



PROGRAM GUIDELINES Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

April 11, 2022



I. INTRODUCTION

The California Department of Community Services and Development (CSD) developed the following Program Guidelines for the federal Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-24, offering a program design to support the administration of the one-time federally funded relief program providing financial assistance to low-income households to reduce water and wastewater arrearages prior to and during the COVID-19 pandemic.

On December 27, 2020, the Consolidated Appropriations Act was signed into law and appropriated \$638 million to LIHWAP. Additionally, on March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act appropriated \$500 million to LIHWAP. LIHWAP is administered at the federal level by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). CSD was named by Governor Gavin Newsom as the designated agency to administer LIHWAP for the State of California. HHS approved <u>California's LIHWAP State Plan</u> on November 8, 2021.

CSD has been serving low-income communities for more than 50 years. A state department under the California Health and Human Services Agency, CSD has traditionally partnered with a network of non-profit and local government organizations (commonly referred to as Local Service Providers [LSPs]) dedicated to reducing poverty by helping low-income individuals and families achieve and maintain economic security, meet their home energy needs, and reduce their utility costs through energy efficiency upgrades and access to clean renewable energy.

VI. HOUSEHOLD ELIGIBILITY

LSPs are responsible for determining household eligibility in accordance with CSD's eligibility and verification requirements established for LIHEAP. LIHWAP's specific eligibility requirements include:

Applicant	 An applicant must have debt owed to a water system from nonpayment (past due balance) of residential accounts that accrued during any time period; OR
	 An applicant with water or wastewater utilities included in rent must be past due on their rent.
	 Given that LIHWAP benefits must be paid directly to water systems, the applicant's servicing water or wastewater provider must be enrolled to receive direct payment of LIHWAP assistance in order for the applicant to complete successful enrollment in LIHWAP and receive financial assistance.
	Applicants who are current on their water or wastewater bill are ineligible for benefits under the program.

Income	 Total household income must be at or below 60 percent State Median Income (SMI); OR A member of the household must be a current recipient of one of the following federal programs: LIHEAP CalFresh CalWORKs
Documentation	 Proof of income from all household members OR Proof of participation in CalFresh or CalWORKs, or received LIHEAP assistance in the past 120 days. Proof of Identification from applicant by providing a copy of government-issued identification. Copy of water or wastewater bill indicating past due balance or property tax bill if water or wastewater arrearages can be identified. A household with water or wastewater utilities included in rent must be past due on their rent. The following documentation is required: Copy of signed landlord agreement confirming the landlord-tenant relationship and that water and/or wastewater utilities are included in rent, the number of months the tenant is past due, and the amount of water and/or wastewater utilities provided to the rental property occupied by the renter applicant.

2. A free emergency assistance Knox box to assist firefighters in the event you need assistance and cannot get to the door. This prevents damage to the front door or windows. Only firefighters have the key to open the box (not law enforcement) saving valuable time for the patient while they locate another entrance to the home. This will also appear on the dispatch emergency call information that the person has a Knox box and where it is located on the outside of the home. Link below

3. A baseline exterior home inspection program began in 2019 and was interrupted in 2020 by the pandemic. Cal Fire plans on doing exterior home inspections every 3 years in an ongoing program of fire damage prevention.

The Defensible Space Assistance Program (DSAP) is designed to assist homeowners that need to create defensible space, and are not able to do so because of physical, economic or other barriers. It is imperative that all homeowners maintain at least 100 feet of defensible space around their homes to aid in protecting themselves and their communities from the devastation of wildfire.

The population targeted for the DSAP program is those who are not able to do this work for themselves because of physical, economic, or other barriers. For example, lowincome homeowners and physically disabled or elderly individuals who are unable to pay a contractor. The property owner must be the individual to apply for the DSAP Program. Each application will be carefully considered.

- Brush and tree trimming/thinning.
- Dead tree removal, if funding permits and is applicable.
- Raking of dead leaves and pine needles.
- Chipping of removed vegetation. Chips are left onsite.
- On-site education about effective defensible space.
- Initial one-day defensible space clean up.

Guidelines:

- You must be the legal owner of the property to be cleared.
- You must be unable to complete this work due to physical, economic and/or other barriers.
 - One person household: Income is less than \$50,940 annually.
 - Two person household: Income is less than \$58,180 annually.
 - Three person household: Income is less than \$65,480 annually.
 - Four person household: Income is less than \$72,720 annually.
 - Five person household: Income is less than \$78,580 annually.

Low income threshold is determined by the 2021 guidelines for San Diego County Very Low Income. Proof of monthly/yearly income by income tax return, or other comparable means may need to be shared. Income that will be considered is total gross income (income prior to deductions, not gross adjusted income).

Notes:

- This program is funding dependent and services are offered on a first-come, first-served basis as program funds are available.
- This program is offered by the Fire Safe Council San Diego County in partnership with the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County. Funding is currently provided by grants from San Diego Gas & Electric, San Diego River Conservancy, and the United States Forest Service. In accordance with Federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture policy, this institution is prohibited from discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability.

Residential KnoxBox Program



When San Diego County Fire is called upon to help during emergencies, our mission is clear. We reach those in need, as quickly and safely as possible.

Sometimes, we must overcome barriers. Locked doors are among those barriers, when residents cannot reach them due to their conditions.

Our Residential KnoxBox Program is designed to give residents a back-up plan to be accessible during crisis.

Qualifying residents will receive a lock box at no cost. Inside, a spare house key can be stored for access by County Fire during emergencies. County Fire will install the box.

Who Qualifies

Residents who live in Deer Springs Fire Protection District, Ramona Municipal Water District, or San Diego County Fire's service area and identify with at least one of the following:

- 62 years of age or older
- Have a disability
- Needs assistance with one or more Major Life Activity


