

# To Our Parishioners & Friends

## What is This?

Two friends who have not seen each other for some time happened to accidentally bump into each other. One of them looked rather discontent and gloomy, so the other said to him, "Hey, it's so good to see you; however, you don't seem excited!" Responding in a rather disappointing tone, he said to the friend, "You really don't understand. Four months ago, my auntie died and quite unexpectedly, she left me \$45, 000. The next month, my cousin died, and he also left me \$30,000. Then last month, an uncle of mine, whom I was not even close to, also died and left me \$25, 000." By this time, the friend was getting confused and retorted, "But if you're getting all these amounts of money, why are you not excited?" His answer was, "You don't get it. This month is almost over and so far, nothing!"

The liturgy for this weekend points to the centrality of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist and invites us to constantly fix our gaze on him and come to receive him with gratitude. The beautiful reading from Exodus illustrates how the Israelites fluctuated in their sense of gratitude to God and Moses. After 400 years of sojourning in Egypt, God used another human being, Moses, to liberate them through extraordinary acts right before their eyes.

While leading the Israelites little by little to the promised land, the father desired to satisfy them and make them joyful people. Yet, we see how their initial sense of gratitude for this liberation and victory journey to the promised land started to wither as they met bumps and roadblocks on the way. Physical exhaustion, emotional distress, hunger, and thirst triggered memories of sitting by "our fleshpots and ate our fill of bread!" To sustain them so that he can accomplish his purpose, God provided them with manna.

As they saw the manna for the first time, Moses answered their question, "What is this?" by telling them, "This is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat." Notice how Moses clearly described the manna, "This is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat." The manna was only for nourishment. However, notice Jesus' answer to the people when they asked him for a sign so that they could believe in him: "For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." And here is the stunning part, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst."

As we follow Jesus and try to conform to his holy nature by letting go of bad habits, fleeting things, easy life, and others, Paul urges us in the second reading that there are moments we miss the fleshpots of such past life and cravings. However, we remember that nothing is more fulfilling and life-giving than the Eucharist. It is the reason we should seek and receive the Eucharist, our true bread from heaven in the spirit of gratitude and thanksgiving in our hearts.
