


The Smithy Glen Board of Directors holds open meetings every other month for the residents, on the 4th Tuesday, at 7PM at the Clubhouse.

The <u>NAVIGATION RIBBON</u> at the top of the Home Page will take you to everything the site offers. In the picture above, this Navigation Ribbon is outlined in <u>RED</u>.

Another big change is that <u>all newsletters are now</u> <u>available on-line</u>. Simply Click on **NEWSLETTER**, then choose which quarterly newsletter you want to read. The Coventry Chronicles and the Smithy Glen Messenger newsletters are available as readable/downloadable pdfs.

When you click on the **MORE tab**, the Dropdown Menu will provide you access to several different options. For

example, you will be able to review:

- A Roster of the Board of Directors
- 2024 Assessments/Payment Sheets. Note that the 2024 assessments were mailed to homeowners in addition to being published to the website.
- All Covenants, Resolutions, and Architectural Guidelines for the Master Assoc and all Sub-Assoc
- All forms, such as the Exterior Alteration Applic, CAFs, and Volunteer Interest Form
- All Approved past Board Meeting Minutes (Jan 2022 to present)

DID YOU KNOW? HISTORY OF COVENTRY (continued)

In our last column we related how this area was deeded to Owen Davis by King Charles back in the 1600's. Mr. Davis was a blacksmith, among other occupations, hence the names of Smithy Glen and Davis Forge, as well as numerous street names.

William Ferguson, a grandson of Owen Davis, inherited the land which he farmed. The Ferguson Glade neighborhood was named in his honor.

Finch Terrace derived its name from Finches Dam, now Harvest Lake, a natural feature of the Coventry area mentioned as early as 1800.



FUN FACT: WHAT IS GLITTER?

"All that glitters is not gold," wrote William Shakespeare. And how prescient he was: Glitter today is a mix of plastic and aluminum.

When you think of festive parties — or even a particularly glamorous brand of eyeshadow — glitter might also come to mind. Everything from holiday decorations to greeting cards, as well as makeup and nail polish, are commonly speckled with glitter for a little extra pizzazz. The downside is that it gets everywhere, sticking to unwanted surfaces like skin and clothes, and requires a lot of effort (and patience) to remove.

But glitter isn't just sparkly and occasionally obnoxious it's also bad for the environment. It's difficult to imagine Christmas and New Year's celebrations without the sparkles, but it may be time to rethink our use of glitter. glitter particles Since are SO small, considered microplastics: a major source of ocean, air, and soil pollution. Glitter contaminates our soil, air, water and food. The majority of glitter eventually winds up in the ocean via the wastewater generated in our homes (including any glitter that might have been washed down your sink or tub) and from landfill run-off. Marine organisms like fish then eat the small plastic pieces because they can't distinguish the tiny synthetic bits from their natural food supply, making microplastic one of the world's most prolific and intractable pollutants. As these plastics bioaccumulate in the food chain, humans end up consuming them to the tune of about a credit card's worth of plastic every week, mostly through the water we drink and the seafood we eat.

Given the environmental harm of glitter, researchers are working to produce vegan glitter, having discovered that nanocrystals from cellulose — a natural material found in the cell walls in plants, fruits and vegetables — can bend light and create the desired vivid colors we love in glitter.

PREPARING TO SELL OR LEASE YOUR HOME? Both Actions Require Board Coordination

If you are embarking on a new adventure and will be moving, remember that PODS portable storage containers require coordination and permission from the Board and can only be placed in your driveway or in your parking space. You must fill out a Community Action Form and submit to the office several weeks before delivery of the POD for approval.

Also, should you **lease** out your home, you must notify the Office of your forwarding address so that you will be sure to receive all SG HOA notices and Annual Reports that are mailed to the homeowners.

Computer Recycling, and Paper Shredding is Saturday, MARCH 9th, from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. at 105 Service Drive.

Acceptable Materials are those typically found in a home environment, such as household maintenance and cleaning products, paints, fuels, automotive chemicals, and lawn and garden products. The following computer items are also accepted at this event: Computers; Desktop and laptop computers, servers, computer monitors, cell phones, computer wiring, desktop printers including multifunction printers or "All in Ones", fax machines, and desktop photocopiers and scanners. Televisions are not accepted.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF LATEX PAINT Follow the Procedures Listed Here

You don't need to wait for a Chemical Collection Day to properly dispose of old cans of latex paint.

- If the paint is old and dry, you can leave the lid off and dispose of in your regular trash once the paint hardens.
- If the paint is still a liquid, you can add kitty litter or other absorbent material such as sawdust or mulch, and stir it well until it becomes very thick and will not drip or run (see the picture below). Once you've done this, you can leave the lid off for it to dry and then and dispose of it in your regular trash. Please note: this ONLY APPLIES to latex (water based) paint.



HOW TO PROPERLY DISPOSE OF MEDICATIONS DO NOT flush old medications down the toilet or pour down the sink!

According to the director of Fisheries and Habitat Conservation, trace amounts of chemical compounds often associated with medications have been increasingly detected in our waters. Treatment plants are not designed to remove medications from wastewater. Therefore, chemicals disposed of in sinks and toilets can reach the environment unintentionally.

Medications are NOT accepted at VPPSA Household Chemical Collection Events. Check with your local pharmacy to see if they participate in a medication takeback program-many Walgreens do. If not, please take the following steps:

- Keep medications in the original bottle if possible, and mark out all identifying personal information on the prescription label.
- Crush solid medications or dissolve them in water, and mix with kitty litter, sawdust, coffee grounds or another substance that will make the drug unsuitable for human or animal consumption. This applies to liquid medications as well. The addition of foreign substances is to discourage children or others from removing the discarded medicines from the trash and taking them. Seal the bottle with the lid.
- Put the medicine bottle, preferably concealed within a non-recyclable container, in your household trash for disposal. (If it's too difficult to use the original container, you can also place the mix in a plastic baggie or other container.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF COMPUTER ITEMS The acceptable List of Items

Computer-related items accepted for recycling are limited to the following:

- Desktop and laptop computers
- Servers
- Monitors (both LCD and CRT types)
- Computer wiring
- Desktop printers including multi function printers, or "all in ones"
- Fax machines
- Desktop photocopiers and scanners
- Cell phones

- (CFLs), and rechargeable batteries (alkaline batteries are NO LONGER ACCEPTED; please put in your regular trash) Miscellaneous: charcoal fluids, dyes, kerosene, pool chemicals, fluorescent lights up to 8 ft, all compact fluorescents

Household Chemical Collection

- Do not smoke.
- Do not leave material in hot unventilated areas for long periods.
- When possible, keep products in original container and ensure lids or caps are tight
- Place items securely in boxes for transport.
- To prevent unfavorable chemical reactions, do not put multiple containers in bags or soft containers where they may spill or break.
- If you have a leaking container, place this item separately in a clear plastic bag, with newspaper or paper towels on the bottom. Secure in an upright position so it doesn't spill in your vehicle.
 Please notify staff that the item is leaking.
- MXI is the premiere service provider for household hazardous waste collection events sponsored by states, counties, and municipalities and provides disposal services at the VPPSA events. With a fleet of permitted vehicles, national network of terminals, staff of highly trained personnel, and a Materials Recovery Facility, MXI offers a full range of recycling and disposal services using the cutting edge of universal hazardous waste management technology.

Computer Recycling

- Since 2001, our contractor, Computer Recycling of Virginia, has erased every hard drive using software that meets or exceeds all industry standards, including the NIST 800-88. Once the wipe process is complete, any hard drive that fails the wipe process is physically destroyed.
- The mission of Computer Recycling of Virginia, Inc. (CRVA) is to place educationally—useful equipment into Virginia's schools and non-profit organizations free of charge, while promoting electronics recycling throughout Virginia.

At the collection:

- A VPPSA employee will ask which city or county you live in, and what materials you've brought. Proof of residency may be required.
- VPPSA staff will unload your vehicle. Please stay in your vehicle unless requested to do otherwise.
- There are separate drop off points for household chemicals and computers.
- Be prepared to identify your materials. If unsure, tell VPPSA staff before they begin unloading.

Thanks for your patience and cooperation.

Alternative Recycling and Disposal Sites

Best Buy accepts computer components at no charge (limit three items per household per day). Computer monitors and televisions are accepted at a \$29.99 charge per item (limit two items per household per day). TVs accepted are tube TVs smaller than 32" and flat-panel TVs - LCD, plasma, and LED - smaller than 50". Mobile phones are accepted at no charge (limit three items per household per day). See www.bestbuy.com/recycling for a complete list of acceptable and unacceptable items that Best Buy recycles.

Batteries Plus accepts the following: alkaline batteries at a charge of \$1.85 per pound; Compact Fluorescent Lamps at a charge of \$0.66 per bulb; four-foot fluorescent tubes at a charge of \$0.52 per tube; eight-foot fluorescent tubes at a charge of \$0.52 per tube; rechargeable batteries, such as Nickel-Metal Hydride and Nickel-Cadmium, are accepted at no charge. Items should be loose when taken to the store as they will be weighed/counted to determine the total charge. Batteries Plus accepts unlimited quantities.

Goodwill Industries accepts computer components for recycling at no charge. Goodwill uses a U.S. Department of Defense-grade program on all donated devices to clean hard drives and erase personal and sensitive information. Additional electronics are accepted for donation. See https://goodwillvirginia.org/donate/personal-donations/what-can-i-donate/ for a complete list.

Home Depot and Lowe's accept Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs and rechargeable batteries at no charge (fluorescent tubes are not accepted.)
