PASTOR SPEAKS

Feast of Saints Peter and Paul: "You are the Christ"

Church Dear Friends,

Today, Holy Mother ch celebrates the memory of two of the most iconic founders of our cherished faith—Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles. Though called and sent on distinct missions—Peter as the apostle to the Jews and Paul as the apostle to the Gentiles—they together laid a firm foundation for the Church across the nations. Through their tireless work, they handed down to us the faith and mission entrusted to them by the Lord of the harvest. As Pope Benedict XVI once said, "Christian tradition has always considered Saints Peter and Paul inseparable: indeed, together, they represent the whole Gospel of Christ."

Jesus Christ founded His Church on the faith of Peter, and Paul became the greatest evangelist in the Church's history. These two saints are not only remembered as pillars of the faith and symbols of the Catholic Church, but tradition also holds that both were martyred around the same time under Emperor Nero's persecution.

When we look closely at the individuals behind these great biblical figures, we see distinct personalities—Peter, impetuous and sometimes fearful, Paul, intense and bold. And yet, we recognize how God used their differences for His purpose. This teaches us that God can use each of us, with all our uniqueness, to serve His glory. Peter's passionate love was channeled into pastoral care for Christ's flock, while Paul's rigorous Pharisaic training and powerful character were used to bring the light of the Gospel to the Gentiles, who had long lived in ignorance of the true God.

At the heart of today's Gospel are two critical questions Jesus asked His disciples—and continues to ask us today: "Who do people say that I am?" and "Who do you say that I am?" The responses then revealed widespread confusion about Jesus' identity. Sadly, that same lack of knowledge, faith, and even rejection of Jesus still persists today. While the people may have changed, the challenge remains the same.

You may already be familiar with the statistics. According to Pew Research, today, people aged 18-39 are less likely to consider religion as important to them compared to those ages 40 and older. Moreover, just 19% of the U.S. population identifies as Catholic. Regionally, 19% are in the Midwest, 26% in the Northeast, 29% in the South, and 25% in the West. These figures point to a sobering reality, but not a hopeless one.

Rather than despair, let us pray to the Lord of the harvest, who transformed Saul into Paul, that He may use each of us—weaknesses and all—as witnesses to the faith. Let us draw strength from Saints Peter and Paul, who show us that our talents, limitations, and even disagreements can become instruments of God's transformative grace. They remind us that unity in diversity is possible in the Church, and that through God's grace, reconciliation is always within reach.

Let us never stop answering the Lord's question: "Who am I to you?" As Pope Francis urges us, "Let us give Him an answer today—one that comes from the heart." We do not need to be perfect for God to work through us. Just as He worked through Peter and Paul, He can work through us—flaws, failures, and all.
