

### **Sacrament Reconciliation**

Before Mass or call Parish Office for arrangement with Priest. "Is Christ here or not?" Jarred by the sudden and insistent voice as I exited the Church, I looked up, turned and found a woman standing beside me. She said, again, "Is Christ here or not?" "Excuse me," I replied, "what do you mean?" With an incredulous shake of her head, she spun around and started walking away from me. Both alarmed and intrigued I followed attempting to keep pace saying, "Wait! Yes! Christ is here!" She turned back in my direction halting my step. "Yes, Christ is here! That's the right answer!" she said smilingly. Quickly she resumed her stride away from me and disappeared around the corner.

The recollection of the encounter makes me smile as I retell it. "Is Christ here or not?" It's a powerful and thought-provoking question. In faith our response is a resounding "yes!" Yet, there are times when we are acutely aware of how absent Christ seems from aspects of our life. Those times when despite our faithful zeal for the Gospel, our best intentions and our love of others, the patterns of self-centeredness, self-righteousness and self-brokenness blind us to the miracle of Christ's presence alive and active all around us - and even in us.

The sacrament of penance is an encounter with the healing ministry of Jesus Christ. Regularly celebrating this sacrament is a spiritual exercise of a healthy disciple. The practice of self-searching goes beyond looking at single acts, by challenging us to look at our patterns of choices and evaluate them according to the ways of the Gospel and the habits of faithful discipleship.

God alone forgives sins. When we celebrate the sacrament of Penance we experience the healing and reconciling presence of Christ through the word of God proclaimed, through our contrite confession of sinfulness, through the support and prayer of the community gathered together, and through the ministry and words of absolution of the priest.

But the sacrament of penance is not just the work of God and a priest. The sacrament of penance is the work of us all. At our baptism we were clothed in Christ and entrusted with his mission. In this case that mission calls each disciple - the entire church community - to be reconcilers, each according to their vocational call.

Each of us is challenged to be reconciled and become reconcilers clothed in Christ's mercy, compassion and love. Each of us is called to be an encounter with Christ who promised to be with us always. Each of us is called to welcome the sinner, who surprisingly looks a lot like us.

Can you say with confidence, "Yes, Christ is here

How Do We Break The Power of Sin If we could see into our souls and see the damage our sin causes to our souls, to others, and the whole Church, we would flee from committing sin. This is a true story and excerpt of a letter written by Jacques Fesch to his mother before his execution which took place by guillotine in France on 1<sup>st</sup> October 1957. The 27 year old was beheaded for the murder of a police officer shortly after he bungled an armed robbery three years earlier (February 25<sup>th</sup> 1954). He underwent a conversion experience while on death row and the publication of his letters touched many, especially young people. Cardinal Lustiger of Paris signed a decree that maybe one day see Jacques Fesch declared "Blessed." This is part of Jacques Fesch's letter to his mother:

"This execution which frightens you is nothing compared to what awaits sinners in the next world. It is not for me you should weep but for sinners who offend God. As for me I am happy Jesus is calling me to himself and great graces have been given me. If you could only taste for a single instant the sweetness of the transports of divine love and could realize the absolute gravity of the slightest offence. God must come first, do not forget it. He calls you and believes in you, you are rich in his love. Many souls are linked with yours and you will have an account to render. You must go to Christ without whom you can do nothing. If you seek him you will find him. But you must seek him with all your heart. Above all do not seek your own will but his."


If we all pointed out each other's faults and sins, that's all we would ever do and our lives would be a large sin, because it does so much long-term damage. There is much spiritual damage to others that sometimes causes Christians to confuse the slander of men with the work of God in their lives. They assume God is doing to them what is really the work of human sinfulness. They begin to doubt their faith, fall away from active worship attendance; sometimes slander keeps those who do not know Christ from coming to faith.

The season of Lent will be drawing to a close in a few weeks. Will we have overcome sin in our lives? How will our lives be different at the end of Lent? The evilness and hatred in our country and world is sin driven by evil; can you see and feel the damage this has done to us? What is happening to us this Lent that will last beyond Lent for the rest of the year? If we could see into our souls and see the damage our sin causes to our souls, to others, and the whole Church, we would flee from committing sin. Meditate on this.

# Communal Penance Examination of Conscience

The basic requirement for a good confession is to have the intention of returning to God with your whole heart, like the prodigal son (in Luke 15), and to acknowledge your sins with true sorrow before the priest, who is there to remind you of Christ.

- 1. Do I take time to pray and thank God every day?
- 2. Do I give of myself and time to help my parish and community?
- 3. Do I offer help and reach out to those in need, shut-in's, and lonely or is it easier to ignore them?
- 4. Do I listen and hear the meaning of the Liturgy on Saturday's and Sunday?
- 5. Do I live and share the Good News with those that cross the path of my day?
- 6. Do I treasure my possessions and status more than people?
- 7. Do I treat all people with kindness and understanding.
- 8. Do I quickly judge and criticize other cultures in their beliefs?
- 9. Am I a person of reconciliation, peace and mercy? Do I hold grudges or seek revenge?
- 10. Am I forgiving and merciful? Do I give others the benefit of the doubt? Am I harsh or judgmental?
- 11. Am I willing to sacrifice anything for my faith? Do I allow human respect to keep me from being a Christian witness?
- 12. Do I live a spirit of detachment and generosity?

  Do I sacrifice for others?
