





HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Brachial plexus palsy is a condition that affects roughly one in every 1,000 newborns. It occurs most commonly, though not exclusively, when the brachial plexus, a group of

nerves around the shoulder, is affected during birth. Most children with brachial plexus palsy, which can cause difficulty with shoulder movement, do not need surgical intervention and can improve with the help of physical and occupational therapy.

Early rehabilitation therapy can potentially prevent additional problems that can accompany brachial plexus palsy, such as trunk weakness and torticollis, a condition in which the neck muscles are twisted beyond their normal position. If the brachial plexus nerves are stretched, scarred or disconnected and surgical intervention is required, the specialists at Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Chicago perform surgery when the child is 6 to 10 months of age. The procedure includes removing scarred nerves and potentially performing a nerve transfer.

"The goal is for the patient's arm to be as functional as possible," said Sue Mukherjee, M.D., FRCPC, the medical director of the hospital's specialty rehabilitation program. She hosts a clinic for children with brachial plexus palsy once a month.

The rehab team at the Chicago Shriners Hospital works closely with the surgeons and Dr. Mukherjee to ensure that every facet of the child's course of care is covered. After receiving treatment, children are followed until they are 3 or 4 years old to ensure that no further care for brachial plexus palsy is needed.



ZOR'S SPRING CEREMONIAL

Fun Combined With An Important Lesson

Nine Masons joined the Zor Shrine Caravan Saturday, May 19th in a weekend that featured fun, fellowship and, a significant life lesson.

For months, Potentate Gary Cuskey had been touting the Friday night event of the Ceremonial – a "Mystery Dinner." But, it would not involve solving a murder. Nor would it involve

a school lunch-like serving of some indeterminable kind of meat.

Fortunately, it was a safe decision. The Temple has given Potentate Cuskey no reason for him to exact revenge, at least not yet. But, the bus left the hotel and headed north on Highway 53, which leads to Spooner, the Potentate's hometown. Was he taking the group to dinner at Nick's Family Restaurant in that august community? The bus driver answered that question in the negative by turning easterly on to Highway 29, which goes all the way to Green Bay. Some immediately started speculating the destination was Lambeau Field. As darkness set in and mosquitoes began dive bombing, the group were returned from whence they came, riding slowly in the wagons through the woods, enjoying the quiet passage. After a return bus ride, the diners dispersed, some to the Zor hospitality room and more to the kind of peaceful sleep you have after being in the country for a while.

Saturday dawned sunny with perfect temperatures. Twenty or so Zor members rose early to unload the props, costumes and set up for the day. The Divan members then retreated to get dressed. Proving that they clean up well, the Divan showed up nattily attired in white jackets, evoking the feel of Spring. Potentate Cuskey opened the Temple for business and ceremony. He thanked Mehara Shrine Club for acting as host of the weekend events and finding nine quality candidates to join Zor.

Discussing the previous night's dinner, the Potentate asked if everyone had enjoyed it. The crowd responded strongly in the affirmative. He told the group that he and his wife, First Lady Judy, originally had dinner at the Cabin Ridge Lodge in the winter. They rode a horse-drawn sleigh to the Lodge and loved it. That experience led him to want to host the Zor guests at a dinner. He then made a major point – the most important point of the entire ceremonial: He asked the group how many would have gone to the dinner if he had told them in advance there was no electricity or indoor plumbing. The reaction was clear; most of the guests probably would not have.

The point should not be lost. Too often in our lives, we decide against trying something new or different based on incomplete information. We don't trust the judgment and insight of others enough to take a chance that we might enjoy something new. In the instance of the mystery dinner, that could have meant that many



would not have enjoyed some relaxing, friendly fellowship and the fun of riding into the woods on a horse-drawn wagon. Potentate Cuskey's decision to keep the details of the dinner a mystery gave dozens the chance to have a genuinely good time – because he appealed to their faith.

clinics closer to the patient's homes, thereby saving not only time but family expenses.


