New Year's Resolution 5785

Dear Friends,

We celebrate Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, from the evening of October 2 through the evening of October 4.

Rosh Hashanah means "the head of the year" in Hebrew.

Now let us examine "Shanah." It does mean "year." But the noun "Shanah" is based on the verb "Shaneh," which means "to change."

So, Rosh Hashanah means "If you use your head, you can change." And on the New Year, we desire to improve, to change for the better. We get another hint for that concept from the word "Shofar," the ram's horn that we blow on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The root word or the verb for "Shofar" in Hebrew is "Leshaper," which means "to improve."

Our tradition claims we can change, adapt, and adjust our way of life to unforeseen circumstances.

This year, this idea is drastically interpreted in the way Jews all over the world celebrate the High Holidays; it will be very different from past years.

This year, the awful massacre of October 7 in Israel and the increase of anti-Semitic incidents in the US and around the world will be on our minds.

Our thoughts and prayers will be with our brothers and sisters in Israel when we pray and meditate this year. We will think about the thousands of families affected by this pogrom. Almost every Israeli knows someone who was killed, injured, or kidnapped by the brutal terrorists of Hamas. These High Holidays will be somber, solemn, and emotionally draining for many families.

I am sure that the events of the past year will greatly affect the introspection associated with Rosh Hashanah and our New Year's resolutions.

I turn to our tradition in search of some answers in this painful time. Jewishly speaking,

we say that בל ישראל ערבין זה זה (All of Israel Are Responsible for One Another), which means that we have a moral and religious obligation as Jews to help other Jews in their time of need.

After the pogrom of October 7, our community supported Israel in many ways. We had an amazing and inspiring solidarity rally, and we provided financial support to Friends of the IDF, Israel Magen David Adom, and Hillel, to name just a few of the tzedakah projects we took on ourselves. However, now, almost a year after the pogrom, we need to refocus our attention and our support of Israel. Every day, Israelis are being attacked by many missiles from Lebanon and Gaza. There are still tens of thousands of Israelis who are refugees in their own country. The cities and villages near the Lebanese border in the north and Gaza in the south are ghost towns because they are still being attacked daily. Some Israeli children haven't gone to school for almost a year. This war is far from over. It is one of the longest wars Israel has experienced in recent history; it is going on, on seven fronts. The enemies of Israel attacked her from Gaza, Lebanon, Yemen, Iran, Syria, Iraq, and Judea and Samaria.

The war drains the limited Israeli resources, and the world is pressuring Israel for a cease-fire regardless of the outcome.

If we truly believe in Rosh Hashanah's message of change and improvement, we must include in our New Year's resolution that we will support our brothers and sisters in Israel even more.

Mira and I wish each of you a year of health, peace, and happiness.

Le Shana Tova Tikatavu. May you be inscribed in the Book of Life.

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

A popular practice during Rosh Hashanah is Tashlich ("casting off"). We walk to flowing water and empty our pockets, symbolically casting off our sins. Small pieces of bread are commonly put in the pocket to cast off. This practice is not discussed in the Bible, but is a long-standing custom. Tashlich is observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah and will be held on **Thursday**, **October 3**. We hope you will join us for Temple Emanu-El's Tashlich Ceremony immediately following Rosh Hashanah morning services as we walk together to the ocean and cast off our "sins" of the past year. Bread crumbs will be provided.

WE USHER IN YOM KIPPUR WITH KOL NIDRE Friday, October 11 and Saturday, October 12

Yom Kippur, The Day of Atonement, also called the Sabbath of Sabbaths, is considered by many to be the holiest day of the Jewish New Year. It is a day in which tradition suggests that each person's record is received by G-d, and their worthiness appraised. We ask forgiveness for our sins and for our failings and pray for strength to improve in the future. It is also a time of fasting, prayer and solemnity, and opportunity for Jewish ritual to shape our identities and reshape our character. For many, the Yom Kippur holiday has woven into it the fabric of memory and nostalgia of earlier years. Yom Kippur is the one religious occasion that is observed almost in its entirety in the synagogue. The day, however, is preceded by a meal, which is intended to serve as a spiritual experience for the entire family. The meal is eaten early so that the family can be in the synagogue for the Kol Nidre service, which begins at 6:30pm.

<u>Blessing for Candles</u>: On Yom Kippur eve, since it is Shabbat, the following blessing is recited: Barukh atah Adonai elohaynu melekh ha-olam, asher kidshanu bemitzvatov vetzivanu lehadlik ner shel Shabbat v'shel Yom Ha'kippurim. The Shahecheyanu is also said. Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has sanctified us by Thy Commandments and instructed us to kindle the Festival Lights.

<u>Blessing the Children</u>: It is a beautiful tradition that before leaving for the synagogue for Kol Nidre, parents bless their children and wish them well in the year to come, to become good Jews and decent, moral human beings making their contributions to the community, to the Jewish people, and to mankind.

Memorial Yahrzeit Candle: It is customary to light a memorial yahrzeit candle on Kol Nidre Eve for dear departed in the family. The memorial yahrzeit candle must be lit before the holiday candles are lit.

Fasting on Yom Kippur: It is a Biblical law that mandates every Jew, unless ill, fast for the full day of Yom Kippur. Anyone who retains the most elementary sense of Jewish feeling will observe this day in fast. The reasons for fasting are numerous. These include the fact that it is one of the basic Biblical commandments as described in the Book of Leviticus. Fasting is a sign of contrition, the act of self-sacrifice, which shows that our remorse is more than lip service. We fast also because this act of self-discipline helps us to focus on what is spiritual in us, on the soul instead of the body and prepares us to face G-d in prayer and repentance, as we seek His forgiveness and blessing for life and health in the New Year. We also fast to help awaken within us the compassion to recognize a troubled humanity, that many live in hunger and need, and we do what we can for mankind. Children who are thirteen and have celebrated their Bar/Bat Mitzvah are required to fast. Children somewhat younger may be trained and educated to fast at least part of the day.

Synagogue Services: Members of the family spend a good deal of the twenty-five hours of Yom Kippur in the synagogue. The first service of the day, which is held on Sunday evening, is the touching and memory-filled Kol Nidre service. Throughout the course of the following day, the congregation participates in the confession of sins, the hearing of the Torah, the challenging message of the prophetic readings from Isaiah, and the Yizkor service, and we conclude with the Musaf service. The Mincha service is followed by the Ne'ilah service, which is one of the most moving of holiday services. It features the entire congregation singing as one chorus, raising its voice in prayer to G-d on behalf of our individual well-being and the well-being of the entire community, using the metaphor that our prayers will be accepted before the Ne'ilah—closing the Heaven's gates. The Ne'ilah service is concluded with the blowing of the Shofar, heralding our hope for a year of health and peace for all mankind.

Break-the-Fast: Break-the-Fast will be at 7:21 PM this year.



Sukkot Services



Thursday, October 17, at 10 AM

The Torah refers to the holiday of Sukkot as Chag Ha'assif -"gathering of the harvest.," The Torah tells us (Leviticus 23:39-43), "On the fifteenth day of the seventh month, when you have gathered the fruits of the land, you shall keep the feast of the L-rd seven days... You shall dwell in booths (Sukkot) seven days."

There are two mitzvoth unique to Sukkot. We eat our meals in the Sukkah, a temporary hut covered with branches. The Torah (Leviticus 23:42) tells us the reason for sitting in the Sukkah: "In booths [Sukkot] you shall dwell for seven days, so that your generations will know that I have made the children of Israel dwell in Sukkot when I brought them out of the land of Egypt." The word Sukkah means "shade." The Torah is referring to the clouds that G-d provided the children of Israel during the 40 years they were traveling through the Sinai desert. The clouds protected them from the heat of the sun. We remember this miracle by sitting in the Sukkah during this holiday. The second mitzvah unique to this holiday is reciting the blessing everyday (except on Shabbat) over the "Arbaa Minim" - "the Four Kinds": Etrog (citrus), Lulay (palm branch), Haddasim (3 myrtle branches) and Aravot (2 willow branches).

Please join us as we pray, shake the Lulay, and gather in our beautiful Sukkah for Kiddush.



Shemini Atzeret will be celebrated on Thursday, October 24, at 10 AM.

This service will include **Yizkor.**



All men, women, and children are invited to come sing, dance, and celebrate the joyous festival of *Simchat Torah* on Thursday, October 24, at 7 PM! This is when we close the cycle of the Torah reading for the year, and then we begin again.


