The Search Features

Most used car website allow you to set filters, and doing so is beneficial to your search. By using the appropriate filters, you can find the best deal for yourself. To begin with, when you search for a used car, search for vehicles with under 100,000 miles, preferably under 70,000. You don't want a vehicle with too many miles. **Anything over 120,000 is overly risky.**

You can also choose the distance you're willing to travel for a car. In big cities like Chicago, **some of the best car deals come from the surrounding suburbs** and states. Chicago is relatively close to Indiana as an example, and cities within Indiana typically have lower used car prices than Chicago. Leverage this feature.

On top of that, many used car websites notify you of damage. **If you see "rebranded title" avoid it.** That means the car was once in a wreck so bad, it was determined totaled. There could still be underlying damage that isn't obvious. Also, if you don't see pictures, don't waste your energy.

Still, this article wouldn't be complete without mentioning the "sort" feature. This allows you to see the cars in a specific order based on what you choose. **You can sort by price, distance, miles or other variables.** I suggest sorting by price and seeing what you get. But do what works best for you. Whatever you do, be careful of where you buy cars.

The Best Used Car Sources

You might see a "For Sale" sign in the window of a vehicle that's been parked in the gas station for a month. You might notice a "car for sale" sitting in a driveway. The price might even seem reasonable. Don't do it. There are better options.

The Good
