5th Sunday of Lent-Christian Disciplines and Newness

Sports are by no small means a favorite American pastime. Many young people engage in one or several sports during the school year; families spend time with their favorite teams and games.

But you see, sports have several familiar parallels with the Christian life and disciplines. This may sound familiar to you: "Amy Van Dyken returns to competition for the first time since being paralyzed," and "Colby Stevenson survived a horrific car crash and is now a Team USA Olympian." Maybe not surprising, but these folks end up with medals.

Athletes, skiers, swimmers, footballers, skaters, and gymnasts undergo severe training to remain in their game and enjoy doing what they love. They may get hurt from practice or other events, but they hardly permit such injuries to stop from doing what they love. Instead, they recover, work out and get back to their game.

The immeasurable love of God that is given to us, and which we are called to reflect in our attitude and conduct as Christians, leads St. Paul to relate Christian discipline to sports. Paul's reason for intimating, "I, for my part, do not consider myself to have taken possession. Just one thing: forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead, I continue my pursuit of the goal, the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13-16) was his familiarity with the gymnasium.


Since Paul grew up in the Greek city of Tarsus, there is no doubt that he was familiar with Greek gym activities and winning medals. He might not have engaged in sports due to his Jewish background, as Jews frowned upon the gym, Cf. (2Macabees), but he certainly was aware of the benefits of the strenuous activities that took place there.

Paul acknowledges the challenges of being Christian; therefore, he always urged committed effort on the part of Christians to keep at it "towards the prize of God's upward calling" (Philippians 3:14) and "the glory to be revealed to us" (Romans 8:18).

What is unique with faithfulness to the Christian disciplines is that the crown is assured to all, not just the holiest. It explains why Jesus said to the woman in the gospel narrative as the two of them were left standing there alone, "woman, has no one condemned you? She said, "No one, sir." Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin anymore." That's it!

Jesus believed in the woman. He knew she was created good; therefore, her corrupted will could be healed with God's love and grace. It also supports the passage from Isaiah in the first reading: "Remember not the past events, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" Newness is a gift of God, and He is willing to give it to us if we don't give up on Him or on ourselves, and only if one wants it.
