Summertime.....when living is easy.

Make summer time easier when it comes to yard work. Some simple tips when tending your yard.

- 1) Water your yard early in the day. There's less evaporation than midday or in the afternoon. An evening or night watering lends to fungal diseases.
- 2) Mow a fescue lawn tall at least 3-4 inches. Mowing your lawn short invites more weed seed and the taller grass blades shade itself to keep it cooler. Remember, tall fescue is a cool season grass. So it does struggle with our summer heat.
- 3) Mulch flower beds at least once a year. A good shredded mulch preferably a hardwood, cedar or cypress. Also never mulch up to the tree trunk. Leave at least six inches to prevent rotting and disease.

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The Coventry Beautification Committee recently finished numerous projects.

Three additional benches now have pavers. The hardscaping makes these benches more handicap accessible and look outstanding. A big thanks to Ultimate Hardscapes for their thorough work.

More overgrown shrubs were removed from several village stone entrance monuments. There is also better visibility at the wooded area along Coventry Boulevard to Owen Davis Boulevard.


Our swimming pools are enhanced with containers filled with seasonal color. Volunteers make this possible down to the daily watering of the flowers.

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Critter Corner Eastern Painted Turtle

The Eastern Painted turtle is a very common turtle in Virginia. While they are mostly aquatic, during the months of June and July, you may see these beautiful turtles on the move and crossing the roads. Please be on the lookout for them try not to run over them. If it is safe to do so, stop and help them out by moving them across the road in the direction they were headed. If you put them back heading in the opposite direction, they will try to cross again. Habitat loss and road killings have reduced the number, but even still this turtle has evolved to survive in human-disturbed settings. Most abundant in N. America

The painted turtles have bright colored stripes, usually greenish yellow in color on their heads. Sometimes there may be some red on the edge of the carapace (shell) and/or the plastron, otherwise known as the belly of the turtle. The whole plastron is typically red to orange in color. They will grow to be 4 to 12 inches long, the males being smaller than the females. The carapace is essentially smooth and oval, and the carapace is usually olive green to black in color with thin yellow stripes between the scutes (segments of the carapace).

These turtles are often mislabeled as sliders. However, sliders have a distinct red marking behind their eyes on their heads and less coloration on the carapace and plastron. The slider is an invasive species. Painted turtles are also sometimes confused with snapping turtles. Snapping turtles have large black heads, long tails, and the head tapers into a beak. The shape of a snapper is broad in the front and tapers in the back. They will grow to be much larger than the painted turtle.

Painted turtles call low-moving bodies of fresh, or brackish water including ponds, marshes, swamps, and streams home. They are easiest to spot when they are basking on rocks, logs, or banks.

Painted turtles have a mating season that runs from mid-March to mid-June. Males will stroke the females face with long claws during courtship. Following courtship, the females lay clutches of 4 to 20 eggs in sandy soil close to the water.

Where do they go when it gets cold? These turtles, like many other amphibians and reptiles, brumate during the winter under water, or frozen bodies of water; usually between October and April. Brumation is a winter cool-down which allows the turtle to survive when food is scarce. They can remain under water without oxygen for up to 147 days. They can slow their heartbeat so that it only beats once every five to ten minutes.

Painted turtles existed as far back as 15 million years ago. The oldest turtle in recent history was 55 years of age.
