
Comparison with other views



Comparison of tribulational Premillennialism.

The <u>contrast</u> with pretribulationism & posttribulationism:

- Pretribulationism views the *parousia*, or <u>Christ's appearing</u>, as a <u>two-stage event</u>; first in the rapture and second his return to earth in the Second Coming.
- Posttribulationism views a single event, both happen simultaneously.
- Disclaimer: by the 1920s, pretribulationism had become the most widely accepted eschatological doctrine in the United

States. It is usually associated with dispensationalism.

 Dispensationalism is a theological framework for interpreting the Bible which maintains that history is divided into multiple ages called "dispensations" in which God interacts with his chosen people in different ways.

Pretribulationism

Pretribulationism is a view within premillennialism that the return of Christ is a two-stage event beginning with the rapture. <u>This occurs just</u> <u>prior to the tribulation</u>, a seven-year period of God's wrath on earth, the end of which will culminate with Christ's Second Coming to set up an earthly kingdom.

- <u>A key issue of disagreement</u>: pretribulationism and posttribulationism, whether the church will experience persecution under Antichrist.
- Pretribulationism teaches, the church is raptured before the tribulation begins, and is thus protected from persecution.
- Posttribulationism believes, the rapture is an event at the end of the tribulation; <u>the church will experience persecution</u> during that time.

Midtribulationism

Midtribulationism is a view that the church will be present on earth during the first half of Daniel's seventieth week (three and one-half years) and will experience tribulation.

- The church will be raptured halfway through the seventieth week and avoid God's outpouring of wrath.
- Similar to posttribulationism, this view makes a distinction between tribulation and wrath.
- It is considered to be a minority and an unstable view, that may be in line with pretribulationism or posttribulationism, depending on the other arguments assumed.
- Recently, this view has been supplanted by the prewrath rapture view.

Protribulationism or Prewrath

The prewrath rapture position is based on two premises.

- First, that the church will enter the last half of Daniel's

seventieth week (the last half of the Great Tribulation),

- Second, that between the rapture of the church and Christ's return there will be a period of divine wrath upon the earth.
