Most of us can probably remember a time in our lives growing up when we were afraid. Often in the midst of that fear, we would reach for our mom or dad's hand. As one of them held our hand, the fear may still have been there, but we also felt safe. We knew our parents were there, that they wouldn't leave us...that we would be okay because they loved us.

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension which commemorates Jesus's ascension into heaven 40 days after his resurrection. Normally, the feast is celebrated on the 6th Thursday of Easter, but it can also be celebrated on the Sunday after that, which is what we do. Jesus in his human body leaves the world for the last time, fulfilling the final stage of the Paschal Mystery: Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension into heaven.

This was also the time when the disciples were coming to the end of three incredible years with Jesus physically at their side. They had seen him heal the sick, cast out demons, stand up against the Pharisees, raise the dead, and feed thousands with a few fish. They had also watched him die a brutal, agonizing death, only to rise from the dead and walk with them and teach them even more. Now he was about to ascend into heaven, and he was giving them an incredible responsibility, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15)

Barely a month had passed since the Romans had crucified Jesus, and the religious leaders of the Jews, the one-time religious leaders of the disciples themselves, had conspired with the Romans for his murder to take place. Now Jesus was leaving. Even though he had sent the disciples on missions before, it was always with the plan of them returning to his side to learn and grow again. But now he would not be there for them to turn to, physically. We can only imagine how afraid they must have been.

But, like our mom or dad taking our hand when we were afraid, Jesus acknowledged their fears and said, "I am with you always, until the end of the world." (Matthew 28:20) He wasn't leaving them alone. He would be with them through it all, speaking truth to their hearts, because he knew what they would have to face to accomplish their mission. Their faith would be tested, and the road wouldn't be easy. He was right. Every one of the apostles, except for John, was murdered for his faith, and John would die in exile. But even in death they were not alone. Jesus was at their sides.

The same is true for us. Just think of everything we have been through this last year: pandemic, political strife, civil unrest, and closer to home, the anxiety many may be feeling about the restructuring of our Cluster. In every moment of fear, every breath of uncertainty, Jesus has never left our side. As he promised the disciples, he is with us always, even to the end of all we know. The fear may persist, but we are never alone.




