GENERAL MEETING MINUTES AAUW LODI AFFILIATE Tuesday, April 17th, 2018 Lodi Community Library

The meeting was called to order at 5:57 pm in the Community Room of

the Lodi Public Library by co-President Becky Hamner.

March Meeting Minutes were approved as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Julie Thompson reported \$27,039.20 in the General Fund and \$2,219.72 in AAUW Funds. Thirty-eight members have signed up on-line for dues renewal.

Correspondence: No report

Membership: Suzanne Talbot reported we have two new members, Claire Woznick and Mary Ann Sullivan. Carolyn Ross reported that she has sent out another dues invoice reminder for on-line payment of dues. June 30th is the deadline for dues. About one-half of our membership has paid.

Standing Committees:

Birthday Club - Sally Irizary acknowledged April birthdays. She reminded Birthday Club members to please indicate into which fund they wish their donations placed, Educational Opportunity Fund, or the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund. If you do not indicate a choice, the money will go to the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund.

Scholarships - Manina Moles reported that a recipient from each of the four high schools has been chosen to receive a Lodi AAUW scholarship. Presenters are still needed. Dates and times: May 16th Tokay High School, 6 pm; May 17th Lodi High School, 6 pm; May 22nd McNair High School, 6 pm; May 23rd Bear Creek High School 6 pm. If you are interested in presenting, contact Manina. **Tech Trek -** Melinda Vargo announced the application process is under way. We are collecting applications this year from Delta Sierra, Millswood, Houston, and Lodi Middle. Interviews will be in 2-3 weeks. Four girls will be chosen and two alternates. Sylvia Mayorga reported on the CSI event at the WOW museum.

AAUW CA and AAUW National Elections:

Click on the link <u>click HERE to renew with your</u> <u>credit or debit card</u>, and you're linked right to the payment page on the AAUW site. This is a secure web site. Your personal information and amount owed are already filled in for you. You just enter:

- Type of credit card
- Number (no spaces between numbers!)
- Expiration date
- Three-digit security code

Click the <u>NEXT</u> button to review what you entered, and then the <u>SUBMIT</u> button to finish!

On May 21, 1919, U.S. Representative James R. Mann, a Republican from Illinois and chairman of the Suffrage Committee, proposed the House resolution to approve the Susan B. Anthony Amendment granting women the right to vote. The measure passed the House 304 to 89—a full 42 votes above the required two-thirds majority.

Two weeks later, on June 4, 1919, the <u>U.S.</u> <u>Senate</u> passed the 19^{th} Amendment by two votes over its two-thirds required majority, 56-25. The amendment was then sent to the states for ratification.

Just an FYI: In 1906, women in Finland were the first in Europe to vote. The country's president from 2000 to 2012 was a woman, and as of 2017, 40% of the Finnish parliament is female (from archives.gov/historical-docs/19thamendment and data.world bank.org). Connie During, Editor

Public Policy

The "Me Too" movement took the press and America by storm earlier this year. While currently superseded by James Comey's book and Trump's reneging on Russian sanctions, the campaign against sexual harassment, rape, and any unwanted sexual advances remains vitally important. AAUW continues to report on Title IX and actions from Washington that could diminish protections for women and girls. Currently, this campaign seems to have taken a backseat to other issues, such as gender pay inequality. It is imperative Title IX remains fresh in our minds and that we continue to speak out against any form of sexual harassment.

In order to free women from the binds of secrecy, AAUW encourages members to share your stories (as many women did during the Me Too campaign) on aauw.org, Twitter, or Facebook. Emotionally, it is difficult to share something so personal and that many of us are ashamed to discuss. As public policy chairperson, I will be sending my own brief story of sexual abuse out in an email. AAUW is a united front. The more women share their stories, the more empowered we become.


Bylaw Voting


