PASTOR SPEAKS

16th Sunday: On Choosing God's Way

This weekend, we continue with our study or reading of Matthew Chapter 13. We notice that the string of parable presentation continues. Jesus follows the parable of the sower, which we studied last weekend with three more agricultural images: the parable of good seeds in the field, the parable of the weeds, and the parable of the mustard seed; He then concludes with a fourth parable, that of the yeast.

It is the characteristics of great teachers to be mindful of their listeners and convey their message clearly to them in familiar language, metaphors, and examples. Such was the purpose and the contexts of Jesus' many parables. The risk for those of us who are secondary listeners of Jesus' teachings is that sometimes the parables themselves could appear confusing and distorting to our understanding of what Jesus intended for His listeners.

Think about it this way. Most of the time, we must enter into the biblical world of the time so we can figure the meaning of some things Jesus says. Take as an instance when Jesus said "It is easier for a camel to go through the *eye of a needle* than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God" (Matthew 19:24), or the report that John the Baptist ate "*locusts*" and wild honey in the Judean desert(Cf. Matthew 3:4).

It is only when entering the biblical world in which Jesus presented these teachings that we discover that the *eye of a needle* is actually a tunnel in Jerusalem, and *locusts* are fruits that grow in the desert. In this case the ambiguity is removed.

The point I am trying to make here is that following Jesus' teachings in order to apply it to our lives means that we must understand them. Many times, once we understand something, our appreciation of it becomes elevated, and the application of it to our lives becomes easier.

The effort required in understanding the Bible calls for some time investment; one must intend to know and understand the message of Jesus to make such investment.

But unless we enter into the biblical world, we won't grasp the depth of what the scriptures teach and pay attention to the lessons. It was Pope St. Gregory the Great (d. 604) who said that the more we learn and know the Bible, we become like an *elephant* and the less we study and understand it, we are like a *mouse* in the wilderness of scripture.

With that in mind, the various images employed in the gospel today reveal to us the complex reality of living in the world as Christians. Each of the images in the parables reveal some aspect of the Christian life and how delicate and valuable it must mean to us.

The salvation we have received from our baptism is described as **good seed** or **mustard seed** or **yeast**. What it means is that for our Christian life to grow, we are expected to protect and nourish it. Therefore, it is essential that we are aware of the "weeds" that may be growing alongside to prevent our true growth.
