Wisconsin Rapids Rolls Out the Red Carpet for the Spring Ceremonial



Welcome new Nobles! Wisconsin Rapids brought in 11 new Nobles to Zor's ranks. Congratulations to them and their families.

Saturday morning June 12 was dreary and overcast but you would never know it by the electricity and excitement in the beautiful Hotel Mead in Wisconsin Rapids. Months of planning and coordination by Bob & Sandy Calverly, Chuck & Sharon Miller, Randy & Cathy Webb, and Jeff & Beth Schaefer was coming to fruition as Zor Shrine prepared to induct 11 new Nobles into Shrinedom.

The Divan was ready, the Ritual Divan was ready, the Directors Staff was ready, and the candidates - Shane Blaser, Christopher Giesler, Errin Giesler, Steven Livernash, Eric McKinney, Scott Petersen, David Ritchie, Jason Welch, Lawrence Wiegand, Alex Witt, & Tomas Wittelsbach - were ready.

Potentate Joe Thompson and the Divan opened the Ceremonial, introduced special guest Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons Joe Harker, then turned it over to the Ritual Divan, who were using the newest version handed down from Imperial Shrine. Some familiar faces and new faces were featured in the ritual: Potentate - Chet Gabris, Chief Rabban Ted Erickson, Asst. Rabban - Bob Bradley, High Priest & Prophet - Matt Hughey, Orator - Shawn Coyle, Oriental Guide - Miles Bradley, 1st Ceremonial Master - Todd Wohlert, 2nd Ceremonial Master - Dean Holmen, Marshal - Chuck Miller, and Captain of the Guard "Sweet Old Bill" Burkhardt.

After the Ritual Divan completed their portion, the Nobles broke for lunch and prepared for the secretive second section, run by the Director's Staff, where they walked the hot sands, learned cooking skills from Past Potentates and were schooled in grooming techniques from Sweet Old Bill. Once the mess was

cleaned up and the candidates were hosed off, it was time for the fezzing.

Past Potentate Roger Amdall read the classic poem My Old Red Fez for the assembly, a tradition since 2001, then the new candidates were fezzed by their ladies or sponsors and became Nobles of Zor. "I tell ya, the longer you're a Shriner, the more your fez means to you. I haven't been a Shriner all that many years and I can relate to the guys who have had it 50-60 years: their old red fez, and all the people they've met, and the friends they've made over the years - true friends. That's what it means to me," said Amdall. Once the fezzing was complete, the Zor Nobles rose to their feet to congratulate the newest Nobles.

Everyone loves a parade, especially Shriners judging by the Zor parade units lined up for the Ceremonial Parade in Wisconsin Rapids. The Funsters, the Mini-cars, the Camel Patrol, the Firehouse Jesters, the Wausauken Indians, the Midgets and many more joined the Divan and new Nobles for a stroll down the street. Two semi tractors pulled trailers featuring The Shriners Hospital for Children. Shrinedom was well represented in the parade. Afterwards, it was time to relax and socialize. Some of the new Nobles were found in the lounge after the parade and expressed their impressions about becoming Zor Nobles.

David Ritchie, Evening Star Lodge No. 64 in Darlington said, "I loved it - it was a lot of fun. I enjoyed the parade... it's neat to see grown men having fun. Blue Lodge, the ritual blew you away. Take Flight with the Mallards on July 11




Table conversation was eclectic and



Zor Noble Joe Harker Becomes Grand Master of Wisconsin

Details of the 2010 Grand Lodge of Wisconsin Annual Communication held at the Madison Masonic Center can be found in our brother publication, The Wisconsin Masonic Journal. (Read the print version or read it on-line at wisc-freemasonry.org If you like what you read, be sure to tell Rygh then tell him that the Zephyr folks sent you.)

This is the Zor Shrine perspective on the Annual Communication and the election of Zor Shrine Noble and Housing Chairman Joseph Harker, the new Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons for the State of Wisconsin. Many Zor Nobles were present as well as Zor Potentate Joe Thompson, the Zor Divan and Trustees, and the Zor Camel Patrol.

The installation was marked with lighted hearted whimsy and powerful emotions. The York Rite Honor Guard marched stoically in and crossed swords between the Altar and the East, where Lady Mary Harker was waiting. MWGM elect Harker was escorted into Grand Lodge by his 2 daughters, then his 3 grandsons brought in the Bible, square, and compasses. Past Grand Master, Master of dry wit, and current Grand Secretary Mike DeWolf was the Installing Master for the program. In York Rite, Joe belongs to West Allis Chapter No. 84 R.A.M., Waukesha Council No. 29 R.& S.M., & Waukesha Commandery No. 23 K.T. as well as Red Cross of Constantine, St. Wilfred Conclave and York Rite College.

Last and certainly not least, Noble Harker belongs to Zor Shrine and Tripoli Shrine and is a member of Zor Shrine Camel Patrol, Sahara Shrine Club, Tripoli Shrine Directors Staff.

Tripoli Shrine provided the hospitality Thursday night for the Annual Communication then, Friday night, it was Zor Shrine's turn. Wheelchair Dance Motivates Kids To Try Something New

J. Klaas, director of SCI services, and former patient Nick Scott, who is a professional wheelchair bodybuilder. Scott became involved with wheelchair dance last year when he met Aubree Marchione, a professional dancer and actress. The two plan to compete in the Wheelchair Dancesport at the Paralympics in Germany in November 2010.

Marchione was eager to teach wheelchair dance to the patients at Shriners Hospitals for Children® —

"Wheelchair ballroom dance is an activity that has physical, mental and social benefits," Marchione explained. "These kids get the chance to connect with other people while dancing, and it is an activity that integrates people with disabilities and people without disabilities, which I think is very important."

Six patients – Tyler, Matthew, Jonathon, K.J., Kerstine, and Imperio – teamed up with hospital staff to learn dances from Scott and Marchione.

After three hours of practice, the group performed in front of parents, patients, hospital staff and visitors. Then, Scott and Marchione took to the dance floor for the final performance.

"Everyone did extremely well – standing partners too – and it was the fastest learning class that I have ever taught," Marchione said. "I think all of them have potential to be really great dancers! The class was a lot of fun because everyone had such a positive attitude and was open-minded to learn something different, just like Nick was when I first met him."

Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Chicago offers several other programs designed to expand the horizons of patients with spinal cord injury. One of those programs is GLAHM (Good Life and Healthy Mind) Camp, which is a week filled with makeovers, health and wellness education and nights on the town for young women. Wheelchair Bodybuilding Camp is offered to young

men, featuring five days of learning about nutrition, fitness options and healthy

"These programs get our patients motivated to move and try something new," Klaas said. "The ultimate goal is to inspire them and build their confidence. When they believe in themselves, they can tackle the challenges their lives throw their way."

The Tomah circus was well attended this year, the weather cooperated during







Club Chronicles **Shrine Club Tours 45th Parallel**



St. Croix Valley Shrine Club President Barry Ausen is shown in the sampling room at the 45th Parallel Spirit Distillery in New Richmond.

Before opening up this area's first spirit distillery, he worked in construction and never dreamed he would be the maker of fine distilled spirits. But that is exactly what happened to Paul Werni of the Twin

Paul, along with his father, got a permit for his operation 3 years ago. Starting out, the 45th Parallel distillery made only vodka. Now they not only make vodka from locally grown corn, but also have started making gin and bourbon.

According to Paul, they use field corn from a farmer just north of Roberts, because it is high in starch and consistently high quality.

All of the shiny new stainless steel equipment came from Germany. The tall smoke stack like "still" also came from Europe, purchased from the Christian Carl Company. Werni said back when he first started up his operation, there were only 5 such small distilleries in the United States, but now there are 150 to 175 in operation around the country. This is apparently due to the trend toward micro breweries that have become very popular.

What makes the 45th Parallel product

so unique, according to Werni, is they make everything from scratch, rather than shipping in processed alcohol. They also spend more time in the mashing process, from 3 to 4 days verse the usual 2 days at other operations. "This gives the product a better flavor" says Paul.

During a tour of the plant, organized by St. Croix Valley Shrine Club President Barry Ausen, members of the Shrine Club asked how they came about the name. It seems the plant is situated on the 45th parallel by the world map and since most of the most famous restaurants are located on or near the 45th parallel, Paul felt it would be a natural name for his spirits.

Today, the New Richmond based distillery produces not only vodka, but also bourbon and now gin. As Paul said, most people do not realized gin is nothing more than flavored vodka. In fact, all of his distilled spirits come out clear or near clear. The color of bourbon comes from the charred oak barrels in which they are aged. The charcoal in the barrels also serves to absorb the impurities. The largest buyer of their bourbon is the Milwaukee and Madison areas.

When it comes to vodka and gin, the Werni family adds their own special flavorings giving them a unique and fruity flavor. Normally gin gets it flavor from the juniper berry. At the 45th, they also add other flavorings to give it a really smooth taste that rivals the most expensive spirits sold today.

When the Shriners visited, the 45th had just completed a sampling room, where people who tour the plant can sample the many varieties sold and distributed by the

The family was visited by some Russian friends from St. Paul who requested a vodka be made from horseradish. The Werni's had cubed horse radish shipped in from the Silver Springs in Eau Claire and started producing the newly created vodka. As Paul said, "it is like a strong coffee, you either love it or hate it," adding, "it is an acquired taste."

The 45th Parallel products are on many liquor store shelves in the area and its popularity is growing.


