# Mouthing, Chewing & Biting

#### **MOUTHING:**

This is predominantly a puppy behavior that's often attention seeking in nature.

It's how puppies learn about bite pressure! Their teeth are very sharp and they learn that teeth can hurt! They often mouth each other to initiate play. While normal, we don't want to encourage this behavior.

Adult dogs who put their mouth on you have learned that this is acceptable behavior - it's NOT OKAY!



# **Puppies Mouth Each Other**

Mouthing turns into biting as play arousal increases!



What to do? Shout - HEY or OFF in a gruff voice (not a high pitched squeaky OUCH)! Remove yourself from the puppy. Come back with appropriate chew toys. If your pup continues to bite, end the game. When all else fails,

give your puppy a time out.



## **CHEWING:**

A behavior often exhibited by unsupervised:

- teething puppies
- bored adolescents
- anxious adults






The dog's mouth: A chewing machine!

# Supervise, Redirect & Provide Appropriate Chew Items

### **BITING:**

An <u>aggressive</u> dog is one that is ready to attack. (This dog will bite.)

A <u>reactive</u> dog is one that is responding to stimulus and not likely to attack.

A large number of reactive dogs are actually friendly when specific triggers are removed from the equation. ~Dr. lan Dunbar





#### Why dogs bite:

- Genetics
- Resource guarding
- Fear
- Territorial
- Predatory
- Not properly socialized

This is <u>NOT</u> a training issue. If not addressed when the dog is young, this becomes a lifetime of management.
