#### **HOW LABOR DAY CAME TO BE:**

1882: The Unions of New York City held a parade to celebrate their members and show support for all unions. At least 20,000 people were there, and workers had to give up a day's pay to attend.

**1885–1886**: Labor Day received its first governmental recognition through municipal ordinances.

1887: Parades similar to the first in NYC took placed in different regions of the county. Five states—Oregon, Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York—created a state Labor Day holiday, and Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Nebraska follow suit by the end of the decade.

1894: A South Dakota senator introduced a bill to make Labor Day a federal legal holiday taking place on the first Monday of September, which passed on June 28, 1894.

Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions and achievements of American workers and is traditionally observed on the first Monday in September. It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century and became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day weekend also symbolizes the end of summer for many Americans, and is celebrated with parties, street parades and athletic events.

October is Head Start Awareness Month and it aims to spread awareness about a crucial program that benefits millions of families in the U.S. Head Start assists children belonging to low-income families by providing them with a framework meeting their social, emotional, psychological, nutritional, and health needs.

### **HOW HEAD START CAME TO BE:**

Project Head Start, launched as an eight-week summer program by the Office of Economic Opportunity in 1965, was designed to help break the cycle of poverty by providing preschool children of low-income families with a comprehensive program to meet their emotional, social, health, nutritional, and psychological needs.

In 1969, Head Start was transferred from the Office of Economic Opportunity to the Office of Child Development in the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and has now become the Office of Head Start.

The Head Start program, including the Early Head Start program, was most recently reauthorized in 2007 with bipartisan support.

Veterans Day is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, it is designated as a day to honor the more than 19 million men and women who have served in the U.S. military.

#### **HOW VETERANS DAY CAME TO BE:**

**1919:** Remembrance Day was first observed in **1919**, It was originally called "Armistice Day" to commemorate the armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11.

**1938:** November 11 became a legal holiday dedicated to honoring World War I veterans it was known as Armistice Day.

1954: The act was amended to honor veterans of World War II and Korea as well, and the name of the holiday was changed to Veterans Day. President Dwight D. Eisenhower marked the occasion with a special proclamation.

1968: the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed by Congress, which moved the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October.

International Human Rights Day is observed by the international community every year on 10 December. It commemorates the day United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. (UDHR)

### HOW INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS DAY CAME TO BE:

1946: In response to the "barbarous acts which outraged the conscience of mankind" during the Second World War. Work on the UDHR began with a drafting committee composed of representatives of a wide variety of countries allowing the document to benefit from contributions of states from all regions, and their diverse religious, political and cultural contexts.

1948: The UDHR was finally adopted by the General Assembly in 1948. The Declaration outlines 30 rights and freedoms that belong to all of us and that nobody can take away from us. The rights that were included continue to form the basis for international human rights law. Today, the Declaration remains a living document. It is the most translated document in the world.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (MLK Day) commemorates the life and work of Dr. King, a Baptist minister and prominent leader in the American civil rights movement who advocated for nonviolent resistance against racial segregation. People are encouraged to use the day to "reflect on the principles of racial equality and nonviolent social change espoused by Dr. King.

### HOW MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY CAME TO BE:

Martin Luther King, Jr., Day is usually celebrated with marches, parades and with speeches by civil rights leaders and politicians. Individuals and organizations also undertake volunteer efforts in support of what is often called the MLK Day of Service.

1968: Almost immediately after King's death, there were calls for a national holiday in his honor. Legislation for the holiday had been introduced in Congress, but initially received enough opposition to block its passage.

**1983:** Legislation making Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, the third Monday in January: a federal holiday was finally passed.

1986: Although states and cities began honoring King's birthday, January 15, as early as 1970 it wasn't until 1986 that the first nationwide observance took place.

### **HOW VALENTINE'S DAY CAME TO BE:**

The holiday we know today got its name from a man named Valentine. While a few different stories are told about what he did to inspire the holiday, many people believe he's celebrated for his role as a Roman priest who helped couples secretly get married.

Right before he died, Valentine supposedly wrote the first-ever "valentine" to his jailer's daughter, with whom he'd fallen in love. Later, in the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I declared the day of his death as St. Valentine's Day.

Valentine's Day traditions have evolved a lot over the years. For example, in the Middle Ages—which lasted from the 5th to 15th centuries in Europe—people started exchanging handmade cards with love notes inside. Today billions of dollars are spent on Valentine's Day cards and gifts each year around the world.

Women's History Month is a dedicated month to reflect on the oftenoverlooked contributions of women to United States history, and to celebrate how their efforts and bravery afforded women the opportunities and freedoms they have today. The timeline of women's history milestones stretches back to the founding of the United States.





### **HOW WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH CAME TO BE:**

1978: The actual celebration of Women's History Month grew out of a weeklong celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, California, Presentations were given at dozens of schools, hundreds of students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa.

1980: President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. The U.S. Congress followed suit the next year, passing a resolution establishing a national celebration.

**1987:** The National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March.

Every year on April 22, people around the world celebrate Earth Day. The day marks the start of the environmental movement in 1970, and for the past 52 years has resulted in policy change and a greater awareness of the environment.

#### **HOW EARTH DAY CAME TO BE:**

1962: The stage was set for change with the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring. The book represented a watershed moment,

selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries as it raised public awareness and concern

for living organisms, the environment and the inextricable links between pollution and public health.

1970: the first Earth Day led to the creation of the United States
Environmental

Protection Agency and the passage of other first of their kind environmental laws,

including the National Environmental Education Act, the Occupational Safety and

Health Act, and the Clean Air Act. These laws have protected millions of men, women

and children from disease and death and have protected hundreds of species from extinction.

1990: Earth Day went global, mobilizing 200 million people in 141 countries and lifting

Environmental issues onto the world stage. Earth Day 1990 gave a huge boost to

recycling efforts worldwide and helped pave the way for the 1992 United Nations Earth Summit in Rio.

### HOW MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH CAME TO BE:

1909: Mental Health America was Founded and Clifford Beers established the

National Committee for Mental Hygiene, now known as Mental Health America.

1913: The Clifford Beers Clinic in New Haven is established and it is the first outpatient clinic for mental health patients in the U.S.A.

**1948:** The World Federation for Mental Health comes into existence,

which is affiliated with numerous NGOs and volunteers.

1949: Mental Health Awareness Month began in the United States, it was started by the Mental Health America (MHA) organization (then known as the National Association for Mental Health).

1776: The first effective celebration of Independence Day was held in

Philadelphia. After the people were summoned by the ringing of the Liberty Bell

the first public reading of The Declaration of Independence took place.

1781: Massachusetts became the first state to recognize the Fourth of July as an official holiday.

**1801:** The White House held its first Fourth of July Party.

1870: Congress made Independence Day an official holiday for federal employees that worked in Washington, D.C.

**1938:** Congress formalized Independence Day as an official federal paid holiday.

Since the 1960s, National Back to School Month has been observed during the month of August. In the United States, the school year traditionally starts in the fall and ends in the spring. This schedule was created with the intention of allowing children in farming families to be home to help out during the planting and harvesting seasons in our primarily agricultural society. With more families living in urban and suburban areas, some schools have shifted to a year-round or alternative academic calendar, but the majority of schools still keep a start date sometime in August, making it the perfect awareness month for back-to-school preparations.



1635 The first school is founded

The Mather School, founded in Dorchester, MA, became the first public school in North America supported by tax dollars.

This was the first year that all 50 states required students to complete their elementary schooling.
