From the President's Desk

You'll notice that several of the articles continue to repeat, like picking up after your dogs, this is a horrible issue we're dealing with. PLEASE pick up after your pups, it's inconsiderate to not pick up and respect your fellow residents ability to traverse our Community without fear of stepping on a dog land mine.

Also, it's Summertime now and many residents are enjoying the pools. We ask that you not hang your wet towels over the wooden porch railings. The dampness of the towels can and do damage the rails, which costs all of us in replacing them. If you continue to place the wet towels on the rail, we may be faced to look at not paying for repairs by the Association, but the homeowner will face paying for any repairs. We currently do this for those homeowners that don't clean out their gutters. When the wood behind the gutters rot, the homeowner must pay for the repairs rather than the HOA, we all shouldn't pay for someone else's negligence.

CHILDREN PLAYING IN THE COURTS Watching out for the Children's Safety!

During the March 2024 open meeting, a community member complained about **children playing in the streets without paying attention to passing cars.**Recently, a child on a bicycle narrowly avoided being hit by a vehicle. Currently, this seems to be an issue for Crescent Court families. Smithy Glen has several grassy community areas designated for children to play in; perhaps parents could encourage the children to utilize the grassy spaces instead of the parking area or playing on streets. On the other side, as drivers, you are responsible to look out for them also.

FENCE REPAIR

They are nearing 30 years old and need attention!! Inspections were recently completed and over 100 of the 315 fences had an issue. They vary from a 5 minute fix, applying a few nails or screws to the homeowner needing to call a repair person to replace the entire fence because it's just about to fall down. Please take the notices seriously and make the repairs as soon as possible, and ensure your repairman gets the area marked by Ms. Utility - 811. This is also a great time to power wash your house! There is a lot of mold/mildew on houses out there!

When buying/selling items online you can use the Safe Exchange Zones located at the new Sheriff's office (159 Goodwin Neck Road). The designated sozes are under 24 hour surveillance and allows for the public to make purchases and exchange transactions in an area monitored, rather, than conducting

monitored rather than conducting exchanges at a private residence.

SOME THINGS ARE WORTH REPEATING!

Our past newsletters have addressed issues that may not be comfortable, but necessary to talk about. We want to maintain a positive tone but need to be realistic about the issues that neighbors are concerned about. So, let's review a few of the issues that continue to be in the top Facebook and CAF discussions and are raised by our residents during open meetings.

DOGS!!!! Be a Good Neighbor!

During almost every Meeting, Smithy Glen residents urge the Board to increase efforts in educating residents about the issue of dogs leaving waste in flower beds. Despite repeated mentions past newsletters, there seems to be a limit to what can be done. The plea remains for residents to demonstrate courtesy towards their neighbors by refraining from allowing their pets to relieve themselves in flower beds.

Without a name or picture, the Board's ability to address the issue is severely limited. However, it begs the question: why should residents feel compelled to report on each other just to prevent dogs from relieving themselves in their neighbors' flower beds? And why are multiple time offenders not learning from the excessive fines? We've been having a horrible time with people just letting their dogs relieve themselves, and make no effort to clean up their mess. If you have a dog, it's your responsibility to clean up after them. The picture was just one of the most recent violations, 10 feet from the mutt mitts and trash can - it's not that hard. If you see someone not cleaning up, report it, give a description - and it's even better if you know where the dog resides. Fill out a CAF! It's the only way to help solve the problem.



As responsible pet owners, it is our duty to keep our furry friends safe and happy while also being respectful of our neighbors and community. Using a leash and picking up after your dog are not only CHOA mandates, but also important steps in being a good neighbor. Picking up after your pet helps keep our community clean and enjoyable for all. It's important to remember that our actions impact those around us, and it's our responsibility to be considerate of our neighbors who walk the paths and the children who run and play in the grassy common areas.

Leashing your dog does NOT mean putting a leash on it and allowing it to roam. It means the owner is supposed to hold the end of the leash and guide the dog on the walk. Picking up after your dog does not mean doing it only when neighbors observe you — it means doing it every time your dog has a bowel movement!

Smithy Glen governing document titled "Design Document Smithy Glen HOA Sub", Use restrictions, para G, page 8, Animals, states:

No animals, livestock, or poultry of any kind shall be raised, bred, or kept upon any Lot or within any townhouse thereon or in the Common Area, except such dogs, cats, or other household pets as may be permitted by the rules and regulations adopted by the Association. Homeowners are restricted to two four legged Pets. The document also clearly states that No animals should be allowed to run free. All dogs must be on a leash.

A quick reminder - if you plan on doing any work to the exterior of your residence (windows, doors, fence etc) before you complete the work, you must have an approved ARC request. If you fail to get approval prior to completing the job, you face having to remove or replace the completed work - don't risk the large financial input!

- (CFLs), and rechargeable batteries (alkaline batteries are NO LONGER ACCEPTED; please put in your regular trash) Miscellaneous: charcoal fluids, dyes, kerosene, pool chemicals, fluorescent lights up to 8 ft, all compact fluorescents

- X We do not have the ability to pump nor will we allow containers larger than 35 gallons

Household Chemical Collection

- Do not smoke.
- Do not leave material in hot unventilated areas for long periods.
- When possible, keep products in original container and ensure lids or caps are tight
- Place items securely in boxes for transport.
- To prevent unfavorable chemical reactions, do not put multiple containers in bags or soft containers where they may spill or break.
- If you have a leaking container, place this item separately in a clear plastic bag, with newspaper or paper towels on the bottom. Secure in an upright position so it doesn't spill in your vehicle.
 Please notify staff that the item is leaking.
- MXI is the premiere service provider for household hazardous waste collection events sponsored by states, counties, and municipalities and provides disposal services at the VPPSA events. With a fleet of permitted vehicles, national network of terminals, staff of highly trained personnel, and a Materials Recovery Facility, MXI offers a full range of recycling and disposal services using the cutting edge of universal hazardous waste management technology.

Computer Recycling

- Since 2001, our contractor, Computer Recycling of Virginia, has erased every hard drive using software that meets or exceeds all industry standards, including the NIST 800-88. Once the wipe process is complete, any hard drive that fails the wipe process is physically destroyed.
- The mission of Computer Recycling of Virginia, Inc. (CRVA) is to place educationally—useful equipment into Virginia's schools and non-profit organizations free of charge, while promoting electronics recycling throughout Virginia.

At the collection:

- A VPPSA employee will ask which city or county you live in, and what materials you've brought. Proof of residency may be required.
 VPPSA staff will unload your vehicle. Please stay in
- VPPSA staff will unload your vehicle. Please stay in your vehicle unless requested to do otherwise.
- There are separate drop off points for household chemicals and computers.
- Be prepared to identify your materials. If unsure, tell VPPSA staff before they begin unloading.

Alternative Recycling and Disposal Sites

Best Buy accepts computer components at no charge (limit three items per household per day). Computer monitors and televisions are accepted at a \$29.99 charge per item (limit two items per household per day). TVs accepted are tube TVs smaller than 32" and flat-panel TVs - LCD, plasma, and LED - smaller than 50". Mobile phones are accepted at no charge (limit three items per household per day). See www.bestbuy.com/recycling for a complete list of acceptable and unacceptable items that Best Buy recycles.

batteries Plus accepts the following: alkaline batteries at a charge of \$1.85 per pound; Compact Fluorescent Lamps at a charge of \$0.66 per bulb; four-foot fluorescent tubes at a charge of \$0.52 per tube; eight-foot fluorescent tubes at a charge of \$0.93 per tube; rechargeable batteries, such as Nickel-Metal Hydride and Nickel-Cadmium, are accepted at no charge. Items should be loose when taken to the store as they will be weighed/counted to determine the total charge. Batteries Plus accepts unlimited quantities.

Goodwill Industries accepts computer components for recycling at no charge. Goodwill uses a U.S. Department of Defense-grade program on all donated devices to clean hard drives and erase personal and sensitive information. Additional electronics are accepted for donation. Home Depot and Lowe's accept Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs and rechargeable batteries at no charge (fluorescent tubes are not accepted.)
