



The Blue Moon had the chance to interview the influential Ambassador Lucienne about women in diplomacy. She has actively participated in high-level meetings and international forums, making significant contributions to important conferences and advocating for good governance. Additionally, she has been involved in training programs, cultural exchange initiatives, and facilitating bilateral cooperation, as well as engaging in global collaborations.



Q. How does the Chadian government support and promote the participation of competent women in diplomatic roles? Can you provide more details on the specific challenges experienced by women diplomats in Chad?

H.E. Yes, the challenges faced by married women diplomats were similart to those faced by women in India at the beginning of their careers. However, given the low number of Chadian women diplomats, the highest authorities often encourage competent women in the field by appointing them to diplomatic and consular missions to address this challenge. In addition, the Chadian government grants a 30% quota for women in elective and nominative positions, which is expected to gradually move towards gender parity.

Q. What qualities or achievements of any woman leader have inspired you the most?

H.E. The woman diplomat who has inspired me the most in Chad is Ambassador Mrs AZIZA BAROUD. A Chadian politician, former parliamentarian, and Minister, she served as Chad's Ambassador to the European Union, the United Kingdom, and the Benelux countries with residence in Brussels in 2017, and as Chad's Permanent Representative to the United Nations with residence in New York in 2019. Throughout her various appointments, she worked tirelessly and selflessly to elevate the flag of Chad.

Q. How has your experience with the group of female ambassadors influenced your professional journey?

H.E. Currently, there are 25 female ambassadors, and this group of female ambassadors has been a great inspiration to me. There is a cordial understanding among us. They are very serene and diligent in their duties, and I have learned a lot from them since my arrival. So, I have become part of a large professional family.

It's essential to capitalize on this momentum and engage more universities. Specifically, we need to proceed with a dialogue on mutual recognition of diplomas. This step aligns with the facilitation of the visa regime—a desired

trend. Additionally, we've extended an offer for a visa-free group tourist agreement. This proposal originated in 2022 when President Putin first discussed it with Prime Minister Modi. We hope for an early conclusion to this agreement, demonstrating our serious commitment to bilateral and multilateral cooperation.

Regarding recent events, both leaders have unequivocally condemned terrorist attacks on our respective territories. A promising new dimension lies in labor mobility, which is already underway. By year-end, we anticipate further cooperation in spare parts, joint ventures, servicing, technology exchange and localization.

Internationally, our close coordination continues within the UN, G20 and BRICS frameworks. Our focus remains on democratizing global governance, including reforming the United Nations Security Council. Russia reaffirms its unwavering support for India's permanent membership in the Security Council. In summary, the outcomes of this summit, driven by strong mutual political will, aim to expand, deepen, and diversify trade, economic cooperation, and strategic partnerships for the best interests of our friendly nations.

Regarding Indians in the Russian army, Babushkin clarifies: 'We have never sought Indian recruits for the Russian army.' Neither the Defense

Ministry websites nor any embassies have expressed such intentions. While a small number—50 to 60 or even 100—may be present, they play no significant role in conflicts. Russia has ample volunteers, rendering foreign recruits unnecessary. These individuals primarily seek commercial opportunities and advantages, including facilitated Russian citizenship. The Russian army has not actively recruited them. Most are on an illegal basis, holding student, tourist or business visas that do not permit contractual obligations. President Putin's proposal for visa-free group tourist visas is currently on the table in India. We eagerly await progress. As for education, the potential is vast. Despite having around 25,000 to 30,000 Indian students in Russia, this number pales in comparison to the real demand, underscoring the untapped potential of Russian universities.

Both India and Russia are actively discussing ways to diversify their trade basket, aiming to reduce the trade deficit. Among the exciting prospects on the horizon is the possibility of a long-term contract for liquefied natural gas (LNG) and petrochemicals between Indian and Russian companies.

The past year witnessed remarkable growth in these sectors. In 2023, the results were staggering: 90 million tons of LNG, 45 million tons of crude oil. To put this in perspective,

just before February 2021, the annual figure stood at a mere 2.5 million tons. The surge in crude oil exports has been explosive and India now enjoys a stable share of crude oil imports from Russia, covering approximately 30%.

While the situation with the Gaspro contract remains complex, there's a clear trend: Indian companies are increasingly demanding LNG. Despite the challenges, further contracts between Russian suppliers and Indian consumers are under consideration. The next five to seven years could witness significant developments in this area.

India's petrochemical industry grows at an impressive rate of over 10% annually. Recognizing this, Russia has actively provided technology support. Notably, our Reliance project paved the way and now Nayara is executing a project in Vadinar—a crucial step after refineries. The focus is on polyolefins and there's immense potential for collaboration in various petrochemical technologies.

In summary, India and Russia are poised to strengthen their economic ties, leveraging LNG, crude oil, and petrochemicals. These strategic partnerships benefit both nations and contribute to their shared prosperity.

Balancing traditional heritage and modern trends is essential. In Dr. Remizova's view, modern trends cannot exist without a foundation in heritage. Preserving heritage is vital, especially in countries like India and Russia, which have rich cultural and civilizational legacies. Both nations are like civilizations in their own right, with deep-rooted traditions that must be preserved even as they embrace modernity. A Russian proverb states, "Every new trend is an old trend that was good," highlighting that many new trends are revivals of past ones.

Women in Diplomacy and Cultural Exchange

As the first woman to hold her post, Dr. Remizova believes women can bring a unique touch to their work, paying more attention to specific issues. In India, she has noticed a significant movement for women's empowerment and education, which she is eager to support. Events are planned in

these areas because they are crucial. Additionally, two years ago, Russia enshrined traditional values in its constitution, emphasizing the importance of family and women. The aim is to attract more women to the Russian Cultural Center and support their initiatives.

Cultural exchange between India and Russia often involves high-level agreements, such as those between the Ministers of Culture. However, on the ground, the goal is to provide space for women to promote



themselves and establish connections. In Russia, a significant forum led by Valentina Matvienko, head of the upper chamber of the parliament, is dedicated to women's empowerment. Women from India are invited to participate and the next forum will be in St. Petersburg in September. A program in India is planned for these women to share their experiences and ideas, fostering further collaboration.

Business Collaborations

Dr. Remizova has met several women from both countries who lead or represent companies interested in the Russian market. While there hasn't been a specific focus on this area yet, plans are in place to organize a forum dedicated to women's entrepreneurship and business participation. This initiative will help strengthen business ties and support women entrepreneurs in both countries.

Challenges and Achievements

Dr. Remizova hasn't faced significant challenges as a woman leader in cultural diplomacy. Societal perceptions of women can occasionally be an issue, but it doesn't affect her work. Her promotion suggests her superiors in Moscow view her positively. In Russia, gender doesn't matter as long as one performs their job well.



In Mumbai, Dr. Remizova spearheaded a literature club for lovers of Russian literature, discussing classics like Pushkin,



Dostoevsky and Tolstoy, as well as modern writers. She plans to organize a similar club in Delhi, inviting Indian writers to collaborate. Joint presentations and live discussions will highlight current literary trends. While ballet and folk dance are popular, literature often remains hidden. Exhibitions are also held and this year, the Jubilee of the Relics family will be celebrated with presentations from both Indian and Russian sides.

Standout Events

The literature club was a significant event during Dr. Remizova's tenure in Mumbai, but various exhibitions and performances by different collectives were also well-received. These cultural offerings will continue to be presented in Delhi.

Cultural Collaboration and Cuisine

Food is an integral part of culture, and both Indians and Russians pay a lot of attention to it. Plans are in place to invite Russian companies to India and organize a series of culinary events in Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai and Kolkata. These events will be held at Russian Houses across India, likely starting in February. One challenge is the availability of specific Russian products in India, but solutions are being sought. Similarly, Indians in Russia face the same issue, but it can be overcome together.



Future Plans and Upcoming Events

The main festival this year will be in October at the Museum, a significant event. Additionally, Russia, as the president of BRICS, has numerous events planned. Traditionally, there are cultural forums and youth cultural forums in St. Petersburg and other locations. Over the next two months, about six major events will be hosted in Russia, inviting Indian participants.

In Delhi and across India, the goal is to operate as a unified body rather than separate regions. Different parts of India have unique requirements, so colleagues will be connected to gather information from various regions. India is like a civilization with diverse languages, cuisines, and cultures every 200 kilometres. Thorough preparation is needed, and once plans are finalized, they will be shared.

Promoting Russian Culture in Delhi Schools

Efforts have started to work with Delhi schools, colleges, and universities. The future lies with the youth, and it's crucial to speak more about friendship and traditions. The Russian Cultural Center is always open to everyone, and Indian children are invited to visit various studios, including art, chess, and music. These efforts will continue with schools.

Advice for Aspiring Women Leaders

Education is the foundation of everything. Continuous self-education throughout life is important. Staying updated with new trends and thinking about how to implement them is crucial. Self-confidence is key, and one shouldn't pay too much attention to what others say if they believe in their path. Being open to people around is also

From Child Bride to Business Tycoon The Phoenix Rising from the Ashes

I first met Kalpana Saroj at an event focused on Women's Day. Her simplicity, persistence, resilience and determination left an indelible mark on me. Listening to her recount the challenges she faced and overcame gave me goosebumps and I am sure others in the room felt the same. Since that day, this Iron Lady has been on my mind and it is my honour to bring her story to the readers of "The Blue Moon." From Despair to Determination

Kalpana Saroj's story begins in a small village in Maharashtra, where she was born into a Dalit family. Her early life was a harsh lesson in societal discrimination and poverty. Q. Could you share the story behind L'Opéra's inception? What inspired you to bring authentic French flavours to India?

As often in life, it was a combination of several elements and circumstances which led to the creation of L'Opéra. At the core of it was the love of my husband and me for our two and half years old grandson and naturally our daughter who was expecting her second child. My daughter, Caroline and her family had moved to India from Paris in 2005 and we missed her, our son-in-law and our first grandchild dearly. It was

therefore a no-brainer when the opportunity presented itself for me, our son and my husband to move to India. We did not hesitate for a moment and decided to shift our base to Delhi in 2008, notwithstanding the fact that my husband continued to spend less than half of his time at home due to business trips.

L'Opéra, was the brainchild of our son Laurent, who at that time was just completing his business degree in France and was spending six months in India as part of his mandatory overseas internship. From that moment onwards, L'Opéra

became a family project, and it took us over one and a half years of detailed market studies and research, business planning, pilot production, focus group sessions before we finally decided to proceed to the next phase.

As a French family who had recently moved to India, a country with immense possibilities and needs and Laurent having identified this niche and our desire to share our French (culinary) culture with our host country, L'Opéra appeared to be an ideal collective, family project.

Q. How do you maintain the delicate balance between French culinary traditions and Indian sensibilities at L'Opéra?

At the onset of our operations, we committed to an absolute adhesion to French authenticity and lifestyle, best expressed in the expression "joie de vivre à la française" roughly translating into French-style happiness and joy of life. This meant, that we wanted not only to bring authentic French products to India but to also create an atmosphere which transported

our patrons to the heart of our capital, Paris, each time they entered one of our outlets. Given this objective, we made a selection of the products which satisfied the needs of the Indian palate and customers but never compromised on the recipes and the original taste of our products. The French pastry and bakery offering is so vast that we could chose those products which were best suited for India – if one can generalise all the regions of this vast country – without having to lose their authenticity. For instance, we introduced a very rich eggless range of offerings, adapted the sweetness level of the products to the local taste, presented our products in hampers and gift boxes for Indian festivities and celebrations, offered chilli and spices on the side, promoted more sourdough breads, etc. In parallel, we developed some new products sought after in India using traditional French techniques. L'Opéra's much-appreciated Berry Mousse Cheesecake and our range of seasonal Mango-based products are just two examples of this.

Q. L'Opéra is known for its high-quality pastries and bread. How do you ensure authenticity while adapting to local tastes?

This constant effort has been and continues to be made possible thanks to the presence of a French Executive Pastry Chef in our organisation at all times and a conscious effort to maintain the authenticity of our products, resisting all commercial temptations to sacrifice the nature and quality of our offering in exchange for more revenues.

Furthermore, we are continuously endeavouring to create a French microcosm within the company whereby our operations follow the processes and traditions we were used to back home in addition to a number of principles which we have defined as "L'Opéra's 10 Core

Q. Can you share with us your journey as an artist? When did you first discover your passion for Art?

Firstly, before I answer your question I would like to thank you for this wonderful opportunity to connect with your readers and share my story. My journey as an artist started when my husband and I were sent on our first diplomatic posting to Pretoria, South Africa approximately eight years ago. It was there that I decided to explore my interest in art. It

was always something I wished I could have pursued before but was unable to because of work commitments and other life obligations. I remember the first time I held a paintbrush and painted my first piece. There was an immediate connection and it was an amazing feeling. Over the years that passion for art never changed but actually grew and I realised that it wasn't just in the final result but also in the process. For me personally, the process of painting is both stress relieving and therapeutic.

It's a wonderful feeling to create something beautiful that I could appreciate and share with others. In 2020 we were posted to India where I continue to explore different painting styles and mediums. Over the years, I've produced many pieces using both acrylic and oil mediums. I am delighted to say that I have participated in numerous exhibitions in both South Africa and India.

Q. How has living in Trinidad and Tobago influenced your art? Are there elements of your home country that you incorporate into your work? Artist: Anita Gopaul



Like most diplomats, living in different countries is an amazing and life changing experience. Each country has a beauty that is unique and phenomenal. As a diplomat, you get the chance to fully immerse yourself in the different cultures, people, places, food and traditions of that particular country. Most artists tend to capture these differences and distinctions in their artwork and see it blossom to life on canvas. For example, in my journey from Africa to India I've experienced the beautiful red and orange hues of an African sunset to the majestic blues of the Himalayas. While I admired the beauty of these countries with which I was now surrounded, it also made me appreciate more of my homeland. Trinidad and Tobago has greatly influenced my art as I use it as my way of capturing and preserving my country. As a result, most of my artwork tends to depict some aspects of Trinidad and Tobago. I've done paintings that included the Scarlet Ibis which is the national bird of Trinidad, the limbo dance which originated in our twin island of Tobago, and buildings of historical importance like Stollmeyers Castle and Temple in The Sea among

others.


Q. As the wife of the High Commissioner, how do you balance your diplomatic responsibilities with your artistic pursuits? Do you find that one influences the other?

My pursuit of art initially stemmed from my passion and interest and was undertaken for my personal growth and development. It was a personal decision that did not connect in any way to my position as the spouse of a High Commissioner or my diplomatic responsibilities. However during my journey I've realised that a relation does exist between both the diplomatic and the artistic world. A large part of diplomacy is about creating and maintaining relations. I've found that art helps to facilitate and build connections between different cultures. My artistic pursuits have never

hindered my diplomatic responsibilities but in fact is actually an avenue which I've used to aid in achieving this objective.

Q. As a woman in the art world, what challenges have you faced and how have you overcome them? What advice would you give to other women who are pursuing a career in Art?

As with almost every career in the world challenges are always present. Healthy challenges I believe are natural and necessary as this is what makes us grow and learn and become better at what we do. Some challenges, however are not natural and being a woman in the world of art comes with a few. While I have not personally faced discrimination within the art fraternity I am aware that it is an issue that many other female artists face. They are not being adequately recognised and awarded based simply on the fact that they are women. I think this mindset has changed a lot and is less prevalent nowadays from let's say a decade ago, as many governments and international groups have been campaigning the issue of gender bias and discrimination. We have come a long way in eliminating this and the increased awareness of these issues has begun to show as we are seeing positive results where recognition is given based on talent and merit and not gender. My advice to women, who may be interested in art as a career, is to not let these challenges discourage you in following your dream. Believe in yourself, persevere and let your talent shine through.

Q. Could you tell us about the piece that would be featured in our "Art Inside" section? What inspired it, and what do you hope viewers will take away from it?

This 30 x 40 piece is entitled

"Lord Rama's Welcome" and is done in acrylics. It features the Parliament building of Trinidad and Tobago also known as the Red House which was built in 1907. My inspiration stemmed from my desire to create one artwork which infused both the culture of Trinidad and Tobago and India showing the impact of one on the other. Unlike my other pieces which showcase Trinidad and Tobago I wanted to also incorporate aspects of India's influence on our culture. For those of you who may not know, India and Trinidad share a very deep history which began in 1845 with Indians arriving in Trinidad to work in the sugar cane plantations as indentured labourers. After the Indian indenture period ended in 1917, the Indians remained in Trinidad thereby greatly influencing the cultural landscape of our country. In the year 1966 the government declared Diwali a public holiday and this piece shows our red house beautifully being lit with clay lamps that also welcomed Lord Ram to Ayodha. I hope that this piece would educate viewers as to the historical, cultural and diplomatic linkages between our countries.

Q. How do you see Art playing a role in cultural exchange and diplomacy? Can you share any experiences where your art has opened doors for diplomatic or business opportunities?

There are many different aspects in which diplomatic ties can be built between countries. Countries connect through similarities in sport, culture, business, education and other shared interests and also through the differences which help us to grow and learn. I believe that art plays an important role in that cultural exchange and expressions of countries. The various art forms, on a much larger scale, be it fine art, dance or music all brilliantly showcases the history, customs, culture and mindset of a people. We can learn a tremendous amount from art which is a vital tool in the world of diplomacy.

Q. Are there any upcoming projects or exhibitions that our readers should look out for?

As you would be aware, India is currently celebrating the year of Lord Rama and an international exhibition is going to be held by ICCR which will display artworks that depicts the impact of Lord Ram or the Ramayana on different countries of the world. Although the final date has not yet been released, this exhibition will be held in the coming months and one of my pieces will be on display. The piece entitled "Lord Rama's Welcome" is an acrylic painting of the Parliament building of Trinidad and Tobago also known as the Red house with clay lamps (deyas) leading the way to the building. In the year 1966 it was decided by Parliament to declare Divali a public holiday in Trinidad and Tobago. As you would know, Divali is the festival of lights which welcomes Lord Ram back to Ayodha. It is an honour for me to display this particular piece as it shows the almagamation of both countries, Trinidad and Tobago

and India.

Q. Finally, is there any message you would like to convey to our readers, particularly those interested in art and diplomacy?

The one message I would like to leave with your readers is simply to find your passion. Whether it is in art or diplomacy or totally unrelated, once you have the passion and follow through with it you would be amazed at what you could accomplish. It is the passion that drives you to go that one step further and do what would otherwise seem impossible. It is the passion that makes you put out the extra effort without even realising it and it is the passion that makes the process an enjoyable journey.

London has been special in my life for a very long time. I have had beautiful memories with my family vacationing here. I vividly remember, when I was


roaming around in the city with I spotted a traditional English merry-go-round with brightly painted horses. This merry-go-round at Covent Garden became such a fun spot






