Woodpeckers Found in Virginia

Virginia is home to eight different woodpecker species. Below, you'll find out what they are and a little about each.

Starting with the Pileated Woodpecker, the largest of those found throughout Virginia, with a wingspan of 26 to 30 inches, this bird is mainly black, with a distinctive white stripe on its face and neck that gives it a mask-like appearance, and a red head. These birds may frustrate you in the spring by pecking at your house trim and sounding like a jackhammer inside your home. Their preferred diet includes wood-boring beetles, ants, and other insects found in decaying trees, although they are omnivorous and also eat some plants. When they search for food, they leave a recognizable signature—a large, rectangular hole. The Pileated Woodpecker finds a single mate and keeps that mate for life.

The Downy Woodpecker is the smallest of the woodpeckers, with a wingspan of just 13 inches. These small birds are found throughout most of North America and are a personal favorite because of their fuzzy stomachs. They have a red patch on their heads, and the black-and-white striped pattern on their backs makes them look like they have polka dots. In winter, these birds travel in mixed-species flocks, which offer better predator detection and lead to more successful foraging.

The Hairy Woodpecker is the larger relative to the Downy Woodpecker, with a wingspan of 16 to 20 inches. Both species are commonly found together across most of their North American ranges. Likewise, the Hairy Woodpecker and the Pileated Woodpecker are frequently seen near each other. The Hairy Woodpecker arrives when it hears the drumming of the Pileated Woodpecker excavating for insects and often scavenges the deep holes left by the larger bird after they move on. It is an opportunist when it comes to finding food, also spotting and drinking sap that leaks from wells in bark created by sapsuckers. While the typical lifespan of this woodpecker ranges from five to ten years, the oldest recorded individual was a male that lived nearly 16 years.

The Red-Cockaded Woodpecker is native to Virginia. The male has a brown-and-white striped back, a black-and-white head with a tiny red patch on the side. The female resembles the male, but without red. It is the only Virginia woodpecker whose numbers are threatened. In 2002, only two breeding pairs remained in Virginia. The decline in their numbers is due to habitat loss of mature pine forests. This woodpecker excavates nesting sites in mature pine forests. The male and female cooperate, but excavation can take months. Since 2002, their numbers have grown through efforts to preserve and restore longleaf pine forests and by installing nest boxes to provide new nesting sites for families. The only public place to see the Red-Cockaded is in the Big Woods Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Sussex County. A WMA permit or a valid hunting or fishing license is required.

The Northern Flicker has a striking appearance. It is primarily brown with black barring, a cream-colored spotted underside, a black crescent on the chest, and red bars on the nape and around the eye. While some subspecies of the Northern Flicker have faced challenges, the bird generally does well because it can adapt to human-altered landscapes. Its preferred nesting sites are dead or dying trees, but it will also burrow into wooden utility poles and fence posts. They eat termites, ants, caterpillars, and beetles, along with various plant materials. They are active birds with a chattering call.

Contrary to its name, the Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker has a white to very pale yellow underside. They are mainly black and white, with red on the top of their head, and males also feature a red throat. These birds prefer to collect tree sap from birch and maple trees, which also supplies food for ruby-throated hummingbirds, bats, and porcupines. They utilize human-made materials for territorial drumming. The Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker is the only entirely migratory woodpecker. The oldest bird was a male banded in New Jersey who was later found far away in South Carolina.

The Red-Bellied Woodpecker is another medium-sized bird with a wingspan of 14 to 17 inches. They are generally pale, featuring black bars on their backs and a red cap on their heads. This is another woodpecker you might be inclined to call a red-headed woodpecker. They are backyard visitors, sometimes visiting suet feeders and feeders with sunflower seeds and peanuts. They have also been seen sipping from hummingbird feeders. Their tongues can extend two inches past the end of their beak.

The Red-headed Woodpecker is also a native of Virginia, with a wingspan ranging from 14 to 17 inches. These birds are easy to identify by their head, fully covered in a striking, bright red. The breeding pair works together to build a nest in a dead or dying tree, with each bird sharing domestic duties. They are fiercely protective of their territory, even going so far as to destroy the nests and eggs of other species, including duck eggs. They are the only woodpecker known to hide and store food. An interesting fact about these birds is that Pleistocene-era fossils, dating back up to 2 million years, have been found in Virginia and Florida.

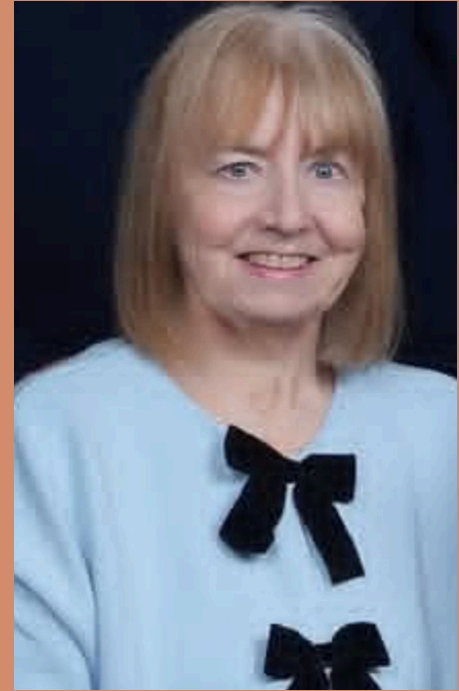

Late Fee: The Master Association will charge a \$15.00 late fee for payments made after the 30th day of the month. Ferguson Glade, Finch Terrace, and Smithy Glen Associations will impose a \$15.00 late fee after the 16th day of the month.

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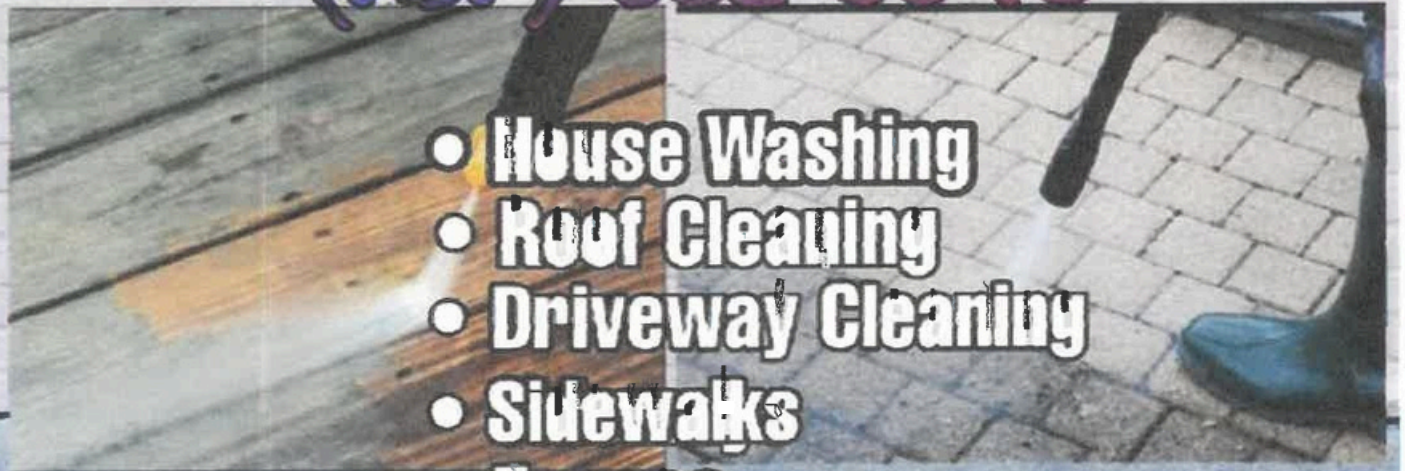
