## **Pastor Speaks**

**Dear Parishioners:** 

#### In Praise of Human Labor

"Now therefore, Israel, hear the statutes and ordinances I am teaching you to observe, that you may live, and may enter in and take possession of the land which the LORD, the God of your ancestors, is giving you" (Deut. 4:1).

This weekend is Labor Day weekend. With the summer holidays drawing to a close, this weekend we celebrate human labor and acknowledge the immense contributions of all the hardworking individuals, active and retired, whose efforts continue to supply this nation's needs and position it to share with the rest of the world, especially struggling nations and families.

The weekend also reminds us to connect with the founders of this nation, the trailblazers, the path-markers, the pioneer "builders" and "creators."

As Moses, the visionary leader we hear about in the first reading eloquently uttered to the Israelites, the early settlers perceptibly saw in advance the enormous potential of people present and future laboring together to establish one rich and great nation under God; so, they laid the foundation and contributed their part to the nation-building.

Besides establishing one nation under God, they also ensconced God's commandments and Christian principles on walls, on the pages of the Constitution, and on the dollar bill to remind us that as we labor and earn our living, we do not have to forget that "All good giving and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no alteration or shadow caused by change. (James 1:17).

At the outset of the nation-building, families learned at home and the utility of the Bible as the main source in advancing learning, good values in general, and hard work was without question. People learned to read so that they could read the Bible and worship God from whom our freedom comes.

As we celebrate the blessing of human and productive labor, it will serve us to heed the caution given by Jesus in this weekend's gospel: You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition." Mark 7:8).
