I learned the piano as a child and though I didn't get very far with it, I learned enough to appreciate the amazing skills of professional pianists. Two very different performers that I have seen and enjoyed are Jools Holland and Lang Lang. I saw them both at the Albert Hall and on both occasions every seat was taken. They each showed what a keyboard instrument can do in the hands of experts and the speed of their fingers was to be marvelled at. In their different ways they evoked the atmosphere and style of the composer perfectly and took their audiences to another place.
