FARMER FINDS LIVE INFANT IN A VALISE

Passenger on Train Had Evidently Tried to Throw Child Into River.

DE SOTO Mo., Aug. 16.-William Helm, a farmer living near Irondale, Mo., found a valise alongside the Iron Mountain tracks late yesterday afternoon. He started to carry the valise to the station, when he was startled by the crying of a baby. Being unable to open the grip, which was locked, he cut it open with a knife and found a boy baby inside, about five days old.

The grip and babe had evidently been thrown off train No. 4, which passed that point at 5:30 p. m. It had lodged in a treetop and from thence fallen to the ground, where Helm found it. child was but little injured.

The railroad crosses a big river at this point and is nearly 100 feet above the water. It was evidently the intention to throw the child into the river.














