## PASTOR SPEAKS

## In Praise of God and the Jubilee Year of Hope

The Bible promises many blessings to us when we follow God's instructions. Some instructions relate to times and seasons, such as keeping the Sabbath and the year of jubilee. Others are about spending time with Him, such as daily prayer and weekly gatherings to honor Him.

Throughout history, we recognize that most great believers who experienced God's abundant blessings honored God promptly by following His instructions and spending regular time with Him and we are similarly encouraged to engage in.

To that end, the Jubilee Year 2025 has come upon us. The practice originated in Judaism and is enshrined in the Old Testament; it is one of the most instructive practices given to the people to observe.

God instructed Moses to establish a year of jubilee, as we learn from the book of Leviticus Chapter 25. Just as the seventh day of the week was the Sabbath, a day of rest, the Jews were to keep every seventh year as a "Sabbatical year" – a year of rest. The jubilee year took place after seven cycles of seven years, on the fiftieth year.

By its unique nature, a jubilee year in the Jewish tradition was meant to be a time for the Israelites, as God's people, to re-establish proper relationships with Him, one another, and other creations. Hence, it marked a period of forgiveness, debt cancellation, and restitution.

The practice has been part of the Catholic tradition for several centuries. The first record of a Christian jubilee was declared by Pope Boniface VIII in 1300, and it was known as the "Holy Year" since it was seen as the time God's holiness was to transform us.

The frequency of jubilee years in the Church has changed over time. Initially, they were celebrated every 100 years; later, in 1343, Pope Clement VI reduced the gap between jubilees to 50 years, and in 1470, Pope Paul II made it every 25 years. For reasons, some special jubilees may be called *extraordinary* as the Jubilee of 2015, which Pope Francis proclaimed as The Year of Mercy.

Thus, in the Church, initially, the jubilee celebration included a plenary indulgence obtained by those who confessed their sins and daily visited the Basilicas of St. Peter and St. Paul Outside the Wall for a specific number of days. Later the Church added other basilicas where the faithful could visit and they attain plenary indulgence.

Over time, the Church expanded the features and signs that have become the defining features of the jubilee celebrations, including the opening and closing of Holy Doors, pilgrimages, the sacrament of reconciliation, special prayers, indulgence, etc.

Because this year is dedicated to honoring the Lord as a Jubilee Year, we will continue to highlight this regularly in the bulletin and during Mass.
