

Zor 1966 - Blast from the past



Zor's sister temple in Wisconsin Tripoli of Milwaukee will send 11 equally colorful units to entertain in the Zor function which is being held here to honor E. W. (Gene) Amann, illustrious potentate of the Madison temple.

The Zor units Include the host Wausauken Indians, officers of which include Robert L. Stueber, Divan representative; Lyle D. Rounds, president; David H. Dudek, secretary correspondent, and Robert H. Beaumont, director.

The other Zor units, their location and their directors are as follows:

- 1. The Arab Patrol, based in Madison, and headed by Emil F. Schmale, captain.
- 2. The Booster Band of Madison, of which Earl I. Cooper is director.
- 3. The Zor Chanters, also of Madison, a singing group headed by Director Michael M. Birkley.
- 4. The famous Zor Camel Patrol of Madison, captained by Alfred Schurch of Mt. Horeb. Zor has become known nationally in the Shrine movement as the "Camel Temple" because of its camel herd, which is maintained at Madison's Vilas Park Zoo.
- 5. Zor Clowns, also of Madison, with John J. Brissee as director.
- Zor Concert Band, also of Madison, directed by William C. Johnson.
- 7. The Directors Staff, Madison, directed by Wilbur H. Emery.
- 8. The Zor Drum and Bugle Corps of Eau Claire, directed by John L. Farwell.
- The Zor Funsters, Wisconsin Rapids and Stevens Point, directed by Donald W. Atkins, Baraboo.
- 10. Zor Nomads, also a Madison based unit, headed by Robert Hove, president and captain.

In addition to appearing in the parade at 5 p.m., the units will make appearances throughout the Wausau area all day Saturday.

The ceremonial schedule includes indoctrination and induction of new members of the temple, starting at 11 a.m. at Wausau Senior High School and continuing through the afternoon. The parade will form at 4:30 p.m. north of the downtown area and the march to Marathon Park will start at 5 p.m. The concluding feature will be an 8 p.m. program in front of the grandstand in Marathon Park.

A special program is planned for wives of all Shriners who attend the ceremonial.

It is natural to associate the fez with Shriners Hospitals for Children. Because of this, meticulous attention must be given to all fundraising activities, including circuses, to make certain that such activities comply with the law of the land and that a contributor is not led to believe his or her money will be used for the Hospitals when all or a portion thereof will be used otherwise. The integrity of our charity and of our fraternity must remain above reproach.

The use of the name "Shriners Hospitals for Children" or reference to the Hospitals in connection with any fundraising activity by a temple or Noble without the written consent of the Imperial

Potentate and the chairman of the board of trustees of the Hospitals is prohibited.

No Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), club, unit, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant corporations, shall engage in any fundraising activity without the express written consent of the potentate of the temple having jurisdiction thereof.

There can be no representation, express or implied, that the proceeds will be for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Any officer, Noble or temple which violates a provision of Fundraising Activities as outlined in General Order No. 1 is subject to discipline pursuant to the bylaws of Shriners International.

Happy New Years. Here we are in a brand-new decade with a future filled with a lot of unknowns. I am very excited to see what new channels of communications that are just waiting for us to find them.

At the Annual Meeting, I had the opportunity to give the first Marketing and Communications report since Zor started to address the problem in 2017. As I did the research for the report, I was amazed at how far we have come.

As many of you can remember,
Zor's communications took the very
slow path of snail mail or sometimes only by the
Zephyr. Looking back to February of 2018, prior to
the Zor Imagineers took over directing the efforts
of several Zor Noble's in producing the Zephyr you
receive today, only roughly 820 Zephyr's were being
mailed out and of that only about 520 went to
Noble's, the rest were Widows, appendant bodies,
other Temples, and advertisers. We now develop
a new comprehensive list for every issue to ensure
that every Noble, Widow, Candidate, neighboring
Temples, appendant bodies, and advertisers get
either a hard copy or an online copy.

Social media channels of communication were also started in 2017, in addition to the Facebook page for Zor Shriners. We started out as everyone did with only 220 followers. Today, we have 3143 followers, which includes other Temples, watching to see what we are going to next. We started out with only a couple of the clubs and units, and we now have most of the Clubs and Units utilizing Facebook on a regular basis. We still have some work to do to get the 2-way interaction with Zor, however, we have come a long way in only 2 years.

We have come a long way in only 3 years, and I am very excited to see what comes up next. Hopefully some of these improvements have helped you keep better informed of what is going on in Zorland.



The First Step Is Hope

The journey parents face when considering amputation

As every parent learns, raising kids is a series of decisions from mundane to momentous: Oatmeal or Frosted Flakes? Soccer or piano? College or trade school? For parents of a child with medical conditions, there are more decisions, and they're more intense. Just ask the parents of a child who has a condition with a limb difference that may require amputation. In this story, you'll meet three of those children: Maely, Braxton, and Jamie. As Braxton's mom, Bree, says, "This decision was the hardest decision I have made or will ever have to make. I am making a decision that will forever change someone else's life."

Becoming informed and educated

Bree, Josh and their daughter, Hartley, were ecstatic to welcome two new bundles of joy into their lives – twin boys Braxton and Jackson.

But Braxton was born with a difference that could not be ignored – part of the bone in his thigh was missing. Braxton had right proximal femoral focal deficiency, or PFFD, a complex birth anomaly in which the upper part of the femur (thigh bone) is either malformed or missing. Treatment options range from limb-lengthening to amputation at different lengths, prosthetics and a host of different surgical procedures. There is no "one size fits all" approach, making it difficult for parents to know what is right for their child. "This is why I was not going to stop until I had all the information I needed, and most importantly found a doctor I felt most comfortable with overseeing his care," Bree said.

While gathering recommendations from many medical professionals, Braxton's parents met Janet Walker, M.D., at Shriners Hospitals for Children Medical Center — Lexington in Kentucky.

"Dr. Walker picked Braxton up and held him at our first appointment. He seemed so calm with her. Our local doctor never even held him," Bree said. "And Dr. Walker was so knowledgeable about Braxton's condition and the future journey we, as a family, would be facing."

This and future appointments helped Bree and Josh become comfortable with a treatment plan to amputate part of Braxton's leg. "As a mom, knowing this is a condition he will deal with his entire life, I wanted to set Braxton up for success from the beginning, and this is exactly what the team at the Lexington Shriners Medical Center is giving him," she said.

Another of Dr. Walker's patients, a young girl named Jamie, also saw many doctors before having her amputation. Jamie was born without a fibula, one of the bones in the lower leg, a condition called fibular hemimelia.

"Do all you can to educate yourself until you feel a peace of mind in your decision," Jamie's mother, Melissa, recommended. "Do not let



anyone judge the decision you end up making, because no one knows your child better than you."

Jamie, now 4, is an active little girl who loves to run and play and dreams of growing up to be a doctor. "Everything we had done to get to this point was worth every cry and heartache," Melissa said.

Finding the positive

Megan and Matthew were at the doctor's office for an ultrasound. Megan was 20 weeks pregnant with their first child. They weren't going to ask the sex, Megan said, because they wanted to be surprised. The test was to monitor the health of the fetus. As the ultrasound progressed, it became clear something was wrong.

Doctors told the couple their baby's leg was missing its fibula, one of the two lower leg bones, and her foot looked different. They wouldn't know more until the baby's birth.

"It was the worst day of my life," Megan recalled. She said she and Matthew went home and did what everyone is told not to do, yet most do: They went online. What they found frightened Megan Most upsetting was the idea of amputation. It felt like a worst-case scenario to her. "I wouldn't even look at the word," Megan said, "because I didn't want to think about it."

In a social media group, Megan connected with other mothers in the Chicago area. One invited Megan to her home to meet her son, a 2-year-old boy who had an amputation and used a prosthesis.

"Seeing him, I was so encouraged," Megan said, tearing up at the memory. "There was nothing different about him. There was nothing wrong."

Meeting little Jonathan helped Megan reset her hopes for her baby. "He gave me peace," Megan said. Although amputation is not the best or only choice for everyone with a similar diagnosis, Megan said that when Maely was born, it was clear that amputation would be right for her. Still, it wasn't easy. "It's the idea of the unknown, putting your baby through a surgery," Megan said.

Shriner's legacy comes full circle

When a man joins a fraternity like the Freemasons he takes a solemn and binding obligation to help his fellow man.

And for the late Dr. Ray Gustafson, that obligation was taken very seriously.

We sat down with his son Ray (Sketch) Gustafson, to learn more about the man who participated in the ground breaking for the Shrine Hospital for Children® on Riverside Parkway in Minneapolis many years ago. It is currently in use, however when the new Shriners Healthcare for Children® is completed in Woodbury, Minnesota, the Hospital that Dr. Ray helped launch will be put to use by the U of M.

We lost Dr. Ray 3 years ago, but his son Sketch has scores of reminders of his father's years of service to the fraternity in his home on Centennial Drive in River Falls.

Dr. Ray Gustafson received his degree in dentistry from the U of M and took up residence in Bloomington where he raised his 4 children. Their home was located where Best Buy now stands in Minneapolis.

It was a different time in the 50s when Dr. Gustafson asked to join the Freemasons and start what would be a remarkable fraternal journey. In those days, you just did not join, you had to ask. He did ask and joined Ark Lodge #76 in Bloomington and was raised to Master Mason on Nov 27, 1950.

He joined Zuhrah Temple and rose through the ranks to serve as Potentate in 1974. Along the way, he took an interest in the Shriners Hospital for Children®. Back in those days the Hospital had that 1940s look. Very Clinical. Very straight forward. Ray was appointed to the Hospital board of Governors and along with other board members began to make plans to create a hospital environment that was more patient friendly.

They wanted a place where children were greeted with smiles. A place that was spacious, bright and modern. Where both patients and families felt at ease.

His son Sketch said early on when he was a child, his dad would load up young Ray and take the drive to the Hospital on Fridays. While Dr. Ray would attend board meetings, young Sketch would visit with the patients and practice his drawing that would be the source of his nickname for years to come.

Christmas in the Gustafson household was not complete without a trip to visit the patients at the Hospital. They would visit and bring the spirit of Christmas to the patients who could not be home for the holidays.

The board at the time wanted to re-establish themselves with a new logo and improved community outreach. That initiative called for a new building that combined all the patient services, but with a bright new family friendly feeling.

Dr. Gustafson was serving as Chairman of the Board of Governors in 1988-89 when he and other board members broke ground at the river view area in Minneapolis.

Ray was a remarkable man who combined a strong personal conviction with a humility that was his trademark throughout his life. As a matter of fact, Dr. Ray refused to wear a name tag marking him as Chairman of the Board and only after some urging gave in and wore a



Its through the men who parade and fundraise all year for the children. The ladies who support their partner's passion for this great philanthropy. The hospital drivers. The staff.


And to think...it only takes ONE to impact ONE life.

This past winter, I went on my first trip to the Minneapolis hospital. The patient was a 15 year old boy who I will never forget. His path has been very difficult, in so many ways, but he has continued to overcome and be a true example of what the human spirit is capable of.

He was adopted when he was 3, from Ethiopia. Shortly after his adoption, he was severely injured in a lawn tractor accident that left him with only one arm. His adoptive parents decided they could not handle this devastating occurrence and so they released their rights, which then placed this delicate 4 year old into the "system". He was shuffled from foster home to foster home, to a group home setting for 4 years.

What impressed me the most was that even after ALL of this, he was happy. Strength, respect, and positivity seeped from him. He is a Light.

He believes that it all happened for a reason greater than what we may comprehend.



He lives fully, getting detention for popping wheelies in his wheelchair with his friends, sharing his favorite musical artists with us on the ride over, and smiling as he told of the "light" in the darkness when he was in the group home. He carries only the good with him now...the Taylor Swift concert, eating out at great restaurants, and just enjoying being young.

Most recently, a retired teacher has been fostering him. They have decided they never want to let the other go and so adoption proceedings have begun!

When I left the boy and his foster dad that day, I told him he was a Light. He may not know what that means now ...but I trust he will someday. He only needs to shine it on ONE...and we all know what a beautiful difference that can make.



A few major changes for this year - Ticket prices have been set by the Carden Circus office:





to you? Let's do a little time traveling to find out. Zor Shriners has Nobles who can remember the events of the 1920's, 30's & 40's. A simple time in communications. Handwritten letters, telephone calls and the shake of a hand was all that was needed to express yourself. Baby

boomers added to an increasing US population. 364 of our 1,138 Zor Nobles can share a terrific story from this era. The attentive ear receives the sound from the instructive tongue. Roughly, 300 Nobles from this generation do not receive an Eblast from Zor as they do not have an email address on file. This publication is our means of direct communication with them. The word search page is intended for this era. Creates Noble interaction and brings back the names of other Noble relationships from decades ago.

1950's I hear was a time of prosperity and adventure. Masonic lodges were filled with social brotherhood. Shriners membership was growing at a bustling rate. A black and white picture on a TV set brought the decade to a close. Giving a viewing option of entertainment other than listening to the static of a 5 resistor radio. Fins on cars with no power steering or brakes made for memorable rides.

1960's was full of color advancements in technology and we sent a Brother to the Moon for all of mankind. Bart Star was leading the Green Bay Packers in the "Glory Years". The only thing I remember from the 60's was my brother Todd and I getting a bath in the kitchen sink. One each side of the faucet.

1970's I can remember fully. Had a Great Uncle who lived off the land with no power or electric. Great memories of daily chores done the "old fashion way". Kerosene lanterns and D cell batteries were used as nothing with a cord could be plugged in. Feel blessed for those early memories and gained insight to the past. Cars could be doubled as a pontoon boat with long straight body lines. The option of a 8 track player under the dash. CB radios flooded air ways with the expansion of interstate travel. The big boom boxes with cassette songs were blaring by decades end. A calculator helped accuracy in accounting. All Star wrestling on Saturday nights fooled the elderly into thinking it was real. Occasionally a sporting event was televised via Wide World of Sports programming. Lawrence Welk's bubbles, "Chips" and Walt Disney could be watched in prime time. Dance hall Polkas and card playing lasted deep into the night. Smoked filled dining rooms, shaggy carpet, and a taste for Tang was normal. Microwaves in the kitchen? What would we do without one?

1980's I learned in auto class the mechanics of a car. Later, to be replaced with fuel injection and electronic parts, erasing my ability to work on them. The 30 button remote for the console television made people lazy surfing the 4 channels from their davenport. Cordless button phones allowed mobility to talk privately in a different room. Answering machines with tape recorded messages captured awkward messages of people talking to you like you were standing right there with them. I can remember watching ESPN on cable television for the first time. 1989 Dick Trickle became NASCAR series rookie of the year. Leaving behind the Midwest domination of short tracks for bigger tracks. National viewing audience and bigger paychecks thanks to satellites and cable exposure. Home computers were DOS programing with black screens and white letters and sticky keys. Ram as slow as a turtle.

The satellite signals of the 1990's brought the biggest advancement in communications. Double edge sword. The downward spiral of social groups begins and has has continued because of how we communicate. Money generated from cable TV brought in millions of dollars from eager viewers. Changing the world of communications as we know it. The World Wide Web was formed. Sports teams benefited from contracts and online businesses became lucrative .com's. Internet was on its way to our homes. Brett Favre was throwing touchdown passes while replay made the best stadium seat available in your own home. Satellites orbiting above, evolving people into an electronic age, not by their own choosing.

2000's New electronic technologies added so many more channels of communications. Shriners socially communicate daily more through computers and smartphones than one on one contact. Which brings us up to 2...0 and what it means to you.

Hindsight can be 20/20. After a loss, Aaron Rodgers and the Packers can find many skeptics. It's easy to become a Monday morning Quarterback. 20/20 vision of our future can be our most valuable Shrine tool. Clear long range planning of our vision needs to be collectively discussed. Having awareness of current communications in place to reach new candidates of the future is gold. Every issue that arises needs the concentration of 3 possible solutions to achieve resolve.

30 years into this satellite age finds many people frustrated with varying view points because of a generational gap of how we communicate. It hasn't passed or become a fad. It has evolved into the norm and is advancing at the speed of 2020 mph. The younger generation uses modern technology for communication in this fast paced world. Beyond comprehension to most people 10 years ago is in how a vehicle starts. By pressing a button on your key fob while sitting in your living room is now reality. GPS satellite signals guide our cars to places unknown without any use of a glove box map. Paperless society with Banking online. "Hey Google", "Alexia", and blue tooth apps of automation. People talk to devices today instead of to each other. The devises talk back with reason. And we wonder why the numbers of social group members is falling. We can reach these people with 2020 communication channels.

As Shriners we can embrace 2020 with 20/20 vision. Medical technology advancements is leading us to more of an outpatient clinic service over the traditional Shriner hospital system. Just as the 1960's embraced a vision of a moon walk that now set the pace of where we are today. Zor has these communication channels in place today: Telephone, Office mail, Magazine, Website, Eblasts, Facebook, Slack, Zoom, You Tube, Zappar, Instagram and Snapchat all to reach people in where they hang their hat. Many more communication channels coming. Between writing this and a day later proofing...just in...is "Whatsapp". A Masonic brother from Barbados messaged me in even another channel of world communication. Imagineers will keep an eye on this channel as well and keep up with this tornado of activities. Hindsight is indeed 20/20. The future is indeed here. 2...0...2...0 "Imagine That"
