As most of you may be aware of, there was a grass fire on Island on Sunday, March 17th. An extraordinary synergy of community support, education, and equipment played a pivotal role in an effective community response. It demonstrated our ability to swiftly mobilize our trucks and volunteers from their winterized state, achieving significant results. This incident offers a wealth of learning opportunities.

DEB has several key points to debrief and actions to consider for enhancing our future readiness that we are assessing and taking action upon.

Despite it still being winter, with conditions that had responders ankle-deep in mud, the occurrence of a grass fire was a stark wake-up call. Please stay vigilant and take necessary precautions.

TRAINING

MORE INFO ABOUT DNR INITIATIVES

We're highlighting three major initiatives from the Washington State Department of Natural Resources focused on Community Wildfire Resilience and Preparedness:

- Wildfire Ready Neighbors provides practical measures for individuals, independent of community coordination. DNR is introducing it in SJC, with special focus on Decatur. The survey assesses interest and support for island-wide adoption, often a precursor to becoming a Firewise community. [Learn more.](#)

- Firewise USA: This program focuses on creating defensible spaces around structures to enhance fire safety. The Decatur Northwest Community Association, for example, has been a part of Firewise USA and has been accredited since 2009. [Learn more.](#)

- San Juan County's 2012 CWPP is outdated and not on DNR's site, but an archived copy is available [here](#). The SJC Conservation District is updating it, with DEB's involvement, especially advocating for outer islands. DNR supports DEB's USDA grant application for an island-specific CWPP, but the award's uncertainty due to grant criteria. [Learn more.](#)
