


A MESSAGE FROM YOUR ZOR POTENTATE

On my right foot I could wear a sneakers shoe but my left foot couldn't fit the sneakers.

Shriners Hospitals for Children in Chicago took care of my extra toe in 2010. I was referred to Shriners Hospitals by Herb Johnson who was my dad's boss while my dad worked at United Cooperative. When we had the meeting with the doctors, they let me pick my cast. I think it was a blue one, and I got to choose either a boot, a wheelchair, or crutches. I chose the boot so I could walk with my cast that went from my toes to about halfway up my leg.

I just want to say thank you to Herb and the Shriners Hospitals for Children and thank you to the doctors that took the time to help me and other children to have better lives. I would highly recommend Shriners Hospitals because I would probably still have my extra toe today if it wasn't for them.



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




East/West viewing party

Shriners Hospitals for Children: A History of Innovation and Excellence in Burn Care

Shriners Hospitals for Children® is noted worldwide as a leader in pediatric burn care. Since opening our three pediatric burn hospitals in the 1960s, our health care system has been at the forefront of innovative programs and treatment techniques that have both dramatically improved the survival rate for children with severe burns and enhanced their quality of life. Here is a brief look at our work over the decades:

1960s

The governing body of the Shriners organization passed a resolution at the Imperial Session in 1962 to build and operate hospitals specializing in pediatric burn care. The first hospital opened in 1962 in Galveston, Texas, followed by additional specialized hospitals in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Boston, Massachusetts two years later.

1970s

Tremendous improvements in survival rates were made, particularly because of innovative research in excision, grafting and intravenous feeding. In addition, pressure garments that helped lessen scarring were developed. Shriners Hospitals for Children — Cincinnati pioneered skin banking – a precursor to future methods of tissue, bone and skin procurement. In addition, Shriners Hospitals for Children worked with the United States Fire Administration and Consumer Product Safety Commission to identify burn prevention programs for schools and fire departments. And, our Boston hospital began the first school re-entry program.

1980s

Outpatient clinics were added to provide continued care for patients after they have been discharged from the hospital. Also, researchers at Shriners Hospitals for Children discovered that early surgical excision and grafting reduces infections, shortens hospital stays and improves cosmetic outcomes for patients. Finally, Burn Awareness Week, a national education campaign, was created in an effort to raise public awareness and reduce the number of burn injuries in children.

1990s

Care was made available for non-burn conditions such as port wine stains, congenital ear deformities and other complex wound and skin conditions. In addition, new programs were set up to help burn patients with psychological and social issues, including transitioning back to school and community. In 1996, Shriners Hospitals for Children — Boston collaborated with the American Burn Association to develop an outcome



instrument to measure functional outcomes in pediatric burn survivors. And, in 1997, Shriners Hospitals for Children — Northern California opened in Sacramento and soon became the busiest pediatric burn center in the Western U.S.

2000s

The hospitals in Boston and Cincinnati received the Press Ganey Summit Award for extraordinary patient satisfaction. All four of the hospitals were recognized as leaders in the field of burn care, with each hospital maintaining a leadership position with the American Burn Association. Shriners Hospitals for Children — Boston, through microfluidics research, developed a micro-chip device that aids therapeutic strategies for burn patients.

2010s

In 2011, Shriners Hospitals for Children – Northern California hosted its first Regional Burn Conference, a continuing education program for physicians, nurses, first responders, therapists and other health care professionals. In 2014, David Herndon, M.D., Shriners Hospitals for Children – Galveston chief of staff, was awarded the Medallion for Scientific Achievement by the American Surgical Association and the Tanner-Vanderput-Boswick Burn Prize from the International Society for Burn Injuries. John Burke, M.D., former chief of staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children - Boston, was inducted into the Inventors Hall of Fame posthumously in 2015 for his work with the invention of artificial skin. Also, Shriners Hospitals for Children achieved amazing results using CO2 fractional laser therapy to help heal burn scars.

Shriners Hospitals for Children is proud of its work in the field of burn care and looks forward to continuing its legacy of leadership.

Burn prevention is a key endeavor of Shriners Hospitals for Children, which is why the health care system began its Burn Awareness campaigns more than 20 years ago. Burn Awareness Week is a kick-off to a year-long campaign.

Quick facts about burn injuries*

- Every hour approximately 16 children are injured from fires or burns. Eighty-five percent of all fire-related deaths are due to home fires, which spread rapidly and can leave families as little as two minutes to escape once an alarm sounds.
- In 2012, more than 136,000 children across the country, including more than 67,000 children 4 and under, were injured due to a fire or burn and treated in emergency rooms.
- In 2013, 126,035 children ages 19 and under were seen in emergency rooms for fire and burn injuries
- Scald burns, caused by hot liquids or steam, are more common types of burn-related injuries among young children, compared to contact burns, caused by direct contact with fire, which are more common among older children

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At 81 years old, Larry Severson is living life to the fullest and with a need for speed. The Westfield native is a threetime Pro Vintage Racing snowmobile champion. He is the oldest active racer to accomplish such a feat.

"I started racing in 1967, off and on," said Severson. "Then, they started older classes for 60-year-old people and 70-year-old people."

Severson races in both classes. More often in the 70-plus class. All drivers must be 70 years old. He is 81, competing, and winning. Adding to the race, in a vintage style, the sled can't be newer than 1980. Severson drives a 1976 Polaris TX 250.

It's turned into a father-son duo. Larry's son Dan does most of the mechanic work on the sleds they race.

"He does a very good job, and we maintain our sleds, and we spend a lot of



money on machinery and motors," Dan said. "We expect to be up in front."

Race day takes the Seversons all over the state. The biggest race each year is in Eagle River at the World Championship Derby Complex. Last week, Severson won his third title in Eagle River. "It's incredible at his age. His strength at his age," Dan said. "What he does is pretty much unheard of."

Larry will race on January 26 in Holcombe, WI, again on February 9 in Ironwood, MI and on February 23 in Dorchester, WI.
