League of Women Voters announces Winner of the Elisabeth Ruffner Scholarship

Prescott, AZ. The League of Women Voters of Central Yavapai County (LWVCYC) is pleased to announce this year's Elisabeth Ruffner Scholarship of \$500 to Ms. Nicole Shaver.

Nicole is a 2022 graduate of Bradshaw Mountain High School graduating in the top 10 of her class with a 4.3 GPA. She managed this while leading her volleyball team to a Regional Championship, and working at Chick Fil A. Nicole will be continuing her athletic and academic career at Quincy University in Illinois. She plans to encourage her new friends to register to vote, and to vote in upcoming elections. Follows is an excerpt from her excellent essay:

To get youth started, schools should strongly encourage registering for voting during the school day. Having students register in school can give them guidance and assurance that they are participating in the democratic process in the right way. Nowadays, many teens feel uncomfortable when they feel alone. If the registration process was at school, the youth would become more confident and want to be a part of the voting process with all their other peers. The High School Voter Registration Project is a nationwide effort to encourage young people--especially young minorities--to register to vote. According to their research, supporting high school students to start the process of registration is more effective than later in life to reach out to all minorities. Multiple youth registration starts at college campuses which miss 43% of Americans between the ages of 18-29. For this reason, it is essential for the democratic process to start at the high school level in order to reach as many youth as possible. To sum up, to engage young people to become a part of the democratic process, influencers need to utilize their platforms to spread awareness and voting registration needs to target high school students to start the process.

The LWVCYC received eight applications with noteworthy insights about getting youth civically engaged. Here are several quotes from the teens that represented recurring themes:

- Numerous students have no idea how our government runs until they get into their senior year of high school, where many are the age to vote. If there is no knowledge, there is no participation.
- Not being well informed stops young people because they are unsure of some stuff and become afraid to vote.
- Young people believe that their vote does not matter since they are a small majority of the entire population.
- I did not think about registering to vote or consider why it is important until Yavapai County Recorder's Office
 representatives spoke to us about voting registration, how the democratic process works, and why being
 involved is important.
- Discuss political topics with young people, as it gives us a glimpse into the world of the democratic process and enables us to begin thinking for ourselves and what's important to us.

Elisabeth Ruffner was a long-time supporter of the League of Women Voters and a 23-year member of the League of Women Voters of Central Yavapai County (LWVCYC). Elisabeth believed in strong civic engagement and helped establish Prescott Good Governance in the 1970s. In 2015, she and Sandra Day O'Connor were inducted in the Arizona Women's Hall of Fame. Elisabeth was a member of LWVCYC from July 1996, until her passing in 2019. As

a tribute to her memory, the LWVCYC has designated a portion of its Education Fund for an annual scholarship to be awarded in her memory.

The LWVCYC hopes to offer a \$1,000 scholarship in future years. Using The AZ Department of Water Resources recently published data, Dr. Kroopnick has run models of the wells in the Prescott Active Management Area (PrAMA) showing what has happened to water levels since the Groundwater Management Act was established in 1980. Lawmakers aren't the only ones with lots of ideas on how to change Arizona elections. A citizen initiative circulating in the state has proposals of its own — nearly three dozen of them — and most are diametrically opposed to where Republicans are headed.

The <u>"Arizona Fair Elections Act"</u> would expand voting access and reverse a number of laws enacted in recent years, from tighter controls on citizen initiatives to elimination of the Permanent Early Voting List, which critics saw as an attempt to limit the state's popular early voting program.

It includes provisions to avoid a repeat of the aftermath of the 2020 presidential election, including preventing the kind of ballot review that was commissioned by Republicans in the state Senate, along with blocking lawmakers from substituting their own slate of presidential electors if they disagree with the voters' choice.

The initiative is circulating as the Legislature has stalled on a rash of election-related bills this year. Only one measure out of the more than 100 bill introduced has been signed into law so far, but it won't take effect until after this year's elections. It tightens proof of citizenship for people registering to vote.

The act, if it makes the ballot and is approved by voters, would create same-day voter registration, extend the deadline to return early ballots and boost funding for the state's public campaign-finance system. It would restore the Permanent Early Voting List, which lawmakers abolished last year, and reverse the "ballot harvesting" law that prevents voters from allowing a non-family member to drop off their ballot.

The list goes on, proposing numerous election-related changes in an all-or-nothing format that Joel Edman acknowledges could force some hard decisions for voters on whether to accept all of the nearly three dozen provisions to get the changes they really want.

"On the other hand, there's something in there for just about everybody," said Edman, treasurer of Arizonans for Free and Fair Elections, the committee formed to back the effort.

Before voters would face any decision, however, proponents of the initiative will need to collect 237,645 valid voter signatures by July 7. If they qualify, the measure will appear on the Nov. 8 general election ballot.

The campaign is sponsored by Arizona Deserves Better, and the political arm of the Arizona Democracy Resource Center. Both groups work on election and voting issues.
