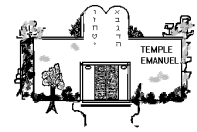

Dear Friends,

The Small Stones

I hope that all of you had a great summer and that you are now ready for the challenges of New Year 5785. I look forward to this special time when our spirit is elevated and energized for the rest of the year. The Ritual Committee is working extra hours in preparation for the holidays, and they should be blessed for their effort. This September Bulletin will include a wealth of information regarding the holidays, times of services, and the various rituals. Please keep it and use it as a guide for the coming events.

According to the Jewish tradition, there are ten days between Rosh Hashanah (The Jewish New Year) and Yom Kippur (The Day of Atonement); they are called "*Aseret Y'mei T'shuva*" ("Ten Days of Repentance and Return to God").

Regarding these special days, the prophet Isaiah said, "Seek the L-rd while He may be found, call unto Him while he is near." For although G-d listens to one's prayer throughout the year, during these ten days He is more forgiving and grants our requests much faster.

Our Rabbis remind us that we were created in the image of G-d and that G-d's behavior toward us reflects how we should behave toward others. If we are to expect G-d to forgive us, we, too, must be willing to forgive others for their wrongdoing against us. This is not exclusive to the ten days between the Jewish New Year and The Day of Atonement, but it applies to each day of the year.

In fact, in the prayers we recite each night before going to sleep, we say:
"Master of the Universe, I hereby forgive anyone who angered or antagonized me or who sinned against me; whether against my body, my property, my honor, or against anything of mine; whether he did so accidentally, willfully, carelessly, or purposely... may no one be punished because of me. May it be Your will, my G-d and the G-d of my fathers, that I may sin no more, that I not return to them, that I never again anger you, that I shall not do what is evil in your eyes. Whatever sins I have done before you, may you blot out in your abundant mercies."

I want to tell you a famous Chassidic tale that occurred years ago on the evening of Yom Kippur. On Erev Yom Kippur, a Chassidic rebbe sat with his three disciples, trying to prepare them for the lessons of *teshuva*, of repentance. He asked each disciple, "What were your sins this year?" "Rebbe," the first disciple replied, "I know that I sinned one terrible sin this year." "Go then," the Rebbe said to him, "and find me one large stone." The second disciple said, "Rebbe, I sinned a few times this year." "Go then," the Rebbe answered, "and find me four or five stones." The third disciple approached. "I sinned many small times, little, different,

inconsequential things. I can't remember each and every one." "Go then," the Rebbe said to him, "and find me many small stones." This tale is a powerful reminder of the importance of acknowledging even the smallest of sins and the need for constant repentance.

The disciples left and went about their tasks. When they returned, the Rebbe said, "Now go back to the street," he instructed, "and replace the stones you have brought to exactly the same spot from where you took every one." The disciples ran out and did this task; all but the third returned. He was gone all day. Just moments before the Shofar (ram's horn) was to be sounded, he ran into the synagogue. "Rebbe," he cried, "I searched and searched all night and all day to find each exact spot for my many small stones. I simply could not do it." "So, it is with sins," the Rebbe taught. "The large ones are easy to remember and thus rectify. But you can never remember all the little and seemingly insignificant ones, and the task of correcting each and every one is so hard it could take a lifetime, and you might never be able to fulfill that. This is why you must correct each as it happens, or you will be left with the little things to burden your life and weigh down your heart."

Mira and I want to wish each one of you a year of health, peace, and happiness.

May the coming year be as sweet as honey for you.

Le Shanah Tovah Tikatevu. May you be inscribed in the Book of Life.

A popular practice during Rosh Hashanah is Tashlich ("casting off"). We walk to flowing water and empty our pockets, symbolically casting off our sins. Small pieces of bread are commonly put in the pocket to cast off. This practice is not discussed in the Bible, but is a long-standing custom. Tashlich is observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah and will be held on **Thursday, October 3**. We hope you will join us for Temple Emanu-El's Tashlich Ceremony immediately following Rosh Hashanah morning services, as we walk together to the ocean and cast off our "sins" of the past year. Bread crumbs will be provided.

ROSH HASHANAH - Erev Rosh Hashanah begins Wednesday evening, October 2

Of all the Jewish holidays, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the most spiritual, in the sense that they have no historical or agricultural reference. They are days solely devoted to the relationship between man and man, and between man and God. *Teshuvah*, repentance, is the theme of the season.

The word *Teshuvah*, which we usually translate as “Repentance” comes from a root meaning “return.” There are profound implications here—that man is capable of wrong but that he is also able to return to a more correct path. Judaism rejects the notion that we are irreparably flawed, unable to control our actions, and doomed to sinful behavior.

ROSH HASHANAH AT HOME

Rosh Hashanah, unlike the secular New Year, is both a solemn and festive occasion. Its joy is spiritually defined by the sacred traditions of home and synagogue. Although the observance of the High Holy Days is centered primarily in the synagogue, the home is where the family prepares to meet the New Year in the spirit of faith and in a mood conducive to prayer and soul-searching.

The obligations to honor and enjoy the festival are fulfilled by preparations like bathing, haircuts, special (new) clothing and cleaning the house. A husband must buy new clothing and jewelry for his wife. Treats are given to the children. The table is set with a white cloth and a centerpiece of flowers—symbolic of purity and joy, candlesticks, wine and challot to symbolize a full, round year, as well as a dish of honey and sliced apples.

- The family gathers together for the lighting of candles and the Kiddush, which precedes the festival meal on both Rosh Hashanah nights. The woman of the household lights candles before sunset on the first night, and—for the second night—a half hour after sunset IF the first night was on Shabbat. The following blessing is recited over the candles:

Barukh Atah Adonai Elohaynu melekh ha-olam, asher kideshanu, B'mitzvotav vitzivanu lehadlik ner shel Yom Tov. “Blessed are Thou, O Lord our G-d, king of the Universe, who has sanctified us by Thy commandments and instructed us to kindle the Festival Lights.”

Barukh atah Adonai Elohaynu melekh ha-olam shehe-cheyanu, vekiyemanu, vehigiyanu lazeman hazeh. “Blessed art Thou, Lord, Our G-d, King of the Universe, who has kept us in life, preserved us, and enabled us to reach this season.”

- After the *Kiddush*, *Ha-motzi* is recited over the challot.
- Then, all members of the family dip the apples in honey and recite the following blessing and prayer:
Yehi Ratzon Milefanechah Adonai Elohaynu ve-Elohay avotaynu, shetehadesh alaynu shanah tovah umetukah, “May it be thy will, O Lord our G-d to renew unto us a happy and sweet new Year.”

THE NEW YEAR'S GREETING

On Rosh Hashanah we greet one another **L'Shanah Tovah Tikatevu**, “May you be inscribed for a good year.” This is based on a Talmudic legend that the truly righteous are inscribed in the Book of Life immediately, while most of us have to wait until Yom Kippur, after we have repented, prayed and fasted. The implication of the *L'Shanah Tovah* wish, then, is that we hope and trust that you are among the truly righteous who are inscribed in the Book of Life.

TASHLICH CEREMONY

Everyone is invited to participate in the traditional Tashlich Ceremony on Thursday, October 3 (following morning services) on the beach at the end of 65th Avenue North. The Tashlich Ceremony is a brief service of readings and songs. All will be given an opportunity to cast bread crumbs into the water as a symbolic enactment of a verse in Micah: “And cast your sins upon the water.” Join us for this holiday tradition.

FOOD FOR ROSH HASHANAH

Dip the *Challah of Hamotzi* into honey to signify our hope for a sweet year.



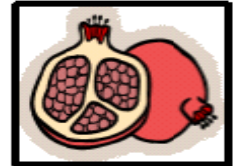
DATES

Recite *borei p'ree haetz* (having in mind that this *brachah* goes for the other fruits as well). Taste the date and say: "May it be Your will...that our enemies be eliminated."



POMEGRANATES

Before tasting, say: "May it be Your will...that we have many good deeds like (the seeds of) the pomegranate."



APPLES IN HONEY

Dip a piece of apple into honey, then say: "May it be Your will... to usher in upon us a good and sweet year."



FISH

Before eating the fish, recite: "May it be Your will...that we be fruitful and multiply like fish."



FISH HEAD

Before tasting, recite: "May it be Your will...that we be likened to the head, not to the tail."



CARROTS

Before partaking of carrots or carrot tzimmes, say: "May it be Your will...that our merits be multiplied."



Rosh Hashanah Apple Cake

Yields 1 9x13 inch cake

Ingredients:

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups white sugar
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 cups diced apple without peel



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease and flour one 9x13 inch cake pan. Beat vegetable oil and eggs until foamy. Add the sugar, flour, ground cinnamon, baking soda, salt, and vanilla and mix well. Stir in the diced apples. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 30 to 40 minutes. Cool cake in pan for 10 minutes. Cake needs no frosting.
