treatments. Thanks to all the drivers and your support of the TCH. L. Riemenschneider moved the report be accepted and seconded by D. Hoffman PP. Motion Carried.

<u>Circus Report:</u> J. Thorstad PP., Circus Chairman, reported the Madison Circus had a net profit of \$100,000, which was \$20,000 under budget due to weather on Sunday. Total Attendance was 27,904 with largest show Saturday 3 P.M. 7361 and smallest Sunday 5 P. M. 2776. Tickets sold Nobles 1257, PDQ 4221, Reserved seats 5004, Bus Groups 1075, Gate sales 7282, Child Passes 8150, Family passes 285. We averaged 86 Nobles and 21 Ladies per show. By a specially marked program 3 bicycles with helmets, a Mallards family pass, Red Lobster gift card, and a stuffed animal were given away at each show. 18 Nobles were billed for used and unpaid tickets. The cost of the Alliant Energy Center was \$63,188. The La Crosse Circus attendance was 9000 and Zor's profit was \$3,500. J. Thorstad PP. moved the report be accepted and seconded by D. Bomkamp. Motion Carried.

New Business:

S. Peterson <u>June Ceremonial:</u> reviewed the schedule for the Ceremonial on June 4, 2011 in Whitewater, the Friday night Fish Fry, and the Sunday Trip to the

Chicago Hospital. <u>Summer Variety Shows:</u> S. Peterson reviewed the Schedule of the 16 Summer Variety Shows.

Reading of Communications: J. Stelsel, Recorder moved the reading of the Auxiliary report from Janet Johnson be summarized in the minutes by the Recorder and seconded by M. Severson PP. Motion Carried. Janet Johnson submitted her final report as member of the Advisory Board. The General Auxiliary Officers and Advisory Board Members met April 10th to review the "Suggestion List" of most desired and helpful items for patient care and comfort provided by the hospital staff. Items suggested totaled \$100,076 were approved to be presented at the general meeting on the 11th for approval of the membership. At this meeting it was reported during 2010 the Auxiliary provided 50 manual wheel chairs, 13 power wheel chairs, 10 total refurbishing of wheel chairs, 34 growth kits, 90 walkers, 141 pair of forearm crutches, 1 stroller, 45 bath chairs and \$268,410 of durable medical equipment. Contributions and donations totaled \$229,488 and Honorariums totaled \$33,785. Zorland Auxiliaries donated \$7,957 in 2010. Approval was given to the \$100,076 for the Suggestion List as many of the auxiliaries agreed to purchase the items on the list. The auxiliaries continue to supply many special items of clothing used over braces and casts. The "Pop Top Tab" project continues to be a good source of revenue for our wheel chair fund. Cheryl Hoffman of River Falls replaces me on the Advisory Board ending by term totaling 19 years of service. Thank you for all the support; it has been a joy to serve the children of Zor.

Chaplain K. Gant gave the closing prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 3:09 p. m.



Ear Surgery Makes World of Difference for Young Girl

Arizona does not remember when she started noticing that her ears protruded too much, she just remembers that she never pulled her hair back without wearing a headband and has always been self-conscious about her ears. with families to discuss successful otoplasty surgery. "People started to make comments a few years ago," said her mom, Stephanie. "We've thought about this surgery for two years. It was a hard decision for us to make. No one wants to think about cosmetic plastic surgery on a young girl."

A positive attitude toward the surgery is an important factor, especially when the patient is a child or adolescent. When it comes to otoplasty, conventional wisdom is the earlier the better. The surgery is relatively simple, as the surgeon makes a small incision behind the ear, in the natural fold where the ear is joined to the head. The surgeon removes the necessary amounts of cartilage and skin required to achieve the right effect for the patient. The risks are minimal to this surgery. There will be a thin white scar behind the ear after healing. Children are generally seen once prior to surgery by the medical team in Cincinnati. Surgery can be scheduled often within 8-12 weeks after the first appointment. After surgery, patients are seen in 7-10 days with one or two follow-up visits after the first post-op visit.

Ear surgery makes it possible to correct a flaw that can often undermine one's self-confidence. By changing how you look, this surgery can help change how you feel about yourself.

Saturday, April 30 marked the first "After Easter Leaster" bowling tournament. The Southwestern Wisconsin Shrine Club sponsored this unusual tournament where the low score was the goal. Of course it wasn't as easy as simply throwing gutter balls as there were penalties for doing just that.

The object of the game is to get the lowest score. The purpose of Low Ball is to practice on your 7 and 10 pins and to practice focusing on a specific target. You want to get the lowest score, but there is a catch. Here are the rules for Low Ball:

10 frame game

Ball must hit at least one pin

Every gutter ball or zero(0) count = +10 to final score

Lowest score wins

In Low Ball, bowling strikes and spares are scored exactly the same way you would score a strike or spare in a regular game of bowling. At least one pin needs to be knocked down. A perfect game in low ball is a twenty (20). Meaning that one pin is knocked over on each of the two balls per frame in the score. To get the lowest possible score is to aim for the 7 and 10 pin each frame. If you knock down 4 pins on your first ball, you want to try to hit only one of the remaining six pins down. If you knock down 6 pins on your first ball, you want to try to hit only one of the remaining 4 pins and so on. A gutter ball will be recorded as a strike if it is on the first ball in a frame. If on the second ball you do throw a gutter ball it will score as a spare. You've got to knock or topple over at least one pin on each thrown ball to get a low score. Therefore, this version of the game is quite a challenge.

Low-Ball Bowling, uses a standard ten-pin setup, but the object is to bowl the lowest score by aiming at only the seven or ten pins. Strikes and spares are scored identically as in ten-pin bowling, and gutter balls are scored as strikes. At least one pin must be knocked down per delivery, so a miss on the first ball must be recorded as a strike (only a gutter ball can result in this). If the second ball is thrown and it misses pins without going in the gutter, it's recorded as a spare. A perfect low-ball score is 20 (1 pin on each of 2 balls per frame). If there is a tie, there will be a 5 frame bowl off.

The top five winners were: 1st Jeff Simmons with a three game score of 226; 2nd Wally Trouten, 275; 3rd Marc Steiber, 291; 4th Gary Clark, 293; and 5th Julie Thompson, 344. More importantly this was a tournament where fun was more important than the final score. There was probably more laughter coming from the bowlers than groans for scores that were not to the bowlers' advantage. Some bowlers laughed that they had higher scores than they would have if they had tried for high scores. As this first attempt at a "fun" bowling tournament was a success, a second "After Easter Leaster" is being planned for April 14, 2012.
